Selecting fine audio equipment such as the unit you've just purchased is only the start of your musical enjoyment. Now it's time to consider how you can maximize the fun and excitement your equipment offers. This manufacturer and the Electronic Industries Association's Consumer Electronics Group want you to get the most out of your equipment by playing it at a safe level. One that lets the sound come through loud and clear without annoying blaring or distortion-and, most importantly, without affecting your sensitive hearing.

Sound can be deceiving. Over time your hearing "comfort level" adapts to higher volumes of sound. So what sounds "normal" can actually be loud and harmful to your hearing. Guard against this by setting your equipment at a safe level BEFORE your hearing adapts.

To establish a safe level:

- Start your volume control at a low setting.
- Slowly increase the sound until you can hear it comfortably and clearly, and without distortion.

Once you have established a comfortable sound level:

• Set the dial and leave it there.

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TRANSPORTATION SCREW

In order to protect the inside of this unit from vibration and shocks during transportation, the internal mechanism is fixed with transportation screws.

Before using the player, remove the three transportation screws located on the bottom panel by turning them counter-clockwise with a crossed or flat-blade screwdriver.

If this unit is placed with the top panel or right-side panel down after the screws have been removed, the internal mechanism will fall.

Be sure to place the unit with the left side panel down and remove the screws (red x 3). Before tilting the unit, confirm that no discs are inserted in the player.

Do not tilt this unit with discs left inside it, for this will cause malfunction.



Retain all screws as they will be necessary when the unit is to be retransported.

Never remove any screws other than the transportation screws.

 When re-transporting this unit in the future, remove all discs in the player and close all Racks(Page 8). Turn off the POWER STANDBY/ ON switch and leave the unit in STANDBY mode for 10 seconds or more. And then, tighten the transportation screws by turning them with the crossed or flat-blade screwdriver clockwise until it stops. Be careful not to tighten the screws too firmly. When tightening the screws, place the unit with the left side panel down.

• Affixing the index labels

Use the labels (1 \sim 100) as shown below, and affix them as corresponding to the disc number shown on the groove of the Rack.

The following are examples of using labels.

- Attach the supplied labels to one of the three positions shown in the illustration above.
- (A): For supplied CD liner notes file
- (B): For CD disc case
- (C): For CD disc's liner notes

PUT BATTERIES INTO THE REMOTE CONTROL UNIT



Open the lid of the battery compartment on the rear of the remote control unit, and insert the batteries, taking care to align the \bigoplus and \bigoplus polarities correctly.

NOTES:

- In order to prevent battery leakage, remove the batteries when not using the remote control unit for an extended period (one month or more). If leakage occurs, carefully wipe away any battery fluid inside the compartment, and replace the batteries with new ones.
- Do not allow books or other objects to rest on top of the remote control unit, since the buttons may be depressed, causing faster exhaustion of the batteries.
- When the operable range decreases, this means that the batteries are nearly exhausted. Replace them with new batteries.

Incorrect use of batteries may cause leakage or rupture. Always be sure to follow these guidelines:

- A. Always insert batteries into the battery compartment correctly matching the positive ⊕ and negative ⊖ polarities, as shown by the display inside the compartment.
- B. Never mix new and used batteries.
- C. Batteries of the same size may have different voltages, depending on brand. Do not mix different brands of batteries.

REMOTE CONTROL OPERATIONS

When operating the remote control unit, point the unit's infrared signal transmitter at the remote control receiver (Remote Sensor) on the front panel of the player. The remote control unit can be used within a range of about 7 meters (23 feet) from the remote sensor, and within angles of up to about 30 degrees.



NOTE:

If the remote control sensor window is in a position where it receives strong light such as sunlight or fluorescent light, control may not be possible.

CAUTIONS REGARDING HANDLING

Location

Install the unit in a well-ventilated location where it will not be exposed to high temperatures or humidity.

Do not install the unit in a location which is exposed to direct rays of the sun, or near hot appliances or radiators. Excessive heat can adversely affect the cabinet and internal components. Installation of the unit in a damp or dusty environment may also result in a malfunction or an accident. (Avoid installation near cookers etc., where the unit may be exposed to oily smoke, steam or heat.) Do not install the unit on a tottered stand, nor on an unstable or inclined surface.



