

- Cleaning Unplug this TV receiver from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning. Do not use chemicals on your TV's screen.
- 6. Attachment and Equipment Never add any attachments and/or equipment without approval of the manufacturer as such additions may result in the risk of fire, electric shock or other personal injury.
- 7. Water and Moisture Do not use this TV receiver where contact with or immersion in water is a possibility. Do not use near: bath tubs, wash bowls, kitchen sinks, laundry tubs, or swimming pools, etc.

8. Accessories

Do not place this TV receiver on an unstable cart, stand, tripod, bracket, or table. The TV receiver may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the appliance. Use only with a cart, stand, tripod bracket, or table recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the TV receiver. Any mounting of the appliance should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting accessory recommended by the manufacturer.

<u>An appliance and cart combination should be moved with</u> <u>care.</u> <u>Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may</u> <u>cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.</u>



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9. Ventilation

Slots and openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation and to ensure reliable operation of the TV receiver and to protect it from overheating. Do not block these openings or allow them to be blocked by placing the TV receiver on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. Nor should it be placed over a radiator or heat register. If the TV receiver is to be placed in a rack or bookcase, ensure that there is adequate ventilation and that the manufacturer's instructions have been adhered to.

10. Power Sources

This TV receiver should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supply to your home, consult your appliance dealer or local power company.

11. Grounding or Polarization

For your safety, this TV receiver is equipped with a polarized alternating current line plug having one blade wider than the other. This plug will fit into the power outlet only one way. If you are unable to insert the plug fully into the outlet. Try reversing the plug. If the plug should still fail to fit, contact your electrician to replace your obsolete outlet. Do not defeat the safety purpose of polarized plug.

12. Power-Cord Protection

Power-supply cords should be routed so that they are not likely to be walked on or pinched by items placed upon or against them, paying particular attention to cords at plugs, convenience receptacles, and the point where they exit from the appliance.

13. Lightning

For added protection for this TV receiver during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the video product due to lightning and power-line surges.

14. Power Lines


An outside antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing an outside antenna system, extreme care should be taken to keep from touching such power lines or circuits as contact with them might be fatal.

- 15. Overloading Do not overload wall outlet and extension cords as this can result in a risk of fire or electric shock.
- 16. Object and Liquid Entry Never push objects of any kind into this TV receiver through openings as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short-out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the TV receiver.
- 17. Outdoor Antenna Grounding

If an outside antenna or cable system is connected to the TV receiver, be sure the antenna or cable system is grounded so as to provided some protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges.

Section 810 of the National Electrical Code, ANSI/NFPA No.70-1984, provides information with respect to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna-discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, an requirements for the grounding electrode.

18. Servicing

Do not attempt to service this TV receiver yourself as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

19. Damage Requiring Service

Unplug this TV receiver from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions :

- (a) When the power-supply cord or plug is damaged.
- (b) If liquid has been spilled, or objects have fallen into the TV receiver.
- (c) If the TV receiver has been exposed to rain or water.
- (d) If the TV receiver does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operating instructions as an improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the TV receiver to its normal operation.
- (e) If the TV receiver has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- (f) When the TV receiver exhibits a distinct change in performance this indicates a need for service.

20. Replacement Parts

When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer or have the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock or other hazards.

21. Safety Check

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this TV receiver ask the service technician to perform safety checks to determine that the TV receiver is in a safe operating condition.



Users should read information labelled important and information which is boxed and labelled warning. The owner's guide uses these terms sparingly, and all information highlighted in this manner should be read carefully.




Some Conventions Used in this Guide



Now that you've unpacked your TV, read through the safety information, and glanced at the overview explaining how this owner's guide is organized, it's time to become familiar with the buttons and controls you'll be using when you operate the TV. This chapter will introduce the range of options available by using the buttons on the control panel of the TV or the remote control. It also offers some general guidelines for using the remote control.

Most functions can be controlled by using either the control panel or the remote control, but certain specialized functions require the use of one or the other. This chapter, which will familiarize you with the full range of button functions, contains the following sections:

- Overview of the Control Panel
- Overview of the Remote Control



- (1) power button (POWER) Use to turn the TV on or off.
- 2 volume controls (VOL)
 Press the ▲button to turn up the volume and the ▼button to turn down the volume.

