

8. Accessories

Do not place this TV receiver on an unstable cart, stand, tripod, bracket, or table. The TV receiver may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the appliance. Use only with a cart, stand, tripod, bracket, or table recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the TV receiver. Any mounting of the appliance should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting accessory recommended by the manufacturer.

An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.



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9. Ventilation

Slots and openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation and to ensure reliable operation of the TV receiver and to protect it from overheating. Do not block these openings or allow them to be blocked by placing the TV receiver on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. Nor should it be placed over a radiator or heat register. If the TV receiver is to be placed in a rack or bookcase, ensure that there is adequate ventilation and that the manufacturer's instructions have been adhered to.

10. Power Sources

This TV receiver should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supply to your home, consult your appliance dealer or local power company.

11. Grounding or Polarization

For your safety, this TV receiver is equipped with a polarized alternating current line plug having one blade wider than the other. This plug will fit into the power outlet only one way. If you are unable to insert the plug fully into the outlet. Try reversing the plug. If the plug should still fail to fit, contact your electrician to replace your obsolete outlet. Do not defeat the safety purpose of the polarized plug.

12. Power-Cord Protection

Power-supply cords should be routed so that they are not likely to be walked on or pinched by items placed upon or against them, paying particular attention to cords at plugs, convenience receptacles, and the point where they exit from the appliance.

13. Lightning

For added protection for this TV receiver during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the video product due to lightning and power-line surges.

14. Power Lines

An outside antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing an outside antenna system, extreme care should be taken to keep from touching such power lines or circuits as contact with them might be fatal.

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18. Servicing

Do not attempt to service this TV receiver yourself as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

19. Damage Requiring Service


Unplug this TV receiver from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:

- (a) When the power-supply cord or plug is damaged.
- (b) If liquid has been spilled, or objects have fallen into the TV receiver.
- (c) If the TV receiver has been exposed to rain or water.
- (d) If the TV receiver does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operating instructions as an improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the TV receiver to its normal operation.
- (e) If the TV receiver has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- (f) When the TV receiver exhibits a distinct change in performance this indicates a need for service.
- 20. Replacement Parts

When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer or have the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock or other hazards.

21. Safety Check

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this TV receiver ask the service technician to perform safety checks to determine that the TV receiver is in a safe operating condition.






Now that you've unpacked your TV, read through the safety information, and glanced at the overview explaining how this owner's guide is organized, it's time to become familiar with the buttons and controls you'll be using when you operate the TV. This chapter will introduce the range of options available by using the buttons on the control panel of the TV or the remote control. It also offers some general guidelines for using the remote control.

Most functions can be controlled by using either the control panel or the remote control, but certain specialized functions require you use to one or the other. This chapter, which will familiarize you with the full range of button functions, contains the following sections:

- Overview of the Remote Control

♦ Overview of the Control Panel



(1) power button (POWER)

Use to turn the TV on or off.

(2)program timer indicator (PROG. TIMER)

Lights up when the TV is programmed to turn on at a particular time.

(3) volume controls (VOL)

Press the \blacktriangle button to turn up the volume and the \triangledown button to turn down the volume.

(4) channel controls (CHANNEL)

Use the \blacktriangle button to switch to a channel with a higher number and the \checkmark button to switch to a channel with a lower number.

(5) input button (INPUT)

- Use either button to select the input source to be viewed:
- Antenna A,
- Antenna B, or
- External 1, 2 or 3.

(6) A/V Reset (AV RESET)

Use this button to reset the audio and video functions to their original factory settings.

(7) degauss button (DEGAUSS)

Use this button to correct color impurity.

(8) color purity switches

Set to the suitable position.

9S-VIDEO input terminal

Use to connect the video output of a Super VHS (S-VHS) VCR to the TV. If you connect a S-VHS VCR to this terminal, EXT-3 will automatically be the input for viewing the S-VHS VCR.

(10) video input terminal

Use to connect the video output from a standard VCR or another component to the TV.

(1) audio input terminals

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Use to connect the audio from a VCR or other equipment.


