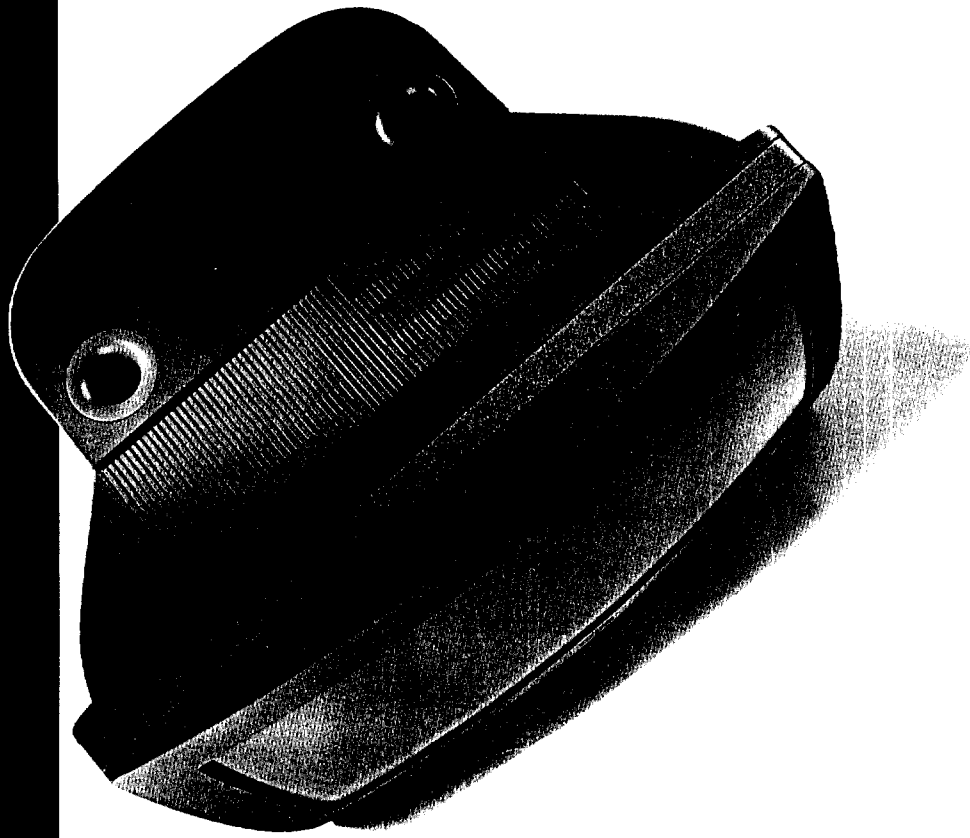

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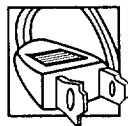

To prevent electric shock, match wide blade of plug to wide slot, fully insert.

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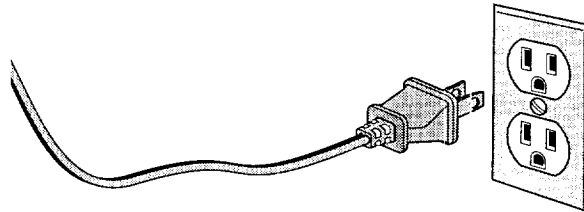
The steps below will get your TV connected and ready for watching.

1. Hook up your TV.

Hook up any antennas or cable to your TV before you follow the steps below. *Details are in the Connections Section starting on page 40.*

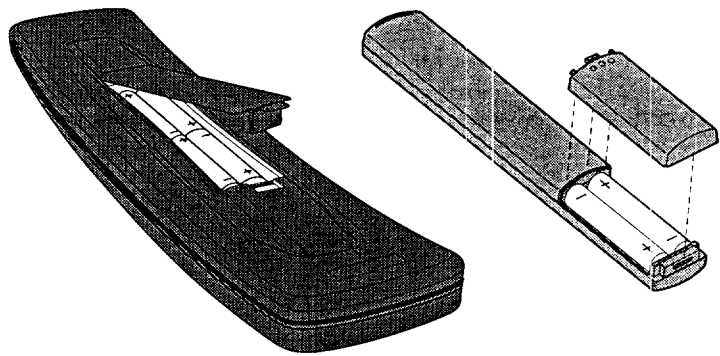
2. Plug in the TV.

Plug the cord into the outlet, matching the wide and the small end of the plug with the outlet.



3. Put Batteries in the Remote.

- A. Pull off the cover of the battery compartment.
- B. Place the six AAA batteries as shown, matching the + and - end of each battery in each compartment.
- C. Replace the cover.



4. Turn on the TV.

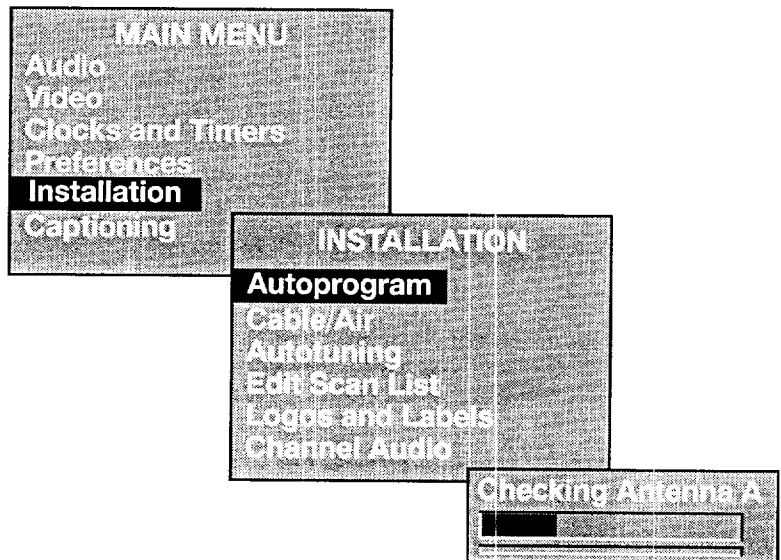
Press TV on the Master Remote.

OR

Press POWER on the TV or the small remote.