(3) channel controls (CH)

Use the \blacktriangle button to switch to a channel with a higher number and the \checkmark button to switch to a channel with a lower number.

(4) input button(INPUT)

Use to select the input source to be viewed:

- TV, or
- External.

(5) A/V reset button (A/V RESET)

Press to reset all audio and video functions to their normal level or settings except for volume, reception mode (Stereo/SAP/ Mono), speaker (on/off), and closed captioning.

(6) degauss button (DEGAUSS)

Use this button to correct color impurity.

(7) program timer indicator (PROGRAM-TIMER)

Lights up when the TV is programmed to turn on at a particular time.


(8) color purity adjustment switches (only for CS-35303, CS-35313)

Set to the suitable position. (Please see page 41.)

Getting ready to use the remote control

installing the batteries

- **1** Take the box containing two AA size batteries from the packing bag.
- 2 Remove the back cover of the remote control by pushing in the direction of the arrow.
- 3 Load the batteries as indicated in the illustration, making sure that they are positioned correctly (+ to +, and to -).
- 4 Replace the back cover of the remote control.



For best results, use Duracell AA (MN1500) batteries.

some dos and don'ts


To ensure that your remote control will continue working properly, follow these guidelines:

- Don't press two or more buttons at the same time.
- Don't allow the remote control to get wet or become heated.
- Avoid dropping the remote control on a hard surface.
- When cleaning the remote control, don't use any harsh chemicals. Use only a soft, slightly moistened cloth.

general instructions

When using the remote control to operate the TV, VCR or cable box, follow these procedures:

1 Be within 20 feet of the desired equipment.






Press the appropriate button or groups of buttons.

guidelines for using batteries

- Don't use a new battery with an old one.
- Don't heat, take apart, or throw batteries into a fire.

Remote control buttons and functions



Chapter 1: Getting to Know Your TV

(1)select buttons

Use these buttons to select the component you wish to operate: the TV, an audio component (in CABLE layer), VCR-A or VCR-B. These are also used to set up your remote control for your particular brand of VCR.

(2)VCR buttons

These buttons can be used to control VCRs. These are preprogrammed to operate select Mitsubishi components.

(3) power button (POWER)

Use to turn the TV on or off.

(4) mute control (MUTE)

Use to turn the sound off completely or restore it to its original volume.

(5) super quick view button (SQV)

Press to view channels you have programmed into the super quick view memory.

(6)quick view button (QV)

Press to switch to the channel you have stored into the quick view memory.

(7)volume control (VOLUME)

Press the top part of the button to turn up the volume; press the bottom part of the button to turn down the volume.

(8) input button (INPUT)

Use to select the input source you wish to watch:

- TV, or
- External.

(9) channel control (CHANNEL)

Press the top part of the button to change to a channel with a higher number; press the bottom part to change to a channel with a lower number.

(10) enter button (ENTER)

May be used after selecting a channel number or an item from the on-screen menu system. Also use with the PIP function.

(11) audio and video controls

These buttons are used in pairs to adjust features of the image or sound (other than volume) with a two-step process: using one of the audio or video buttons to select a function, and then using the adjust up/down button or right/left button.

- audio function button (AUDIO)---Use to select one of the following audio functions: -stereo/SAP/mono,
 - -bass.
 - -treble.

Overview of the Remote Control

-balance, -surround off/simulate/hall, or -speaker on/off.

• video function button (VIDEO)---Use to select one of the following video functions: --tint,

-color, -contrast, -brightness, -sharpness, -color temperature low/middle/high, or -closed captioning.

adjust up/down buttons, right/left buttons---After selecting the audio or video function, use either the up(right) or the down(left) button to adjust the function you've selected. These buttons can be used to:
 -turn the function on or off (e.g., speaker),
 -increase or decrease the function (e.g., color),
 -shift from one end of a scale to the other (e.g., balance), or
 -select a position (e.g., stereo).

You will also use the adjust buttons to select items on the on-screen menus.

(12) menu button (MENU)

Use this button to display the on-screen mer.u system, which contains additional instructions for special functions.