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♦ Overview of the Remote Control

Getting ready to use the remote control

installing the batteries

- Take the box containing two AA size batteries from the packing bag.
- 2 Remove the back cover of the remote control by pushing in the direction of the arrow.
- Load the batteries as indicated in the illustration, making sure that they are positioned correctly (+ to +, and to -).
- 4 Replace the back cover of the remote control.



For best results, use Duracell AA (MN1500) batteries.


some dos and don'ts

To ensure that your remote control will continue working properly, follow these guidelines:

- Don't press two or more buttons at the same time, unless specifically instructed to do so in this owner's guide.
- Don't allow the remote control to get wet or become heated.
- Avoid dropping the remote control on a hard surface.
- When cleaning the remote control, don't use any harsh chemicals. Use only a soft, slightly moistened cloth.



Remote control buttons and functions



Chapter 1: Getting to Know Your TV

(1)select buttons

Use these buttons to select the component you wish to operate: the TV, an audio component (in the CABLE layer), VCR-A or VCR-B. These are also used to set up your remote control for your particular brand of VCR.

(2) audio and VCR buttons

These buttons can be used to control VCRs, cassette decks, CD players, etc. These are pre-programmed to operate select Mitsubishi components. As for the PLAY button, see "Using the Active A/V Network Feature," page 91.

(3) power button (POWER)

Ūse to turn the TV on or off.

(4) mute control (MUTE)

Use to turn the sound off completely or restore it to its original volume.

(5) super quick view button (SQV)

Press to view channels you have programmed into the super quick view memory.

(6) quick view button (QV)

Press to switch to the channel you have stored into the quick view memory.

(7)volume control (VOLUME)

Press the top part of the button to turn up the volume; press the bottom part of the button to turn down the volume.

(8) input button (INPUT)

- Use to select the input source you wish to watch:
- Antenna A,
- Antenna B, or
- External 1, 2 or 3.

(9) channel control (CHANNEL)

Press the top part of the button to change to a channel with a higher number; press the bottom part to change to a channel with a lower number.

(10) enter button (ENTER)

May be used after selecting a channel number or an item from the on-screen menu system. Also use with the PIP function.

(11) audio and video controls

These buttons are used in pairs to adjust features of the image or sound (other than volume) with a two-step process: using one of the audio or video buttons to select a function, and then using the adjust up/down button or right/left button.

• audio function button (AUDIO)---Use to select one of the following audio functions: -stereo/SAP/mono,

-bass,

-treble, -balance, -audio expansion, -level sound on/off, -speaker internal/external, or -monitor out variable/fixed.

• video function button (VIDEO)---Use to select one of the following video functions: -tint,

-color, -contrast, -brightness, -sharpness, -video noise reduction on/off, -color temperature low/middle/high, -color bias average/accurate/skin-tone, or -closed captioning.

adjust up/down buttons, right/left buttons---After selecting the audio or video function, use either the up(right) or the down(left) button to adjust the function you've selected. These buttons can be used to:
 -turn the function on or off (e.g., video noise reduction),
 -increase or decrease the function (e.g., color),
 -shift from one end of a scale to the other (e.g., balance), or
 -select a position (e.g., stereo).

You will also use the adjust buttons to select items on the onscreen menus.

(12) menu button (MENU)

Use this button to display the on-screen menu system, which contains additional instructions for special functions.

(13) cancel button (CANCEL)

This button is used to cancel the entered channel number within three seconds, to erase the parental lock code during the parental lock sequence, to clear a channel programmed into super quick view memory, and to clear the settings of some on-screen menus.

(14) display button (DISPLAY)

Use to view an on-screen summary of the current TV settings for TV or cable functions, and the display related to Extended Data Services (EDS).

(15) home button (HOME)

Press to return to regular TV viewing from the on-screen displays and menus.

(16) quick program button (QUICK PROGRAM)

Use this button to perform automated programming operations with both your TV and your Mitsubishi VCR. When you press this button, your TV will switch to the External-1 input, your VCR will turn on, and the VCR's "Program to record" menu will appear. When you are finished programming your VCR, press this button again; your VCR will turn off, and your TV will return to its previous position.

If you press this button while the TV is locked, or while using the television's menus, then the VCR will turn on, but the TV will not switch inputs.