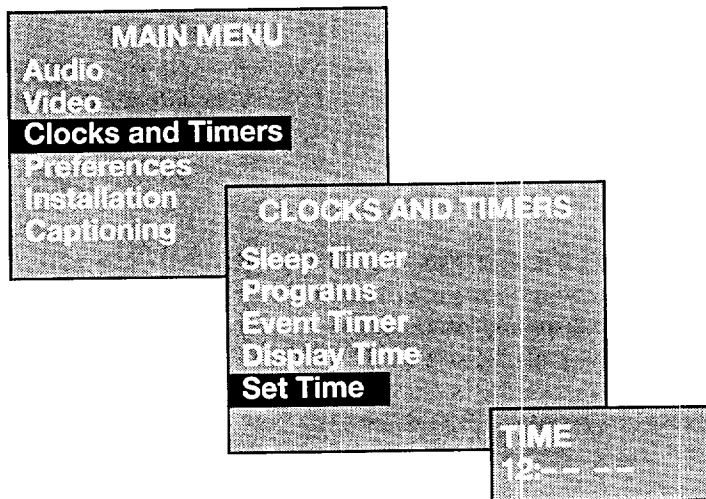
5. Place channels in channel scan list (Autoprogram).

- A. Hook up an antenna or cable before you begin these steps or you will not be able to add channels to the channel scan list.
- B. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- C. Press MENU to bring up the main menu.
- D. Highlight Installation using the up and down arrows on the remote. These arrows are also shown on the screen.
- E. Press 8 to select the Installation menu.
- F. Highlight Autoprogram.
- G. Press 8 to select Autoprogram and start the TV adding channels to the channel scan list.
- H. Wait until the TV has finished adding channels by checking the antennas. The TV will then tune to the lowest channel found.



6. Set the Time.

- A. Press MENU to bring up the Main Menu.
- B. Highlight Clocks and Timers using the remote's up and down arrows.
- C. Select Clocks and Timers to enter the Clocks and Timers menu.
- D. Highlight and Select Set Time.
- E. Enter the Time using the number buttons and by following the menus on the screen.

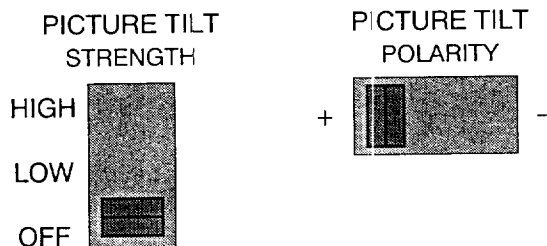


7. Adjust PICTURE TILT.

Picture tilt is used to correct a tilted picture from the effect of the Earth's magnetic field on a large picture tube. The PICTURE TILT STRENGTH and POLARITY switches on the back of the TV compensate for this effect. If the picture appears tilted, follow these steps to improve it.

- 1. Make sure STRENGTH switch is in the OFF position.
- 2. Move STRENGTH switch to the LOW position. If this does not fully improve tilt, move STRENGTH switch to HIGH. This should correct tilt. If moving STRENGTH switch makes tilt worse, return it to OFF and go to the next step.
- 3. Change the position of POLARITY switch. If this improves the tilt but does not fully improve it, move the STRENGTH switch to LOW or HIGH. This should correct tilt.

You may need to reset the switches if the TV is moved or repositioned in the room.



Tour of the Remote

1. Component Buttons

Pressing these buttons allow you to control components such as a VCR, laserdisc player, cable box, or audio equipment. You must press one of these buttons to control the component.

2. Wide Screen Features

These six buttons adjust the picture on your screen. The drawings on the remote buttons show how your picture will change when you press the button. A second press of CINEMA, SPLIT SCREEN, POP or PIP brings up a controls menu.

3. Channel and Sound Controls

You can control the sound and channels on your TV with these buttons.

4. Menu Navigation Buttons

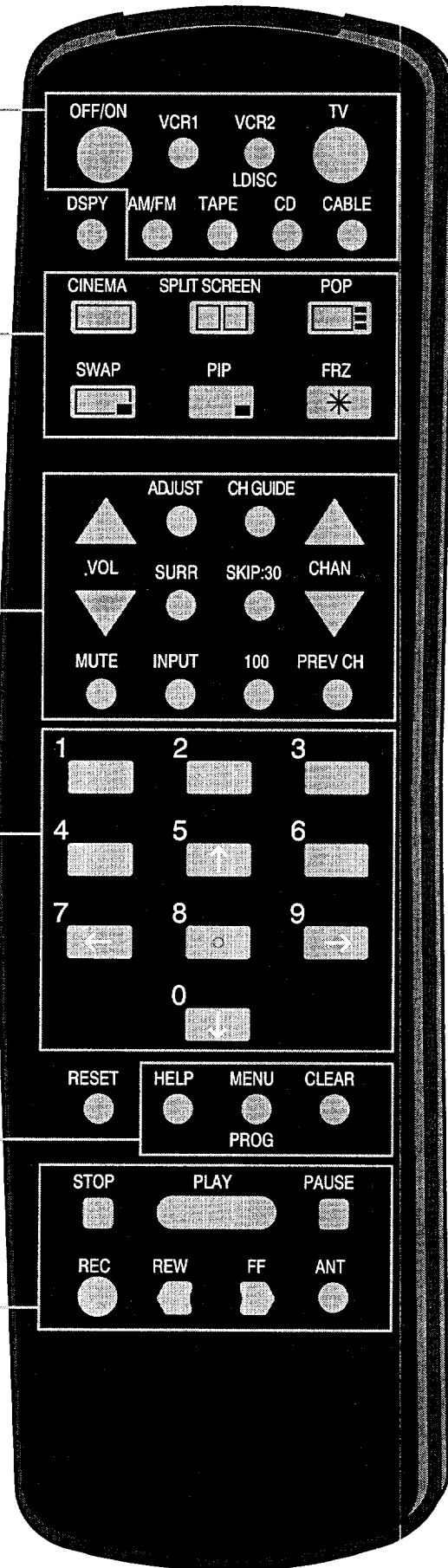
These buttons will appear on the screen with the menus. Use these to move through the menus.

5. Menu and Help Buttons

Use these buttons to adjust the TV's menus and features.

6. VCR, Laserdisc Player and Audio Equipment Buttons

Use these buttons to control the playback of tapes and discs.



Tour of the Menu System

You can use the Menu system to adjust the sound and picture, set the time and timers, setup scan lists, and adjust closed captioning.

In the Menu system, a set of navigation buttons are shown on the screen to help you move through the menus using the Master Remote. These buttons are shown at the right.

Using the Menu System.