Precautions regarding installation

- Placing and using the compact disc player for long periods on heat-generating sources such as amplifiers will affect performance. Avoid placing the player on heat-generating sources.
- Install this compact disc player as far as possible from tuners and TV sets. A compact disc player installed in close proximity to such equipment may cause noise or degradation of the picture.
- Such noise may be particularly noticeable when an indoor antenna is used. In such cases, make use of an outdoor antenna, or turn off power to the compact disc player.
- Please place this unit on a level surface.



Cleaning the player

To clean the PLAYER, wipe with a soft, dry cloth. For stubborn dirt, wet a soft cloth with a mild detergent solution made by diluting one part detergent to 5 or 6 parts water, wring well, then wipe off the dirt. Also use a dry cloth to wipe the surface dry. Do not use volatile liquids such as benzene and thinner which are harmful to the unit.

Storing discs

- Discs are made of the same kinds of plastic used for conventional analog audio records. Be careful not to allow discs to warp; always store discs in their cases vertically, avoiding locations with high heat or humidity, or extremely low temperatures. Avoid leaving discs in cars, since the seat of a car in direct sunlight can become unbelievably hot.
- Always read and abide by the precautionary notes listed on disc labels.



CD lens cleaner

The player's pickup lens should not become dirty in normal use, but if for some reason it should malfunction due to soiling, consult your nearest PIONEER authorized service center. Lens cleaners for CD players are commercially available, but special care should be exercised in their use since some may cause damage to the lens.

Condensation

When this unit is brought into a warm room from previously cold surroundings or when the room temperature rises sharply, condensation may form inside, and the unit may not be able to attain its full performance. To prevent this, allow the unit to stand for about an hour before switching it on, or raise the room temperature gradually.



Cleaning and handling compact discs

The presence of fingerprints or smudges on the surface of the disc will not directly affect the recorded signals, but depending on the degree of contamination, the brightness of the light reflected from the signal surfaces may be reduced, causing degradation of sound quality. Always keep your discs clean by wiping them gently with a soft cloth from the inner edge toward the outer periphery.



- If a disc becomes very dirty, dip a soft cloth in water, and after wringing it out well, wipe the dirt away gently, and then remove any water drops with another soft, dry cloth.
- Do not use record cleaning sprays or anti-static agents on discs. Also, never clean discs with benzene, thinner, or other volatile solvents, since damage to the disc surface may result.



- With this player, use discs which display the mark shown below. (Optical audio digital discs.)
- When holding discs, do not touch their signal surfaces. Hold by the edges, or by one edge and the center hole.
- Do not affix gummed labels or tape to the label surfaces. Also, do not scratch or damage the label.
- Discs rotate at high speed inside the player. Do not use damaged (cracked or warped) discs.



PRECAUTIONS:

 Be careful not to catch your finger when closing the Rack or the front panel.



- Never insert anything other than a disc in the player.
- Never insert an 8-cm CD or with its adapter into the Rack.
- Never insert more than one disc in the groove of the Rack
- When carrying or tilting this unit, remove all discs stored in the Rack.
- Never place anything on the front panel when it is opened.

CONNECTIONS



Making connections

 Connect the output jacks (LINE OUT) of this unit to the input jacks (CD or AUX) of the amplifier by Output cable. Make sure that the white plugs are connected to the left (L) jacks and the red plugs to the right (R) jacks.



- Be sure not to connect this unit to the amplifier's PHONO jacks, as sound will be distorted and normal playback will not be possible.
- 2 Connect the power cord to a household AC wall outlet.
- Make sure plugs are inserted fully into the wall outlet.

NOTE:

Do not connect the power cord to an AC outlet on your amplifier. If you connect the power cord to a "SWITCHED" AC outlet on an amplifier, you will not be able to use this unit's memory function.

CD-Deck synchro function

If you have a Pioneer cassette deck provided with the CD-Deck synchro function, connect the CD-DECK SYNCHRO jacks of the CD player and cassette deck. With this function, synchro recording can be carried out between player and deck.

- For details on connections and operation, refer to the operating instructions supplied with the cassette deck.
- The CD-DECK SYNCHRO cable is not supplied with the CD player.
- When the CD-Deck synchro recording is carried out on several discs, use the program playback function. (Refer to page 15 for details of program playback.)

System remote control with a Pioneer stereo amplifier that has the m mark

When a Pioneer stereo amplifier bearing the mark is used, connect the CONTROL IN jack on the rear panel of the CD player to the CONTROL OUT jack of the amplifier by Control cable. This will enable the CD player to be controlled using the remote control unit supplied with the stereo amplifier. If you do not plan to use this feature, it is not necessary to connect CONTROL IN/OUT jacks.