Additionally, you must have connected your VCR with the A/V Network.

(17) number buttons (0-9)

Use to select a channel number, and to enter the parental lock code.

(18) off-timer button (OFF-T)

Use to program the TV to turn off automatically at a later time.

(19) picture-in-picture controls

Use to control the special picture-in-picture (PIP) function.

- **PIP button (PIP)**---Press to see the reduced PIP image or cancel it. See "Using the Active A/V Network Feature," page 91.
- **channel button (CHANNEL)**---Press to change the channel of the reduced PIP image.
- **source button (SOURCE)**---Press repeatedly to switch the source of the reduced PIP image between the TV and the external inputs.
- **pause button** (**PAUSE**)---Press to freeze the reduced PIP image or cancel the image freezing. Also use for the advanced PIP functions.
- enter button (ENTER)---Press to switch back and forth between the reduced PIP image and the main image.
- adjust up/down buttons, right/left buttons---Press to move the position of the reduced PIP image.

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

Overview of the Back Panel



(1) antenna terminals (ANT-A, ANT-B)

Use to connect a VHF/UHF antennas.

(2) external speaker terminals

Use to connect external speakers. (Only use speakers with a nominal impedance of 8 ohms.)

►Warning:

Never connect equipment other than speakers to the external speaker terminals. Don't connect speakers that are already hooked up to an amplifier.

(3)S-VIDEO input terminals

Use to connect the video out of a Super VHS (S-VHS) VCR to the TV.

Important: If you connect Super VHS equipment (S-VHS), EXT-1 or EXT-2 will automatically be the input for viewing your VCR.

(4) video input terminals

Use to connect the video output from a standard VCR or another component to the TV.

(5) audio input terminals

Use to connect the audio output from a VCR or other equipment.

6 video tuner output terminal

Use to connect the video to a Home Theater receiver.

(7) audio tuner output terminals

Use to transmit the audio to a Home Theater receiver.

8S-video monitor output terminal

Use to connect the S-video of the TV to a VCR, Video Copy Processor, etc.

(9) video monitor output terminal

Use to connect the video of the TV to a VCR, Video Copy Processor, etc.

(10) audio monitor output terminals

Use to connect the audio of the TV to an audio amplifier.

(1) active A/V Network terminal

Use to connect Mitsubishi products that have A/V network terminals.

Basic Connections







If you have a standard 75-ohm coaxial cable, you will not need additional equipment. If your antenna has two leads (called flat twin leads), you will need:

• (1) 75-300 ohm transformer.





connecting a cable

1 Push or screw the end of the cable onto the ANT-A terminal on the television.

connecting an antenna with flat twin leads

- **2** Use a screwdriver to connect the leads to the transformer.




Use this hook-up if you need a decoder box to descramble cable signals. This hook-up will allow you to use the remote control to change channels.

To complete the hook-up, you will need:

• (1) two-way splitter, and



• 3 lengths of 75 ohm coaxial cables.




procedure

(Please see illustration on the following page.)

- Connect the incoming cable to the IN terminal on the two-way splitter.
- 2 Connect a coaxial cable to one of the OUT terminals on the same splitter; connect the other end of this cable to the ANT-A terminal on the back of the TV.
- 3 Connect the second coaxial cable to the second OUT terminal on the same splitter; connect the other end of this cable to the IN terminal on the decoder box.
- Connect the third coaxial cable to the OUT terminal on the back of the decoder box, and the other end of this cable to the ANT-B terminal on the back of the TV.




If UHF and VHF signals are brought into your home with two separate antennas, you'll need to combine the antennas into a single wire to connect them to the TV. To do this you will need a UHF/ VHF combiner. (There are different combiners for different kinds of leads. Check with your local electronics store for the kind of combiner you need.)

Pictured below is a standard combiner.



To connect separate UHF and VHF antennas to your television:

- 1 Connect the antenna leads to the UHF/VHF combiner.
- 2 Press the combiner onto the ANT-A terminal on the television.





- 2 RCA pin-type video cables (if connecting a standard VCR), or
- 1 Super Video cable (S-VHS) and 1 RCA pin-type video cable for a Super VHS home theater receiver.