A. Press MENU to bring up the menu system.

B. Use the navigation buttons shown at the right to adjust and change the features in the menu.

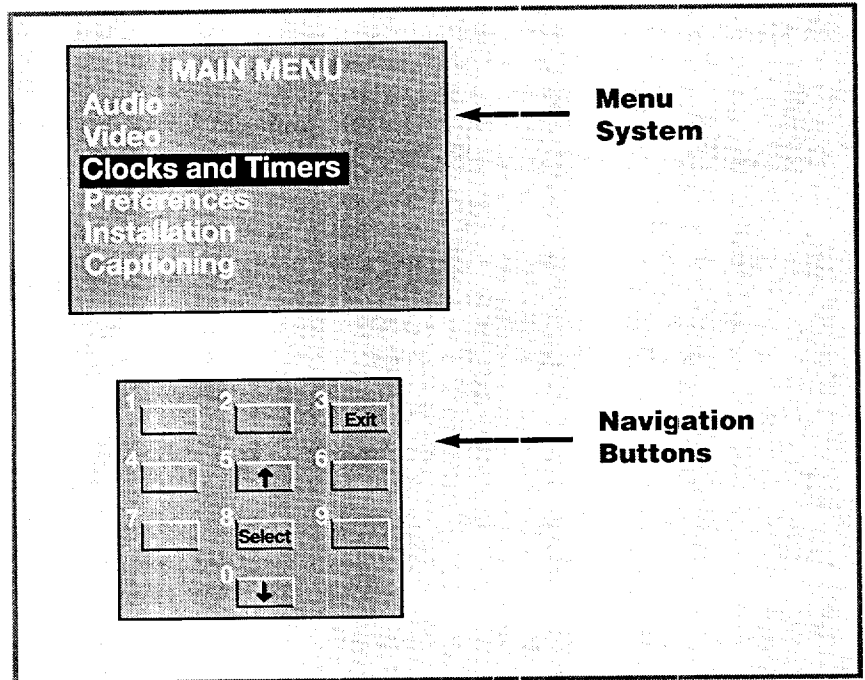
C. The SELECT (8) button is used to select entries. In some cases, this brings up another menu.

For example, when you select Clocks and Timers in the main menu, the Clocks and Timers menu appears on the screen.

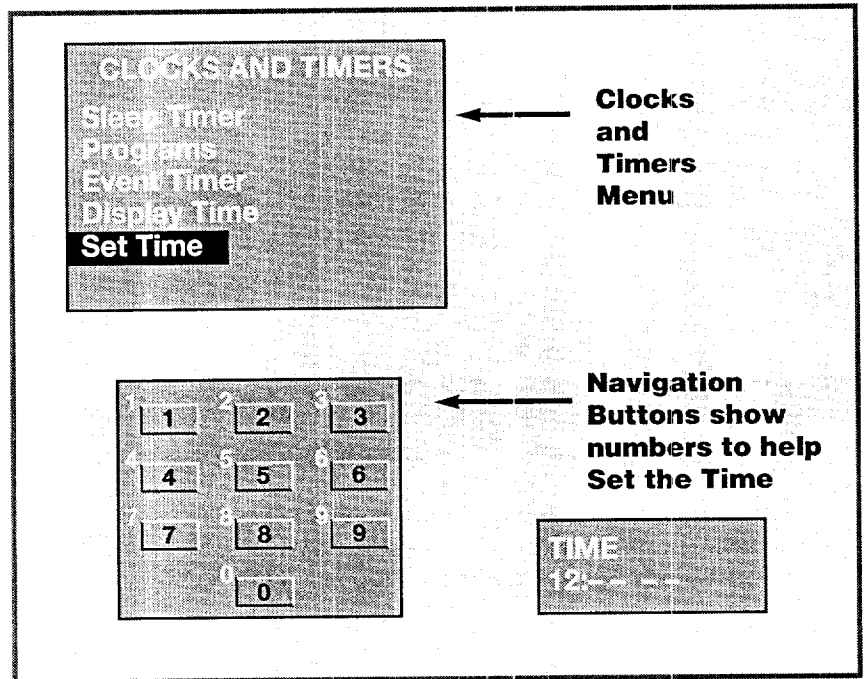
D. The navigation buttons will change for different menu items. For example, when setting the time, the numbers appear on the buttons to help you enter the time.

E. Refer to the navigation buttons for information on entering or adjusting menu items.

Tour of the Help System

The Help system provides a basic guide for the TV's special features.

Use Help for a quick tour or for basic information about the remote, menus and wide screen features. The Help system also provides a glossary to define buttons, words, or features.

Using the Help System.

- A. Press HELP on the remote to bring up the Help system.
- B. Select one of the Help features using the number buttons.
- C. To exit press HELP until the menu is removed from the screen.

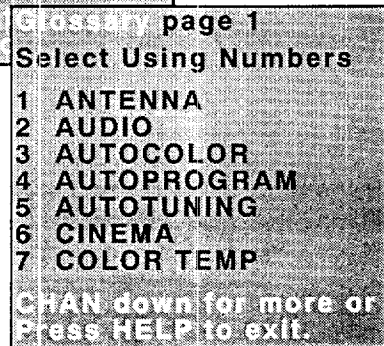
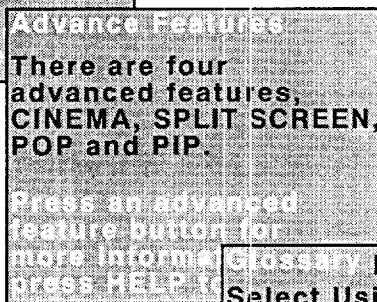
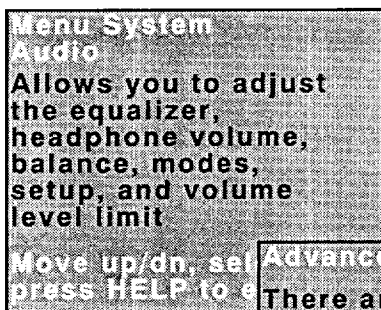
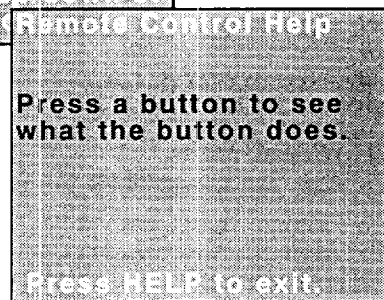
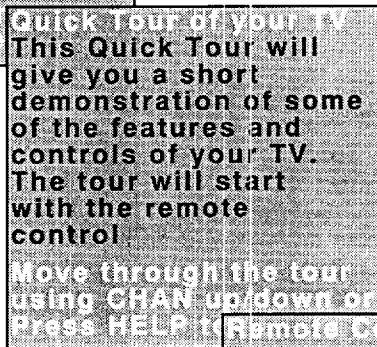
1. Quick Tour - Overview of the remote and menu system and a brief demonstration of a wide screen feature. Use CHANNEL up and down to move through the Quick Tour.