(13) cancel button (CANCEL)

Use this button to: cancel the entered channel number within three seconds; to erase the parental lock code during the parental lock sequence; to clear a channel programmed into super quick view memory; and to clear the settings of some on-screen menus.

(14) display button (DISPLAY)

Use to view an on-screen summary of the current TV settings for TV or cable functions, and the display related to Television Data Services (TVDS).

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(15) home button (HOME)

Press to return to regular TV viewing from the on-screen displays and menus.

(16) number buttons (0-9)


Use to select a channel number, and to enter the parental lock code.

(17) off-timer button (OFF-T)

Use to program the TV to turn off automatically at a later time.

(18) **picture-in-picture controls** Use to control the special picture-in-picture (PIP) function.

- **PIP button (PIP)**---Press to see the reduced PIP image or cancel it.
- channel button (VCR-CH)---Press to change the channel of • the reduced PIP image.
- source button (SOURCE)---Press repeatedly to switch the ٠ source of the reduced PIP image between the 'TV and the external input.
- pause button (PAUSE)---Press to freeze the reduced PIP . image or cancel the image freezing. Also use for the advanced PIP functions.
- enter button (ENTER)---Press to switch back and forth between the reduced PIP image and the main image.
- adjust up/down buttons, right/left buttons---Press to move the position of the reduced PIP image.



♦ Overview of the Back Panel



(1) antenna terminal (VHF/UHF)

Use to connect a VHF/UHF antenna.

2S-VIDEO input terminal

Use to connect the video out of a Super VHS (S-VHS) VCR to the TV.

▷Important: If you connect Super VHS (S-VHS) equipment, External will automatically be the input for viewing your S-VHS VCR.

3video input terminal

Use to connect the video output from a standard VCR or another component to the TV.

(4) audio input terminals

Use to connect the audio output from a VCE or other equipment.

(5) video output terminal Use to connect the video of the TV to a VCR, Video Copy Processor, etc.

6 audio output terminals

Use to connect the audio of the TV to an audio system.

♦ Basic Connections

This section describes the equipment and procedures needed for basic hook-ups. (For more complex hook-ups, contact you dealer or local cable company.) The connections explained in this section are:


- TV+antenna or cable without a decoder box,


TV+antenna or cable without a decoder box

equipment you will need

If you have a standard 75-ohm coaxial cable, you will not need additional equipment. If your antenna has two leads (called flat twin leads), you'll need:

• 1 75-300 ohm transformer.





connecting a cable

• Push or screw the end of the cable onto the antenna terminal on the television.

connecting an antenna with flat twin leads

1 Use a screwdriver to connect the leads to the transformer.

2 Push or screw the transformer onto the antenna terminal on the television.


TV+cable with a decoder box

equipment you will need

Use this hook-up if you need a decoder box to descramble cable signals. This hook-up will allow you to use your TV's remote control to change channels through the decoder box, if the cable layer of the remote control is set up to do so (See "Using the remote control" on page 42).


To complete the hook-up, you'll need:

• 1 length of 75 ohm coaxial cables.



Procedure

- Connect the incoming cable to the IN terminal on the decoder box.
- Connect a coaxial cable to the OUT terminal on the decoder box; connect the other end of this cable to the antenna terminal on the back of the TV.




TV+ separate UHF and VHF antennas

equipment you will need

If UHF and VHF signals are brought into your home with two separate antennas, you'll need to combine the antennas into a single wire to connect them to the TV. To do this you will need a UHF/ VHF combiner. (There are different combiners for different kinds of leads. Check with your local electronics store for the kind of combiner you need.)


Pictured below is a standard combiner.



To connect separate UHF and VHF antennas to your television:

1 Connect the antenna leads to the UHF/VHF combiner.

2 Press the combiner onto the antenna terminal on the television.







You may want to connect a VCR along with your antennas or cable. To complete this hook-up, you may need the following equipment:


• 1 length of coaxial cable,





• 1 RCA pin type video cable, (if connecting a standard VCR), or




• 1 Super Video cable (S-VHS) for Super VHS VCRs.

• Connect the incoming cable to the IN terminal on the decoder box.

Connect a coaxial cable to the OUT terminal on the back of the decoder box; connect the other end of this cable to the AN-TENNA-IN terminal on the back of the VCR.