- Connect one end of an RCA pin-type video cable to the TV VIDEO INPUT terminal of the home theater receiver. Connect the other end of this cable to the VIDEO TUNER OUTPUT terminal on the back of the television.







TV+Mitsubishi products that have A/V Network terminals

The A/V Network is a special system that Mitsubishi developed to make it easier to use the remote control. When the supplied cable is connected between two Mitsubishi products with the A/V Network, you can point the remote control at one product and it will "pass" the remote control command to the other.





- Connect one end of an A/V network cable to the ACTIVE A/V NETWORK terminal on the back of the TV.
- Connect the other end of this cable to the A/V NETWORK IN terminal on the back of a Mitsubishi component that has A/V network terminals.
- 3 You can now point your component remote (such as a VCR remote) directly at the television. The A/V cable will "pass" the remote commands to the component.
- >Important: The method of connecting the A/V network can change, depending on which components you have and the way you plan to use your equipment. More detailed information is contained in the owner's guide of each particular Mitsubishi component.



Adjusting the color purity

Your Mitsubishi color television has a large screen picture tube and color purity may be affected slightly by the earth's magnetic field. For best results, follow the instructions below to adjust the color purity.



1 Turn off the TV set.

- 2 Select the desired location and install the set. Determine the compass direction where the set is facing. The direction is determined from the front of the screen facing forward.
- **3** Select the position for the DIRECTION switch according to the chart below.

4 Turn the TV on and check the color performance.

- ▷ Important: If a color impurity is still present, change the STRENGTH switch to position "1". If a color impurity persists after changing the STRENGTH switch position, press the degauss button after a few minutes.
 - The color purity switches must be adjusted each time the set is moved to a new location.
 - If a color impurity still persists after the re-adjustment of color purity switches, contact your Mitsubishi dealer or Mitsubishi Authorized Warranty Service Center.

Using the remote control

operating Mitsubishi components

This remote control unit comes programmed to operate Mitsubishi TVs, VCRs and audio components. The select buttons determine which component the remote control will operate.

The following buttons are available when operating this TV set.






>Important: Even with the power turned off, there is a small current that continues to flow into the TV. This maintains any changes to the setting as well as operates the built-in clock and timing functions. Unplugging the set will erase these settings, requiring that you set them again. Unplug the TV only when it won't be used for a long time.





Selecting the input source

Press the input button (INPUT) on the control panel or on the remote control to select the input source you wish to view: Ant-A or Ant-B, Ext-1, Ext-2 or Ext-3.

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Changing channels


Your TV offers you four ways of changing channels once their numbers have been programmed into channel memory.

- selecting a channel using the automatic channel scan feature.
- directly accessing a channel by pressing the number buttons.
- using the special quick view option to switch to the special memorized channel, and
- using the Super Quick View function to alternate between special channels programmed for quick viewing.

Important: To change channels faster, use either of the following procedures:

- Enter three digits for every channel number, using zeros where needed. (For example, enter "004" to view channel 4 and "028" to view channel 28.)
- Press the ENTER button after selecting the number of the channel. (For example, press "4" and "ENTER" to view channel 4.)
- ▷ Important: Cable stations channel numbers 0 and greater than 126 are unassigned. TV stations 0, 1 and 70 through 999 are unassigned. If these channel numbers are pressed, the channel remains unchanged.




changing channels automatically

To change channels:

Press one of the channel controls (CHANNEL) on the control panel or on the remote control. The TV automatically goes to the next broadcasting station.


>Important: The channel controls (CHANNEL) will work only after channels have been programmed into memory. (See "Memorizing channels," page 60.)



changing channels directly

To move directly to a particular channel without going through the programmed channels:

- Use the remote control to select the number of the channel you want to view.
- **2** Press the ENTER button.




using the quick view option

To switch to the memorized channel as the quick view channel:

- Select the channel you wish to memorize into the quick view memory.
- Press the QV button for about 3 seconds. When your release this button, the channel number will appear on the screen, indicating that it has been memorized in the quick view memory.
- After changing to another channel, press the quick view (QV) button to immediately return to the QV channel.

Understanding the on-screen menus


One of the distinctive features of this TV is an on-screen menu system that provides step-by-step instructions for using some of the TV's special capabilities.