2. Remote Control - Explanation of the remote buttons. A remote will appear on the screen with this section. The button pressed will be highlighted on the screen and explained in the Help menu.

3. Menu System - Explanation of items in the menus. The item highlighted with a black box will be explained in the help box. Press the up and down arrows to move up and down the menu. Press 8 to select a menu item.

4. Advanced Features - Overview of CINEMA, SPLIT SCREEN, POP, and PIP. Press one of these buttons to see its function. A second press of one of the buttons brings up a Controls menu. When this appears, press the number buttons to see how each will adjust the wide screen feature.

5. Glossary - Definitions of buttons, words, or special features. Use CHANNEL up and down to see three screens of words. They are arranged in alphabetical order. Press the number before each word for the definition.



Master Remote Buttons

POWER BUTTONS

OFF/ON

Turns off the TV.

Turns on a component after a component button is pressed. For example; VCR, LDISC, AM/FM or CABLE.

Turns off components except audio equipment.

Turns off compatible VCRs.

TV

Turns on the TV.

Shows displays on the TV screen.

Places the remote in the TV mode. The remote is now set to control the TV.

VCR1, VCR2/LDISC, TV, AM/FM, TAPE, CD, CABLE

Sets the remote to control the component of the pressed button. For example, when VCR1 is pressed the remote is set to control the VCR.

WIDE SCREEN BUTTONS

CINEMA

The first press places the TV picture in the wide screen mode.

A second press brings up the CINEMA controls menu.

POP

(Picture-outside-picture)

The first press shows several small pictures to the right of the main picture.

A second press brings up the POP controls menu

SPLIT SCREEN

The first press splits the TV screen in half with two different channels on the screen.

A second press brings up the SPLIT SCREEN controls menu.

SWAP

Switches two pictures on the screen. Use this after you have pressed PIP, POP, or SPLIT SCREEN.

PIP

(Picture-in-picture)

The first press turns on picture-in-picture.

A second press brings up the PIP controls menu.

FRZ (Freeze)

Freezes the motion on the main picture when watching TV.

Freezes the motion in the small picture when using PIP or SPLIT SCREEN.

ADJUST

In CINEMA, PIP, POP, and SPLIT SCREEN, ADJUST has a different function. Turn on one of these features to see how it works.



Master Remote Buttons

TV BUTTONS

CH GUIDE

(Channel Guide)

Displays 9 snapshots of channels on the screen.

Press a number, 1-9, to select the channel you want to watch.

Press 0 to display the next set of 9 channel numbers on the screen.

Press CLEAR or TV to clear Channel Guide from the screen.

SURR

(Surround Sound)

Toggles between all eight audio modes.

DSPY (Display)

Shows TV status on the screen.

Clears menus from the screen.

SKIP:30

(Commercial Skip)

Allows you to scan other channels during a station's commercial break.

Each press adds more time to the timer.

The TV will switch back to the original channel after the time runs out.

Press CLEAR to clear the timer.

Also scans forward tapes in some VCRs.

VOL ▲ and ▼

(Volume up and down)

VOL▲ raises the sound level.

VOL ▼ lowers the sound level.

CHAN ▲ and ▼

(Channel up and down)

Moves up and down through channels in the TV's channel scan list.

Moves up and down through the channels in the VCR, Cable Box or Audio equipments memory.

MUTE

Turns the TV sound off and on.

PREV CH

(Previous Channel)

Changes back and forth between two channels.

Select a channel with the number buttons, then select another. Now, press PREV CH to switch between the two channels.

100

Selects channels over 99.

For example, to select channel 125, press 100, 2, and 5.

Number Buttons (0-9)

Selects any channel number.

Two numbers must be pressed for each channel. For example, press 0 and 6 for channel 6.

RESET

Returns select audio and video adjustments to their original settings.



Master Remote Buttons

MENU BUTTONS

HELP

Brings the Help System to the screen.
Exits the Help system when it is on the screen.

MENU/PROG

Brings the menu system to the screen
Sets the VCRs clock and timer programs.
Displays the Laserdisc player program menu on the screen.

CLEAR

Clears menus and displays from the screen.
Erases entries within menus.
Turns off the Channel Guide.
Exits the TV's Help system.
Clears commercial skip.
Clears items from VCR timer programs and clock when remote is set to control the VCR.

Number Buttons (0-9)

When the menu system appear on the screen, these buttons are used to navigate and select items in the menus.
Used to enter time and other numbers in certain menu features.

COMPONENT BUTTONS

INPUT

Brings up a menu that allows you to switch between the Antennas, Video inputs, and High Resolution inputs of the TV's monitor panel.

STOP

Stops tape, CD or laserdisc.

PLAY

Plays tape, CD or laserdisc.

PAUSE

Pauses tape, CD, or laserdisc.

REC (Record)

Starts recording onto a tape.

REW (Rewind)

Rewinds a tape.
Scans backward while a tape, CD, or laserdisc is playing.

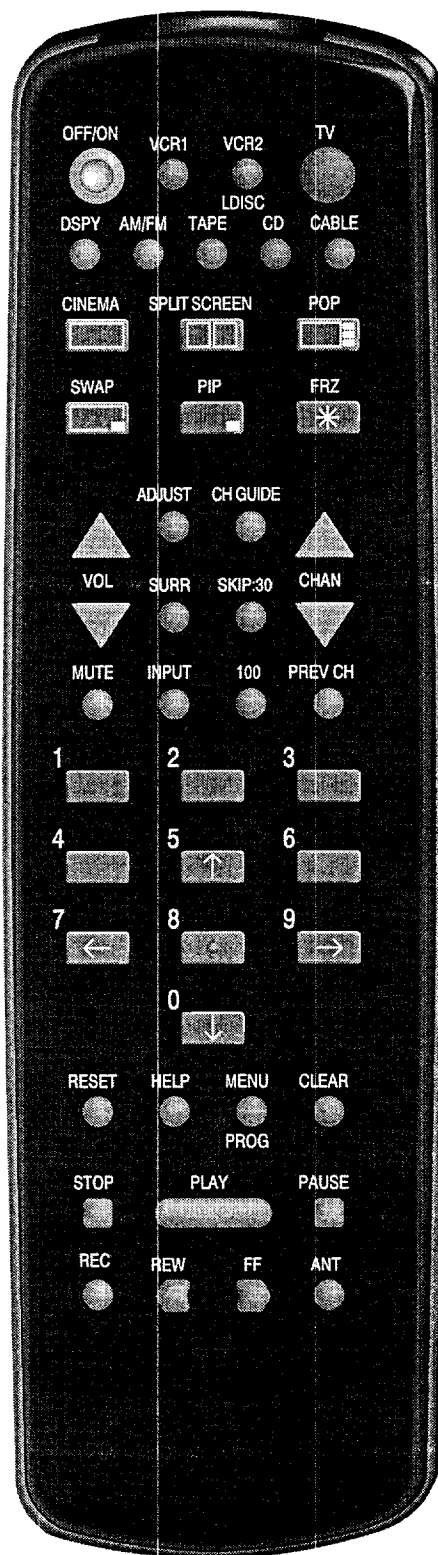
FF (Fast Forward)

Fast forwards a tape.
Scans forward while tape, CD or laserdisc is playing.