- The remote control unit supplied with the amplifier can be used to control Play, Stop, Pause, Track/Disc Search and Disc Change operations.
- For instructions regarding connections and operation, refer to the operating instructions provided with your stereo amplifier.

NOTES:

- When a control cable is connected to the player's CONTROL IN jack, direct control of the player with the remote control unit is not possible. Operate the player with the remote control unit by aiming it at the amplifier.
- Be sure to connect both of the control cable's plugs securely to the CONTROL IN and CONTROL OUT jacks. Do not connect only one end of the cable.
- Be sure to turn off the power of the amplifier before connecting the power cord and output cable.

BEFORE OPERATING THE PLAYER





___NOTE

If adjacent discs adhere to each other after they have been inserted, gently touch both sides of each disc with the supplied Electrostatic charge removal sheet.

• Discs may be electrified naturally due to environmental changes. An electrified disc may lead to a malfunction.

BASIC OPERATION



Operations indicated by the [] mark are performed with the remote control unit.



To play a compact disc

III Turn on the power of the player.

Insert discs into the Rack, and close the rack and the front panel.

 Insert discs to be played into the Racks beforehand. (Refer to "BEFORE OPERATING THE PLAYER" on page 9.)

Press 🕨 to start playback.

- The ► indicator in the display window lights.
- Playback starts with the mode indicated in the display window unless the playing mode (page 11) is not specified.
- While the front panel and the Rack are opened, the Rack's number which cannot be opened appears on the display.
 (* R A C K 2 * means Rack 2 cannot be opened.)

NOTES:

- •When "ALL-no" appears on the display, it means no discs are in the player.
- •The Rack which contains the disc being played cannot be opened, and discs cannot be changed in that rack.
- •While the front panel or one of the Racks is opened, the player will not enter the playback mode even if ► or RANDOM is pressed. Be sure to close the Rack and the front panel before pressing ► or RANDOM.
- •While the front panel and the Rack are opened, the search operation for other discs cannot be carried out.

Last disc memory

When **I** is pressed, or the power is turned off, the player memorizes the disc on which playback was stopped. Therefore, playback can be resumed from the last played disc.

In the program playback mode, playback resumes from the first programmed disc.

Last disc memory function can be carried out in ALL, SINGLE, or CUSTOM playback mode.

Last disc memory does not function after random playback.

Changing discs during playback

This unit lets you change up to 75 discs without interrupting playback, but please be aware of the following points.

- Do not press the Rack EJECT (
 button in the following situations.

 When one of the discs in that Rack is playing back.
 - 2. If less than ten seconds has elapsed since the end of disc search or playback.
- You can determine which Racks cannot be opened from the following two displays.

1. PLAY INDICATOR



While the PLAY INDICATOR is blinking: One of the Racks cannot be opened even when its EJECT (\triangle) button is pressed.

The blinking sequence of the PLAY INDICATOR indicates the Rack number which cannot be opened.

Example: When Rack 2 cannot be opened



2. Display window

- When the front panel is opened, the Rack number which cannot be opened is displayed on the front display window.Example: When Rack 2 cannot be opened " RACK 2 " is displayed. If no Rack number is displayed (simply " RACK " is displayed), any Rack can be opened.
- ●Do not press the EJECT (▲) button of the Rack which cannot be opened. If you press it by mistake , <u>push the Rack back to its</u>
- original position. •Do not force a Rack which cannot be opened, otherwise a malfunction will result.

Selecting the playing mode



Press the MODE button on the front panel or remote control unit in stop mode to select the desired mode. Playback starts in the selected mode.

ALL	All of the discs loaded in the Racks of this unit will be played.
SINGLE	Only one disc will be played back.
CUSTOM I	Only the discs registered in CUSTOM I, II or III will be played.
CUSTOM II	For example, assuming that classical music discs
CUSTOM III	are registered in CUSTOM I, rock discs in CUSTOM II and jazz discs in CUSTOM III, when CUSTOM I is set, only the classical music discs will be played in order of the disc numbers.
 For the CUSTOM registration procedure, refer to page 13. 	

Each time the button is pressed, the playing mode changes circularly.



 When the SINGLE mode is selected during playback, the SINGLE mode playback is carried out on the disc being played.