When using any of the on-screen menus, keep the following in mind:


- The on-screen menus will clear if no item is selected within 5 minutes.
- Unavailable menu items are indicated in light blue.
- Some on-screen menu items must be set before other items are available. For example, "Set the timer" will only be available if "Set the clock" has been set.
- You can exit the on-screen menus any time by pressing the MENU button repeatedly. You will then return to regular TV viewing.
- You can also exit the on-screen menus by pressing the HOME button on the remote control.

Setting the clock

Your TV contains an internal clock to indicate the current time. If there is a broadcaster in your area that is sending the current time along with its regular broadcast signal, then your TV can automatically set its clock with this signal. Otherwise, you can set the clock yourself.




- If you follow daylight savings time, set the "Daylight savings" to "On" using the ADJUST button. If you do not, set it to "Off." Then press the ENTER button.
- The automatic setting is completed, and the clock will start automatically.

The screen will return to the "First Time Set-Up" menu.

▷**Important:** The TV can only set the clock automatically ("Auto clock") when there is a broadcaster in your area that is sending the current time via Extended Data Services (EDS). The clock will start just after the TV receives the time data.

Memorizing channels

Your TV automatically memorizes the channels you can receive. Once channels are memorized, you can scan through them using the channel control on the remote control and control panel.





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

Using video mute

When using the video mute function, any blank section of video tape is replaced by a blue screen. The sound is also turned off. If there is a case where you might wish to try viewing the playback of noisy tape, you can turn the video mute off.



Using the power restore feature

When this feature is used, the TV will automatically turn on when electric current is supplied. This feature is useful when, for example, your TV is plugged into an outlet that you control with a wall switch.

To use the power restore feature:



▷**Important:** For this feature to work, you must leave your TV turned on when you turn off the electric current.

Important: Even when you use the power restore feature, unplugging the set requires that you reset functions such as the built-in clock and timing functions.



Using the advanced PIP functions

You can use the pause button in the Picture-in-Picture mode to display special PIP features by selecting one of the following settings:

- TV Still,
- Snap-shot, or
- Replay.

In "TV Still," the PIP image switches between still and moving. In "Snap-shot," you can view and move the frozen PIP image. In "Replay," you can view still PIP images in sequence for a "strobe" animation effect. These images will appear in sets of three (from a total of seven stored images) at the speed you select. (See "Using the Picture-in-Picture (PIP) Mode," page 84.)



Adjusting the sound

You can adjust all of your television's sound functions by using a pair of buttons: select a function with the AUDIO button and adjust the function with the ADJUST button or right/left button. You use the ADJUST button to:

- select a position (e.g., stereo),
- increase or decrease the function (e.g., bass), or
- shift from one end of a scale to the other (e.g., balance).

After adjusting the sound, an on-screen display will indicate the function and level you've selected.

what you'll adjust:

"Listen to: Stereo/SAP/Mono" allows you to change the audio reception mode to stereo, separate audio programming (SAP), or monaural (mono), depending on the type of broadcast you are receiving. As you select the reception mode, remember the following:

- The "Stereo" setting allows you to receive both mono and stereo broadcasts.
- The separate audio programming ("SAP") setting offers you the option of listening to either of two separate audio programs. For example, a combination television/radio station may broadcast through the TV.
- The "Mono" setting reduces unwanted background noise when you are receiving a weak stereo broadcast. When you use the "Mono" setting, you will hear the broadcast in monaural even when the broadcast signal is in stereo.
- **Important:** An on-screen display appears when programs are broadcast in stereo or when separate audio programming (SAP) is available.

"Bass" controls the volume of low frequency sound.

"Treble" controls the volume of high frequency sound.


"Balance" adjusts the level of sound between the left and right speakers.

"Audio expansion: On/Off" creates a stereo effect with non-stereo stations or non-stereo external sources.

"Level sound: On/Off" equalizes the volume between different TV stations and between antennas and external inputs.