ANT (Antenna)

In TV mode, ANT toggles between the TV's ANT A and ANT B.

In VCR mode, ANT serves as a TV/VCR button.



Simplified Remote

The small remote can be used to adjust basic TV features and functions.

It functions differently in the menu system than the larger remote.

A picture of the remote is shown on the screen to help guide you through the menus. Notice the arrows on the buttons of the on screen remote. These arrows show you how to move through the menus. For example, the volume buttons are shown as left and right arrows because they move left and right on menu lines.

If the small remote is not shown on the screen with certain menus, the large remote must be used to change feature settings.

POWER

Turns the TV on or off.

CH ▲/▼

(Channel up and down.)

Moves up and down the menus.

VOL + and - (Volume up and down)

Moves left and right on the menu lines and selects choices.

Raises and lowers sound.

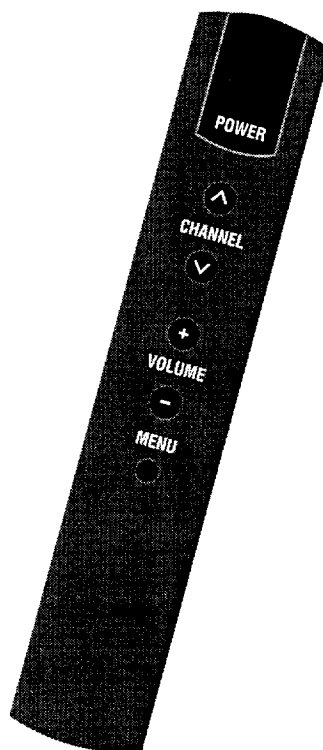
Selects highlighted items in the menus.

MENU

Brings the main menu to the screen.

Exits menus.

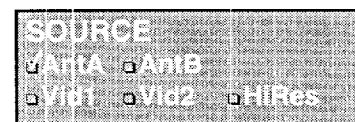
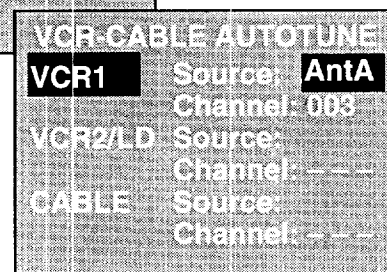
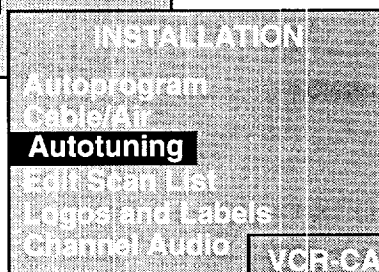
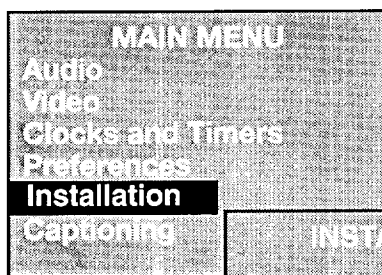
Autotuning for the VCR or Cable Box

The Autotuning feature works with VCR1, VCR2/LDISC, and CABLE on the remote. If Autotuning has been set, pressing the remote's VCR1, VCR2/LDISC, and CABLE buttons will tune to the TV channel to see the picture from the component. It will also select the input you used to connect the component to the TV.

For example, if your VCR is connected as shown on pages 45-46, select VID1 because the VCR is connected to the TV through the Video1 inputs. Use VID2 for the Video2 inputs and use HiRes for the High Resolution inputs.

Set up Autotuning

- A. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- B. Press MENU to bring up the Main menu on the screen.
- C. Highlight Installation using the remote's up and down arrows.
- D. Press 8 to select Installation.
- E. Highlight Autotuning using the remote's up and down arrows.
- F. Press 8 to select Autotuning.
- G. Use the up and down arrows to highlight VCR1, VCR2/LD or CABLE. Press 8 to select.
- H. Select the input you used to connect your component; either ANT A, ANT B, VID1, VID2, or HiRES.
- I. If you selected ANT A or ANT B, use the down arrow to highlight the channel number. Press 8 to select.
- J. Enter the output channel number of the VCR or cable box. For the VCR, it should be set to the position of the CH3/CH4 switch. For cable boxes, the channels are usually 2, 3 or 4. If you selected VID1, VID2, or HiRES, you will not need to enter a channel number.
- K. Press 3 to exit.



Programming the Remote for a VCR

Refer to pages 44-46 or the VCR's owners manual to hook up your VCRs.

The remote may need to be programmed for your VCR. Use the codes below or on the sheet packed in with your remote.

Test the remote.

- A. Press VCR1 or VCR2 to turn the VCR on.
- B. Press the VCR buttons shown on the bottom of the next page. If your VCR does not work, program it with a VCR code from the list below.

Program the remote for your VCRs.

- A. Point the remote at the VCR. Press and hold VCR1 or VCR2.
- B. Enter the code for your brand from the code list below.
- C. Release VCR1 or VCR2.
- D. Press OFF/ON. Some VCRs work differently, so if nothing happens, try pressing VCR1 and the OFF/ON button.
- E. Repeat A-D with another code if the first one does not work.
- F. Repeat sequence for a second VCR.

Using the Remote with VCRs

If the remote operates your VCR, this page and the next will show you how to use it for basic functions.

Turn on the VCR.

- A. Press VCR1 or VCR2 to set the remote to control the VCR.
- B. Press OFF/ON to turn on the VCR if it did not turn on when you pressed VCR1 or VCR2.

Turn off the VCR.