NOTES:

- CUSTOM mode cannot be selected during playback.
- When the power is turned on, the unit enters the last selected mode.

If less than 100 discs are loaded

In the playback mode, this unit does not recognize a disc when the disc is not inserted into the Rack or the disc is placed with the label surface facing the wrong way. In this case, the display (below) will appear for about 3 seconds in the front panel. Once this information is stored in memory, the next disc will be played back in the ALL mode, but no disc will be played back in the SINGLE mode.



Direct search - To search for a particular disc or track (with remote control unit)





NOTE:

If the DISC SET button or the TRACK SET button is not pressed in 5 seconds after the digit buttons are pressed, the display returns to the previous mode.

- When the disc is selected with the digit buttons and the RANDOM button in the SINGLE mode, the single random playback resumes with the specified disc.
- In the CUSTOM mode, only the selected discs are searched for. If discs other than selected discs are searched for in CUSTOM playback mode, **** - no* is displayed for about 3 seconds while the CUSTOM indicator blinks.



The player searches for the specified disc and playback starts from the beginning of that disc.

Press the DISC -/+ button. If a disc is searched for in the stop mode, press \blacktriangleright to resume playback.

- When DISC +, or DISC is kept pressed, the player automatically searches for the disc number upward or downward.
- Pressing " DISC -- " on disc No. 1 searches for disc No. 100.
 Pressing " DISC + "on disc No. 100 searches for disc No. 1.
- The searching speed becomes faster when the button is kept pressed.
- The TIME display changes to the DISC display during search. After the search operation is finished, the display returns to the TIME display.

Track search - To search for a particular track

in playback or pause mode



When $\triangleright \triangleright \rightarrow \bullet \bullet$ on the front panel or $\triangleright \rightarrow \bullet$ on the remote control unit is pressed once, playback advances to the beginning of the next track. When $\triangleright \rightarrow \bullet$ on the remote control unit is kept pressed, playback advances to successive tracks on the disc.

When IIII and the front panel or IIII on the remote control unit is pressed once, playback returns to the beginning of the track being played. If you press once more in succession, playback returns to the beginning of the previous track.

When I and the remote control unit is kept pressed, playback returns to earlier tracks on the disc.

If the track is searched for in the stop mode, press \blacktriangleright . Playback starts from that track.

- Pressing II during search enters the pause mode after the search operation is finished.
- " " indicator blinks while the track is searched.
- If Idea or IDEA is pressed in the pause mode, the player enters the pause mode after the search operation is finished.
- The TIME display changes to the DISC display during search. After the search operation is finished, the display returns to the TIME display.

NOTE:

 Track Search can be carried out from 1st track through 99th track before TOC is read.

Manual search - To search for a particular passage

in playback or pause mode



While **>> >>** is kept pressed, playback rapidly advances toward the end of the disc. When playback reaches the end of the disc, the player enters pause mode and "End" is displayed. While **I <** is kept pressed, playback rapidly reverses toward the beginning of the disc.

 During programmed play, playback starts automatically when you reach the beginning of a track, even if you continue to hold down the I
 button.

If the **>> >>** button is pressed during programmed playback, playback pauses at the position just before the next track.

- While IIII and a start of the TIME display mode, the display changes to the TIME display. When the button is released, the display returns to the DISC/TRACK display.
- Search speed is faster in pause mode than play mode. However, no sound is output during the search.

VARIOUS OPERATIONS



To play only the desired discs (CUSTOM playback)

All discs (1 \sim 100) can be divided into 3 CUSTOM modes as your preference. Discs can be selected and stored in memory by music type or artists, etc.

Example: enter disc No. 3 and No. 12 into CUSTOM II.

In the stop mode, press the MODE button so that the CUSTOM II indicator lights.

If some disc number appears, press CLEAR on the front panel.

2 Select disc No. 3 with the digit button on the remote control unit.

- When the disc is selected with the DISC -/+ buttons, the disc number is entered automatically in about 2 seconds.
- If the selected disc is not inserted in the Rack, "*** no" appears on the display.

Press the DISC SET button on the remote control unit. The indicators of CUSTOM II and disc number blink once.

To enter disc No. 12, repeat steps 2 and 3.

Up to 100 discs can be entered into one CUSTOM. Discs can be added even after the entry is completed.

▶ Press ► or RANDOM.

Playback starts from the lowest disc number in the CUSTOM. If RANDOM is pressed, the random playback starts with the selected disc.