"Speaker: Internal/External" controls which speaker (built-in or external) is available. Set to "Internal" for normal operation of the internal speaker system. When connected to external speakers or an external audio system, the speakers can be turned off by setting this function to "External." "Monitor out: Variable/Fixed" lets you set up the TV for use with a home theater receiver or audio system. Choose "Variable" when you wish to use the television remote control for such functions as volume and mute. Choose "Fixed" if you connected a home theater receiver or audio system. This lets you control functions such as volume and mute through the receiver or audio system.

adjusting the audio functions



- Use the AUDIO button on the remote control to select one of the functions.
- 2 Use the ADJUST up/down button or right/left button on the remote control to adjust the function.

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You can adjust all of your television's picture functions by using a pair of buttons: select a function with the VIDEO button and adjust the function with the ADJUST button or right/left button. Use the ADJUST button to:

- shift from one end of a scale to the other (e.g., tint),
- increase or decrease the function (e.g., color),
- select a position (e.g., color temperature).

After adjusting the picture, an on-screen display will indicate the function and level you've selected.

what you'll adjust:

"Tint" adjusts the proportion of red to green that determines the delicate tones of color.

"Color" determines the intensity of the color.

"Contrast" controls the level of white-to-black in the picture.

"Brightness" controls the light level of the image on screen.

"Sharpness" adjusts the detail and clarity of the picture.


"Video N(oise) R(eduction): On/Off" is used to reduce background noise that can occur with weak signals. Usually this function is set to "Off".

"Color temp(erature): Low/Middle/High" is used to change the relative warmth of the picture.

"Color bias: Average/Accurate/Skin-tone" is used to improve the color reproduction depending to the input source.

" CC (closed captioning): 1/2/3/4/Text 1/Text 2/Text 3/Text 4/ When muting/Off" is used to display the text information on the TV screen. For details, see "Using the Closed Caption Decoder," page 72.

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
Using the closed caption decoder

Many broadcasters now supply closed captioning information along with their regular broadcasts. Your TV can decode that information and display it on your TV screen.

There are two types of captioning that broadcasters can send: "standard" and "text." Standard captioning usually follows the dialogue of the characters on-screen. Text captioning often contains information such as weather or news and blocks out your view of the program you are watching.

Your TV can decode four different "standard captioning" signals and four different "text captioning" signals on each TV channel. However, each station may be broadcasting only one or two captioning signals, or none at all.

To use the closed caption decoder:



Press the VIDEO button on the remote control until the closed captioning (cc) display appears on the screen.

Press the ADJUST button or right/left button on the remote control to select the captioning signal you wish to display.

You can choose to display one of four "standard captioning" signals (indicated by the word **CC** and a number), to display one of four "text captioning" signals (indicated by the word "Text" and a number), to display captions when muting, or to turn the captions off.

If you select "When muting," the standard captioning signal cc 1 will appear whenever you use the MUTE button.

uses for closed captioning

Closed captioning was initially designed so that those with hearing difficulties can enjoy viewing television more. However, closed captioning can also be used in other ways, such as:

- helping children learn to read,
- learning a foreign language, and
- using the television without disturbing others.
- >Important: If you cannot display any captions on the screen, please keep in mind that not all broadcasters, video tapes, or laserdiscs supply closed caption signals.



Using the Advanced Features

Setting the timer

This special feature allows you to program the TV to turn on automatically at a preset time. To set the timer:




while setting the timer, the cursor will move to the previous item. To clear the timer, press the CANCEL button with the cursor at the "Day" position.

>Important: When the timer turns the TV on, the display will flash as a warning. If you do not press a TV function button for about 5 minutes, the TV will automatically turn off. Pressing a TV function button (ex. display button) causes the TV to remain on and the display to stop flashing.

Using the parental lock

This special feature locks the entire TV or one particular channel to prevent others from watching it.



DImportant:

- You must first unlock the TV before you can use it with the timer.
 When you set the parental lock to "on" and the lock message appears on the screen, the TV will turn off again in about 5 minutes unless you enter the code to unlock it.
- 3. The lock message appears when turning the TV on or changing a channel until you set the parental lock to "off".






Super-Quick-View allows you to cycle through a list of up to ten numbers by using the SQV button. You can use the menu system to add channels to and remove channels from the list.