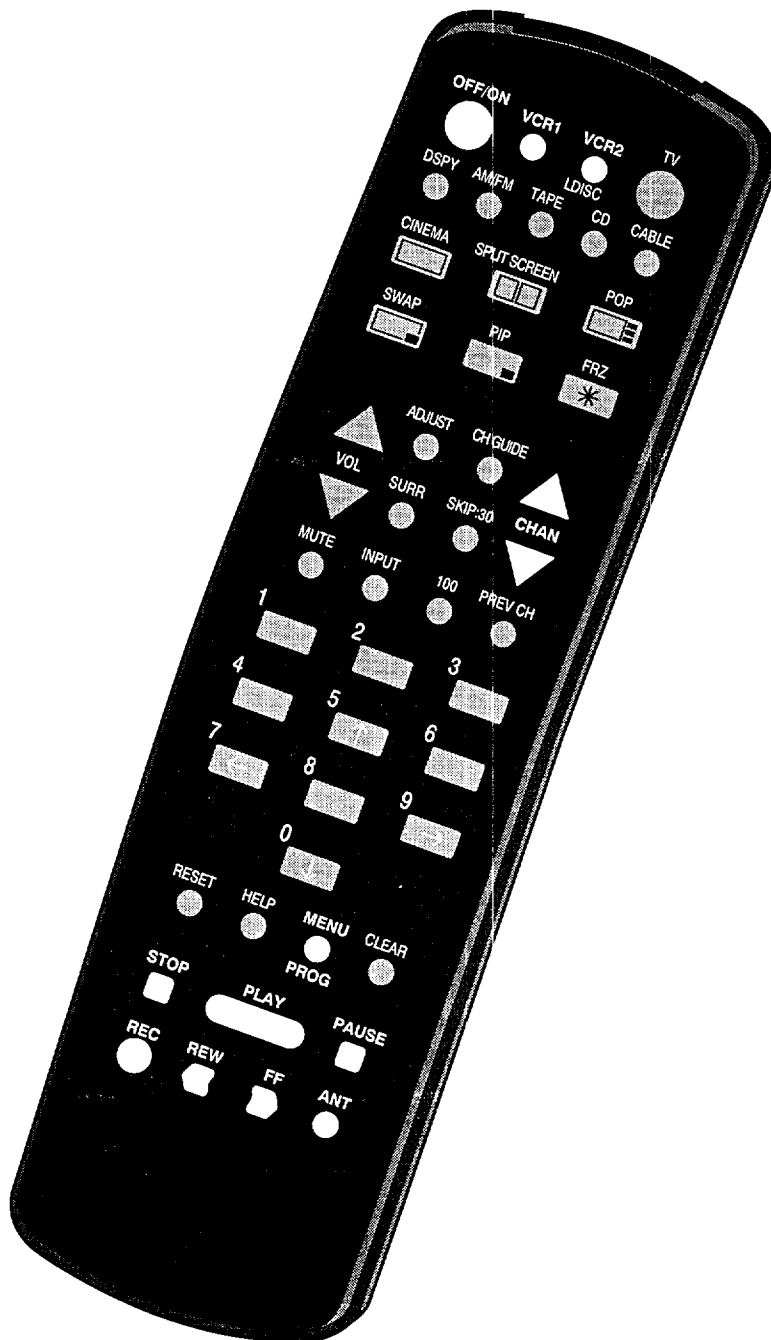
- A. Press VCR1 or VCR2 to set the remote to control the VCR.
- B. Press OFF/ON.

Watch a tape in your VCR.

- A. Turn on VCR.
- B. Insert a tape in the VCR.
- C. Press PLAY to start the tape.
- D. Press STOP when you are finished.
- E. Press REW to rewind the tape.

Record one TV program and watch another.

- A. Press VCR1 or VCR2 to set the remote to control the VCR.
- B. Tune the VCR to the channel you want to record using CHANNEL up and down or pressing two number buttons.
- C. Press REC (Record) to start recording.
- D. Press TV/VCR on the VCR. You may be able to use the remote's ANT button instead of the VCR's TV/VCR button.
- E. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- F. Press CHANNEL up or down to change channels on the TV.
- G. To see the channel you are recording, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (same as the CH3/4 switch on the VCR). Pressing VCR1 or VCR2 may do the same thing if the Autotune feature has been set as shown on page 11.



Using the Remote with a Cable Box or Laserdisc Player

Program the remote for your cable box.

Refer to pages 42-44 or contact your cable company to hook up your cable box. If you have a cable box with its own remote, then you may also be able to use the TV's remote with your cable box. Use the codes below or on the sheet packed with your remote.

- Point the remote at the cable box and press and hold CABLE.
- Enter the code numbers for your brand from the list below.
- Release CABLE.
- Press OFF/ON to turn it on. If nothing happens, try pressing CABLE and then OFF/ON.
- Repeat A-D with another code if the first one does not work.



Turn on the Cable Box.

- Tune TV to channel you have selected in the autotune feature. See page 11.
- Point remote at the cable box and press CABLE.
- Press OFF/ON to turn it on.
- Press CHANNEL up or down to change channels on the cable box.

Turn off the Cable Box.

- Press CABLE.
- Press OFF/ON to turn it off.

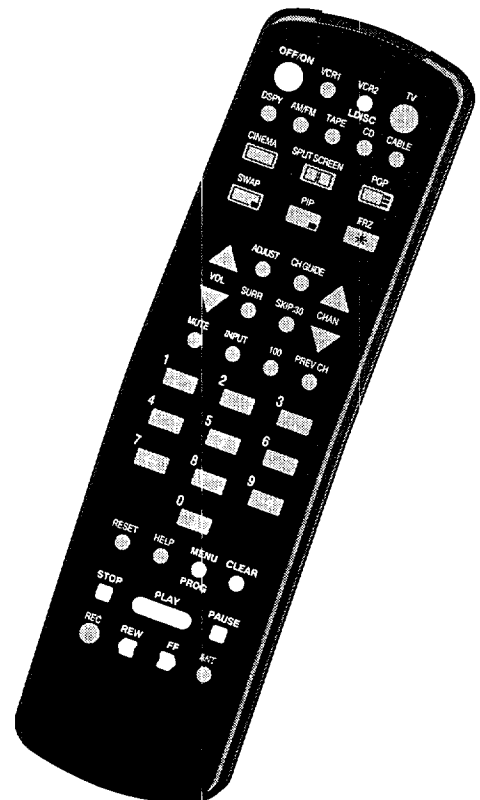

Laserdisc Player Operation

The TV's remote may be able to operate basic functions of some laserdisc players. Use the buttons at the right to see if your laserdisc player is compatible.

- Point the remote at the Laserdisc player and press LDISC.
- Press OFF/ON to turn it on.
- Use the buttons on the remote that relate to laserdisc player functions shown at the right. Not all buttons highlighted may work with your laserdisc player.
- Press OFF/ON to turn it off.