To check the entered disc number:

In stop mode, press TIME so that the TOTAL indicator lights and then press DISC +. Each time the button is pressed, entered disc numbers appear on the display. When all discs in one CUSTOM are checked, (A) appears on the display.

To clear all discs of each CUSTOM:

Press MODE to display the number of the CUSTOM you want to erase and press CLEAR on the front panel.



NOTE:

Re-CUSTOM programming cannot be modified.

- During CUSTOM playback, the DISC -/+ buttons only move between discs within that custom.
- During CUSTOM playback, when the disc other than the stored disc into CUSTOM is selected with the digit buttons and DISC SET, ****-no*is displayed for about 3 seconds, and the CUSTOM indicator blinks.
- When the power is turned off, discs stored in the CUSTOM cannot be cleared.
- When the selected disc is not in the player, "*** no" is displayed for about 3 seconds. The selected disc is erased from the memory, and the next disc is searched for.
- You cannot change the discs stored in a CUSTOM. Nor can you removing just one disc from a CUSTOM.

VARIOUS OPERATIONS



Each time the REPEAT button on the remote control unit is pressed, the repeat mode changes circularly. (one track repeat \rightarrow ALL repeat \rightarrow OFF)

To repeatedly play the displayed track, press REPEAT on the remote control unit so that the REPEAT \blacktriangleright 1 indicator lights. REPEAT can be pressed in any playback mode (normal, random, or program).

To repeatedly play all tracks on all of the discs in normal playback mode or in the specified playback mode (Single playback, Custom playback or Program playback), press REPEAT so that the REPEAT indicator and each repeat mode indicator (ALL, SINGLE, CUSTOM, or PGM) light.

- To exit repeat mode, press REPEAT so that the REPEAT
 1 or REPEAT indicator goes off.
- To cancel the repeat playback mode, press during repeat playback.

Random playback - To play all tracks in random order



The RANDOM indicator lights and random playback starts in the specified playback mode.

ALL	One track on each disc is played in a random order. When a totał of 100 tracks are played back, playback automatically stops. If less than 100 discs are inserted in the player, random playback continues until 100 tracks are played back.	
SINGLE	All tracks on one disc are played in a random order. When all tracks are finished playing, playback stops.	
	One track on each selected disc is played in a randor order. When a total of 100 tracks are played back playback automatically stops. If there are less tha 100 discs in the selected custom, random playbac continues until 100 tracks are played back.	

To exit the random playback mode:

Select a disc other than the disc being played by pressing one of the digit buttons on the remote control unit or DISC -/+.

 If other mode is selected in random playback mode, random playback will start with the selected mode. If the Rack is opened in random playback mode, discs in the opened rack may be played again. When the PGM button is pressed in random playback mode, random playback is cancelled and the player enters program mode.

NOTE:

During random playback, the CUSTOM mode cannot be selected with the MODE button.

- If RANDOM is pressed in the random playback mode, another track is selected in random order.
- If RANDOM is pressed while programming, the programmed contents are cleared, and random playback starts in ALL mode.
- If the player is not fully loaded with discs in ALL mode or CUSTOM mode, the same track may be selected and played twice.

ADLC (Automatic Digital Level Controller)



When the difference of recording level between discs is noticeable, the volume level should be adjusted for each disc, especially during program playback or random playback when tracks are selected between 2 discs or more. In such cases, pressing ADLC automatically sets the output level to the proper level. When ADLC is turned on, the ADLC indicator lights.

- To turn off ADLC, press ADLC so that the ADLC indicator goes off.
- With some selections, sound becomes unnatural. In such cases, turn off ADLC.

Time display

During playback, pressing TIME on the front panel changes the time display in the following sequence: (A) DISC/TRACK (disc number and track number being played) \rightarrow (B) TIME (elapsed playback time of the track being played) \rightarrow (C) TOTAL (Displays the total playback time of each disc)

- In the stop mode, (A) shows the disc number stored in the Last disc memory, (B) does not show the elapsed playback time of the track being played, and (C) does not show the total playback time of each disc.
- The TOTAL time display in the program mode shows the total programmed steps.
- The TOTAL time display in the CUSTOM mode shows the disc number stored in CUSTOM (only in stop mode). While the display appears, stored disc numbers into CUSTOM can be confirmed by pressing DISC -/+.
- The TOTAL time display © during playback will disappear in about 5 seconds.