3 Connect the second coaxial cable to the ANTENNA-OUT termi nal on the back of the VCR. Connect the other end of this cable to the antenna terminal on the back of the TV.

• Connect an RCA pin-type video cable to the VIDEO OUT terminal on the back of the VCR. Connect the other end of this cable to the VIDEO INPUT terminal on the back of the television.

▷ Important: If you are connecting a Super VHS (S-VHS) VCR, use a Super Video cable instead of an RCA pin-type video cable. Connect a Super Video cable to the S-VIDEO OUT terminal on the VCR. Connect the other end of this cable to the S-VIDEO INPUT terminal on the back of the television.

• Connect a set of RCA pin-type audio cables to the AUDIO OUT terminals on the back of the VCR. Use the red cable to connect the right (R) channel and the white cable for connecting the left (L) channel.

© Connect the other ends of this cable to the AUDIO INPUT terminals on the back of the television.





• 1 set of RCA pin-type audio cables.




Procedure

- Connect one end of RCA pin-type audio cables to the AUDIO OUTPUT terminals on the back of the television. Use the red cable to connect the right (R) channel and the white cable to connect the left (L) channel.
- Connect the other ends of this cable to the AUX IN terminals on the back of the audio system.
- Turn off the television's speakers. To do this, press the AUDIO function button on the remote control until you see the SPEAKER display. Set the speakers to "Off" by pressing the ADJUST button. (See "Adjusting the sound," prge 61.)

• Set the audio system's input to the AUX position.



Adjusting the color purity (CS-35303, CS-35313 only)

Your MITSUBISHI CS-35303, CS-35313 color television has a large screen picture tube and color purity may be affected slightly by the earth's magnetic field. For best results, follow the instruction below for color purity adjustment.






Changing channels



- using the Super Quick View function to alternate between special channels programmed for quick viewing.

Important: To change channels faster, use either of the following procedures:

- Enter three digits for every channel number, using zeros where needed. (For example, enter "004" to view channel 4 and "028" to view channel 28.)
- Press the ENTER button after selecting the number of the channel. (For example, press "4" and "ENTER" to view channel 4.)
- ▷Important: Cable stations channel numbers 0 and greater than 126 are unassigned. TV stations 0, 1 and 70 through 999 are unassigned. If these channel numbers are pressed, the channel remains unchanged.






Understanding the on-screen menus


One of the distinctive features of this TV is an on-screen menu system that provides step-by-step instructions for using some of the TV's special capabilities.

When using any of the on-screen menus, keep the following in mind:


- The on-screen menus will clear if no item is selected within 5 minutes.
- Unavailable menu items are indicated in light blue.
- Some on-screen menu items must be set before other items are available. For example, "Set the timer" will only be available if "Set the clock" has been set.
- You can exit the on-screen menus any time by pressing the MENU button repeatedly. You will then return to regular TV viewing.
- You can also exit the on-screen menus by pressing the HOME button on the remote control.

Setting the clock

Your TV contains an internal clock to indicate the current time. If there is a broadcaster in your area that is sending the current time along with its regular broadcast signal, then your TV can automatically set its clock with this signal. Otherwise, you can set the clock yourself.




- If you follow daylight savings time, set the "Daylight savings" to "On" using the ADJUST button. If you do not follow, set it to "Off." Then press the ENTER button.
- The automatic setting is completed, and the clock will start automatically.

▷Important: The TV can only set the clock automatically ("Auto clock") when there is a broadcaster in your area that is sending the current time via Television Data Services (TVDS). The clock will start just after the TV receives the time data.

You can use the pause button in the Picture-in-Picture mode to display special PIP features. Select one of the following settings:

Adjusting the sound

You can adjust all of your television's sound functions by using a pair of buttons: select a function with the AUDIO button and adjust the function with the ADJUST button or right/left button. You use the ADJUST button to:

- select a position (e.g., stereo),
- increase or decrease the function (e.g., bass), or
- shift from one end of a scale to the other (e.g., balance).