Understanding the On-Screen Displays

Your TV provides an on-screen summary of the current settings for the TV or cable channels, as well as the information related to Extended Data Services (EDS). EDS allows broadcasters to supply you with the current time, channel information, and program information. To view this information, press the display button (DISPLAY) on the remote control repeatedly. This section describes the displays in the order that they occur.



Important: If the broadcaster is not supplying information via EDS, then the message of no data will appear ("No name available", "No description available"). Additionally, the "call letters" will not appear.

This A/V Network is a special feature that makes it easier to use your television and your other A/V components together. When you connect the A/V Network, you can point the remote control at the television, and it will "pass" the remote control command to the other components.

Additionally, you will gain even more benefits if you have a Mitsubishi VCR equipped for the Active A/V Network. The Active A/V Network allows you to perform many of the commonly used features of your system at the press of just one button.

This section will explain the various features of the Active A/V Network.

before you begin

- You must have connected an A/V Network cable from the Active A/V Network terminal of your TV to the A/V Network IN terminal of your VCR. See "TV+Mitsubishi products that have A/V Network terminals", page 43.
- You must have connected your VCR to External 1 (EXT-1) of your TV.
- You must have set your TV's "A/V Network" setting to "Active" or "Basic". See "Setting the A/V Network," page 62.
- Your VCR's remote control switch (if any) should be set to "VCR-A".
- Your VCR's video mute setting should be turned ON.

what the Active A/V Network does

The Active A/V Network makes it easier and faster to use the VCR's Quick Program and Play commands and the TV's PIP commands.

Important: When using the Active A/V Network, you should always point your remote control at your television.

Using the active A/V Network (cont.)

using the quick program button (QUICK PROGRAM)

When you press QUICK PROGRAM to begir. programming your VCR:

- Active A/V Network will turn on your VCR and bring it to the "Program to Record" screen. (If the VCR's clock has not been set, you will see the "Set the clock" screen. See your VCR's Owner's Guide for information about setting the clock.)
- Active A/V Network will turn on your TV (if it is off), and switch the TV to EXT-1.

You can program your VCR by pointing your remote control at the TV.

When you press QUICK PROGRAM to end programming your VCR:

- Active A/V Network will turn off your VCR (unless a tape is currently playing or recording).
- Active A/V Network will return your TV to the channel it was on before, or turn it off (if it was off originally).

using the PLAY button (AUTO PLAY)

When you press PLAY on the remote:

- Active A/V Network will turn your VCR on and begin playing the tape (if any).
- Active A/V Network will turn your TV on and switch it to EXT-1.

When you turn your TV off:

• Your VCR will turn off, unless it is playing or recording.

using the PIP button (TWO TUNER PIP)

Important: You must be watching a broadcast channel on Antenna-A or Antenna-B to use the Active A/V Network PIP function correctly.

When you press the PIP button on the remote to bring up a PIP image:

- Your VCR will automatically turn on.
- You can see the VCR's picture in the small PIP image.

While the PIP image is on the screen:


• The PIP function buttons (SOURCE, CHANNEL, ENTER, right/ left, adjust up/down, PAUSE) will all work in the same manner.



• The CHANNEL and number buttons (0-9) will automatically control the small PIP image. You cannot change channels on the main image.

When you press the PIP button on the remote to turn off the PIP image:

- CHANNEL, the number buttons, and all other functions will work normally again.
- ▷Important: If you turn off the TV while it is set to EXT-1, it will return to the last channel you viewed on Antenna-A or Antenna-B when you turn the TV back on.
- ▷Important: If you leave the TV turned on, set to EXT-1, but the TV is not receiving a signal on EXT-1, it will automatically turn off after five minutes. (If you use a TV menu during this time, the TV will turn off five minutes after you stop using the menus.)
- ▷Important: You should not press the PIP button while you are watching a channel that is not receiving any broadcasts. You will not be able to see the small PIP image, and you will not be able to change channels on the main image. You may need to turn off the TV and turn it back on, change to a channel that is receiving a broadcast, and begin again.





Even though you're now familiar with the basic and advanced operations of the TV, you may run into trouble from time to time as you become accustomed to the TV. This chapter offers solutions to some of the common problems you may encounter. We suggest that you consult this chart before contacting a Mitsubishi service representative.