TO PLAY ONLY DESIRED TRACKS/DISCS



Disc all program

This operation can only be performed in stop mode. If only disc No. is entered, and "AL" appears on the display, all tracks on the disc can be programmed.

- Disc all program mode is cancelled when the track number is entered.
- Disc all programming cannot be carried out during playback.

Direct program

• Press the PGM button during normal playback.

During normal playback, the track being played can be programmed. 1. Press PGM to enter the program mode.

- 2 If you wish to program the track currently playing, press PGM while the track is playing.
- Direct programming is not possible during program playback.

Program playback - To program tracks/discs in desired order

You can perform this operation in either stop or playback mode. However, I← and ►►I cannot be used to select tracks during playback. Be sure to select stop or playback mode before programming. • Pressing ► when the program indicator is lit starts program

Pressing ► when the program indicator is in starts program playback in the programmed order.

Press PGM on the remote control unit.

• The PGM indicator lights.

Select the disc number which contains the track to be programmed with the digit buttons, and then press the DISC SET button.

To program entire discs, enter the desired disc numbers with the digit buttons and DISC SET, and then go to step 4. Make sure that the player is in stop mode for Disc programming.

- When the DISC SET button is pressed, "AL" (all tracks) appears on the display.
- When the disc number is programmed, the PGM indicator, the disc No. and the track No. blink.
- Only in stop mode, you can use the DISC -/+ buttons. After selecting the disc No., press DISC SET.

Enter the track No. to be programmed with the digit buttons and then press the TRACK SET button.

Only in stop mode, you can use I → or → I. After selecting the track No., press TRACK SET.

• When the track number is programmed, the PGM indicator, the disc No. and the track No. blink.

Repeat steps 2 and 3 to program other tracks.

5 Press 🕨 .

The tracks are played in the programmed order.

NOTE:

To stop Program playback, press ■.

- Programs containing up to 32 steps can be created.
- The program contents will not be erased even if the power is turned off.
- When DISC -/+ is pressed in the program playback mode, the program mode is cancelled, and the program contents are cleared. The player searches for the disc in ALL mode.
- When the programmed disc cannot be detected in program playback mode, or the programmed track cannot be detected after the TOC is read, that programmed step is cancelled. "*** - no" is displayed for about 3 seconds, and the next step is played back.

To reserve the program

• Press the PGM button during normal playback. The unit enters program mode and you can program while the song is playing back.Program play starts when either the current track finishes playback or ► is pressed. Pressing ► when the

program indicator is lit also starts program playback.

Programming a pause

Inserting a pause in your program can be very useful when carrying out recording. Press II instead of entering a track number. "PAUSE" appears in the display window.

• For example, when recording on both sides of a cassette tape, if you program a pause after the last track to be recorded on the first side, program playback will pause at that point to allow you to switch tape sides. To resume program playback after the player enters pause mode, press **II**.

NOTES:

- A pause can be programmed only when the program procedure is performed under stop mode.
- A pause cannot be programmed at the beginning of a program (P-01), nor can two pauses be programmed one after the other.
- A pause inserted in a program is counted as one step.



In the program mode, press CLEAR.

The last program step is erased and the contents of the previous program step are displayed (for 5 seconds during playback).

NOTE:

Tracks preceding the currently playing track cannot be erased during program playback.



- 1. Play the program by pressing
- Press either ►► ►► on the front panel or ►►I on the remote control unit. The programmed disc and track numbers are displayed and that program is played back. In the second programming step or beyond, the previous step can be confirmed by pressing the I=
 Image: the transformation of the main unit or the I=
 Image: button of the main unit or the I=
 - When an entire disc is programmed. For example, if all the tracks on disc number 8 have been programmed, "8-01" is displayed, not "8-AL".

To clear all of the program contents and to cancel the program mode

You can clear all of the program contents and cancel the program mode by any of the following methods.



In the program mode, select the other mode.







Open the Rack. The programmed contents of discs in the Rack are cleared.(The program mode is not canceled.)



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TROUBLESHOOTING

Incorrect operations are often mistaken for trouble and malfunctions. If you think that there is something wrong with this component, check the points below. Sometimes the trouble may lie in another component. Investigate the other components and electrical appliances being used.

If the trouble cannot be rectified even after exercising the checks listed below, ask your nearest PIONEER authorized service center or your dealer to carry out repair work.