After adjusting the sound, an on-screen display will indicate the function and level you've selected.

what you'll adjust:

"Listen to: Stereo/SAP/Mono" allows you to change the audio reception mode to stereo, separate audio programming (SAP), or monaural (mono), depending on the type of broadcast you are receiving. As you select the reception mode, remember the following:

- The "Stereo" setting allows you to receive both mono and stereo broadcasts.
- The separate audio programming ("SAP") setting offers you the option of listening to either of two separate audio programs. For example, a combination television/radio station may broadcast through the TV.
- The "Mono" setting reduces unwanted background noise when a stereo broadcast is coming in weak. When you use the "Mono" setting, you will hear the broadcast in monaural even when the broadcast signal is in stereo.
- **Important:** An on-screen display appears when programs are broadcast in stereo or when separate audio programming (SAP) is available.

"Bass" controls the volume of low frequency sound.

"Treble" controls the volume of high frequency sound.

"Balance" adjusts the level of sound between the left and right speakers.


"Surround: Off/Simulate/Hall" allows you to simulate or expand stereo sound.

• "Off" does not change the sound.

- "Simulate" gives you a pseudo-stereo effect when receiving monaural sound broadcasts.
- "Hall" makes stereo sound seem wider and extend around behind you.

"Speaker: On/Off" turns the TV speakers on or off. Set to "On" for normal operation. Set to "Off" if you connected your TV to an audio system.



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

Many broadcasters now supply closed captioning information along with their regular broadcasts.

There are two types of captioning that broadcasters can send: "standard" and "text." Standard captioning is related to the program that is being shown. Standard captioning usually follows the dialogue of the characters on-screen. Text captioning does not usually relate to the program being shown. It often contains information such as weather or news. Text captioning often blocks out your view of the program you are watching.

Your TV can decode four different "standard captioning" signals and four different "text captioning" signals on each TV channel.



Press the VIDEO button on the remote control until the closed captioning (CCC) display appears on the screen.

Press the ADJUST button or right/left button on the remote control to select the captioning signal you wish to display: cc 1/
cc 2/ cc 3/ |cc 4/ cc Text 1/
cc Text 2/ cc Text 3/ cc Text 4/ cc When muting/Off.

You can choose to display one of four "standard captioning" signals (indicated by the word **CC** and a number), to display one of four "text captioning" signals (indicated by the word "Text" and a number), to display captions when muting, or to turn the captions off.

If you select "When muting," the standard captioning signal **GG** 1 will appear whenever you use the MUTE button.

Closed captioning can be used in many ways, such as:

- helping children learn to read,
- learning a foreign language, and
- using the television without disturbing others.
- ▷Important: If you cannot display any captions on the screen, please keep in mind that not all broadcasters, video tapes, or laserdiscs supply closed caption signals.

Closed captions will not appear if you are playing a video tape that is worn or old.







XDS allows broadcasters to supply you with the current time, channel information, (such as call letters and the network name), and program information (such as the program name and program description). To view this information, press the display button (DISPLAY) on the remote control.





After you lock the TV, you will need the secret code in order to:



view the locked TV, or cancel the lock.

If you forget the code, you can view the locked TV without entering the code. To do this, simply press the buttons labeled "QV" and "9" at the same time.

- **Important:** This procedure will only unlock the TV temporarily. To cancel the lock completely, follow the procedure below:
 - Press the "QV" button and the "9" button on the remote control at the same time. This will allow you to turn on a locked TV.
 - Press the MENU button to view the main menu. Use the ADJUST button to select "Advanced Features." Press ENTER.
 - **3** Use the ADJUST button to select "Lock the TV." Press ENTER.
 - Press the "QV" button and the "9" button on the remote control at the same time. This will turn off the lock.

d. Labor. For one year from the original purchase at retail, we will provide the labor for a warranty repair by an authorized MITSUBISHI service center without charge.

e. Notice. To obtain warranty service, you must notify an authorized MITSUBISHI service center of any defect within the applicable warranty time period. 1. TO OBTAIN WARRANTY SERVICE DURING THE FIRST YEAR:

a. Contact your nearest authorized MITSUBISHI service center whose name and address can be obtained from your MITSUBISHI dealer or by writing or calling MELA at the address and telephone number provided below.

b. Warranty service will be provided in your home or, if required, at an authorized service shop, provided that your television is located within the geographic territory customarily covered by an authorized MITSUBISHI service center.