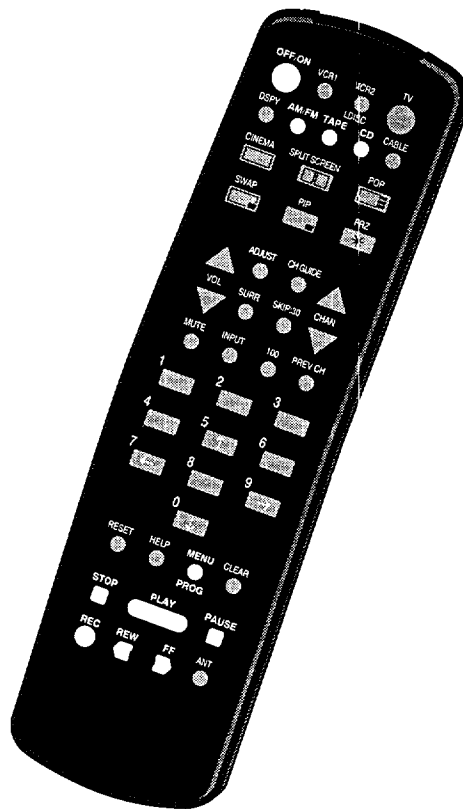
Using the Remote with a Cassette Tape Player, CD Player and AM/FM Tuner

Refer to pages 48-50 or your Audio equipment owner's manual to hook up your equipment. Your remote controls some audio equipment such as a radio (AM/FM tuner), CD player, tape player or amplifier. The remote may need to be programmed for your equipment. Use the codes below or on the sheet packed with your remote.

Program the remote for audio equipment.

Because the list of brand names is continually growing, the information sheet packed with your remote control will be the most recent of this list and may contain additional brands and code numbers.

- Point the remote at the audio equipment and press and hold AM/FM, CD, or TAPE, whichever component you are trying to program.
- Enter the code from the code list.
- Release the remote button you are programming
- Press OFF/ON to turn it on. If nothing happens, try pressing the same remote button again and then OFF/ON.
- Repeat A-D with another code if the first one does not work.



Basic Operation

- Point the remote at the audio equipment and press and hold AM/FM, CD, or TAPE, whichever component you are trying to program.
- Press OFF/ON to turn it on.
- Use the buttons on the remote that relate to audio functions shown at the right. Not all buttons highlighted may work with your equipment.
- Turn the audio equipment off using the audio component's power off button.

Watching the CINEMA Mode

Viewing Standard 4x3 Broadcasts

Standard television is broadcast in a 4x3 aspect ratio, which is 4 units wide by 3 units high. Your TV has a wide 16x9 aspect ratio, 16 units wide by 9 units high. Because of this, standard television broadcasts will appear on your TV with black bars on the left and right sides of the screen, as shown at the right.

When watching standard 4x3 broadcasts, there are three ways to fill the TV's 16x9 screen:

1. Use the Cinema Controls *shown below*.
2. Use the Split Screen feature *shown on page 18*.
3. Use the Picture-Outside-Picture feature *shown on page 19*.

Standard 4x3 Format



Using Cinema Controls

You may wish to fill the screen using Cinema A. Cinema B and C are not recommended for use with standard 4x3 broadcasts.

- A. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- B. Press CINEMA. The first time you press CINEMA, the picture will expand to the Cinema A position or to Cinema option previously selected. Press CINEMA again to bring up the Cinema Controls menu.
- C. Press 4 to select Cinema A. This will not distort the original proportions of the picture, but a small portion of the top and bottom of the standard 4x3 broadcast will be cropped. You can use the Pan function below to vertically reposition the image.

Cinema Mode 16x9 Format



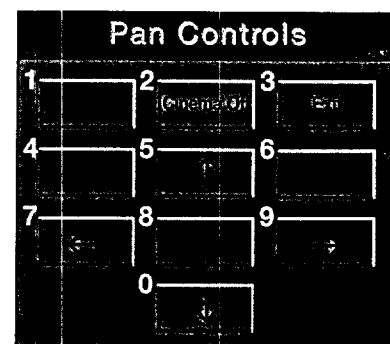
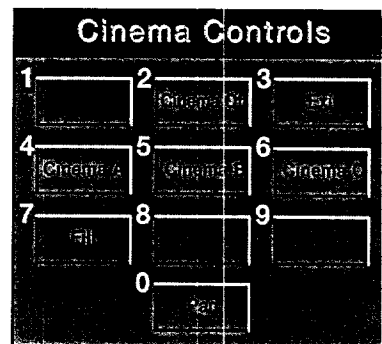
Adjusting Cinema

Press the ADJUST button to cycle through all 5 viewing options: Cinema Off, Cinema A, Cinema B, Cinema C and Fill. Use the one that works best for the program you are using.

With the Cinema Controls Menu, use the two options below to adjust the picture for the Cinema Mode.

Fill: Fills the screen by expanding the picture in the horizontal direction only. This does not cut off any portion of the picture, but causes both standard 4x3 broadcasts and letterboxed material to appear stretched across the screen. Primarily intended for use with "squeezed" video sources such as some 16x9 camcorders. Other sources of squeezed video could become available in the future.

Pan: Brings up the Pan Controls Menu (shown at the right) which enables you to pan around the screen to watch those areas of the picture that may have been cut off by using Cinema A, B, or C. Reposition the image to suit your viewing preferences. For example, use the pan menu to allow room for subtitles when watching a foreign film.



Watching the CINEMA Mode

Letterbox

Widescreen letterbox movies show the original theatre screen dimensions with black bars at the top and bottom of the picture. The size of the bars varies from movie to movie. Your TV is ideal for watching letterbox movies because you can use the Cinema Controls to expand the letterboxed image, fill the screen and reduce or eliminate letterbox bars.

CINEMA A,B and C are three modes of expansion for filling the 16x9 screen. In these modes, the picture is expanded both horizontally and vertically to maintain the original proportions.

Viewing Letterboxed Movies

- A. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- B. Press CINEMA. The first time you press CINEMA, the picture will expand to the Cinema A mode or whichever mode was previously selected. Press CINEMA a second time to bring up the Cinema Controls menu.
- C. Select Cinema A, Cinema B, or Cinema C.

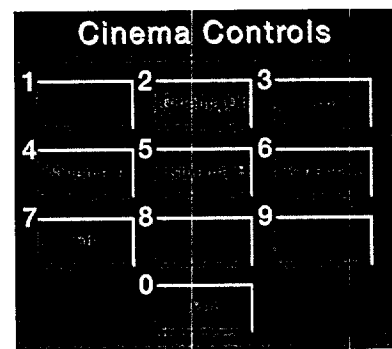
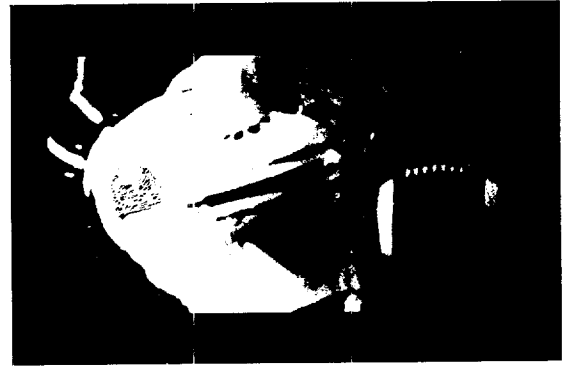
Expansion Modes for filling the 16x9 screen

Cinema A (22% expansion): The full width of the original picture expands horizontally to fill the TV screen, with nothing being cropped from the sides. This reduces or eliminates the letterbox bars, depending on the size of the original bars. If bars are still visible, you may prefer to select Cinema B or Cinema C.

Cinema B (34% expansion): Some portions of the left and right sides of the picture are cropped. This further reduces, and in many cases eliminates, black letterbox bars. If bars are still visible, you may prefer to select Cinema C.

Cinema C (44% expansion): Some portions of the left and right sides of the picture are cropped. In most cases, this will eliminate letterbox bars.

Watching SPLIT Screen

The Split Screen feature allows you to watch two different programs on the screen at one time. The first time you press SPLIT SCREEN, the TV screen will show two pictures on the screen at the same time. They both may be the same picture. Follow the steps below to change channels on the pictures and adjust the pictures using the Split Screen Controls menu.

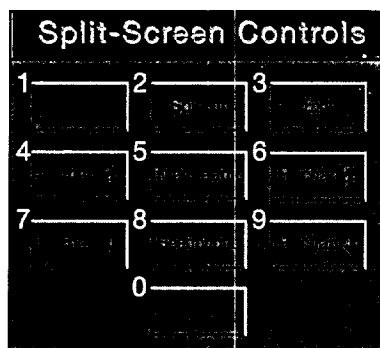
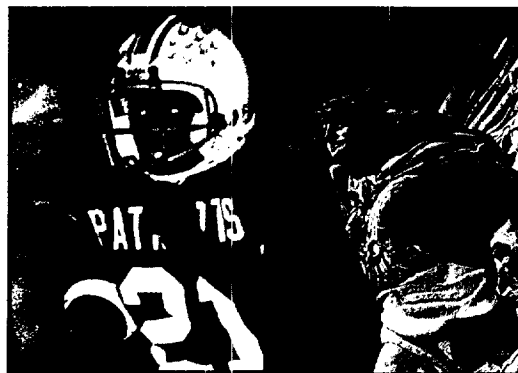

Watching POP (Picture-outside-Picture)

You can view more than one program on the screen with POP. The first time you press POP, several snapshots of the channels will appear in the small boxes outside the main picture.

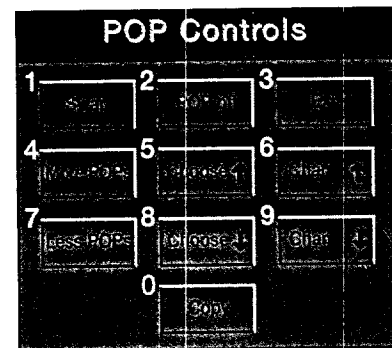

Watching PIP (Picture-in-Picture)

Picture-in-Picture allows you to display a small picture within the main picture of the TV screen. PIP can be used when watching the Cinema mode or standard 4x3 broadcasts. Because you have two tuners, you do not need to connect another video source to watch PIP (picture -in-picture). The first time you press PIP, a small picture appears on the screen along with the main picture.

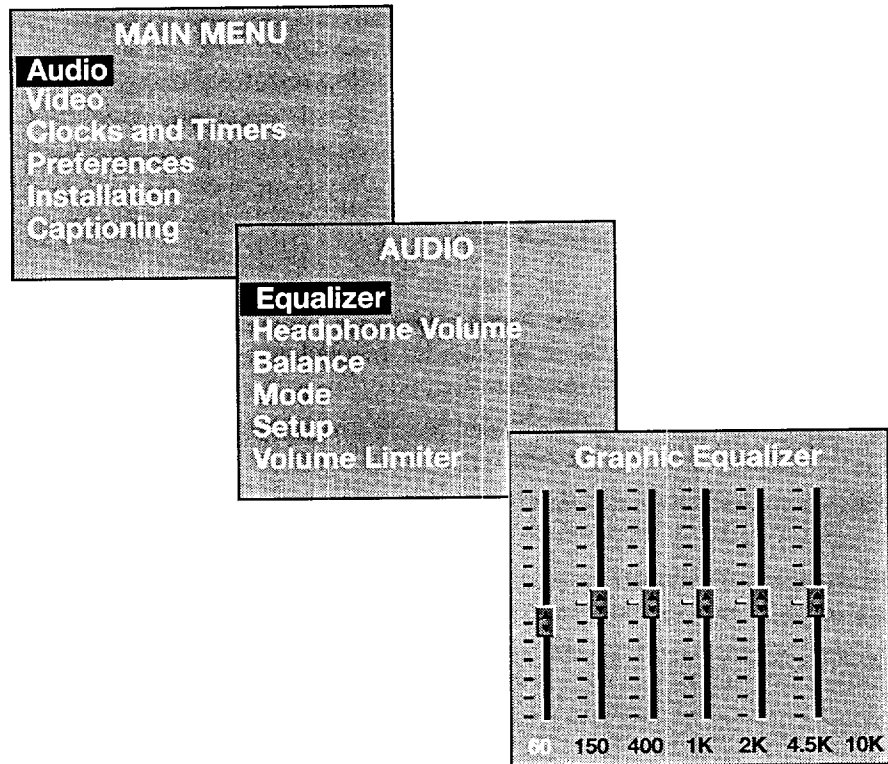


Adjusting the Equalizer

Adjusting the equalizer is a matter of personal preference. The adjustments allow certain characteristics of the audio to be changed without affecting others.

Follow the directional buttons on the screen to adjust the equalizer.

- A. Press MENU to bring up the Main Menu.
- B. Highlight Audio using the up and down arrows on the remote.
- C. Press 8 to select the Audio Menu.
- D. Highlight Equalizer. Press 8 to select the equalizer.
- E. Press the left and right arrows to highlight the band you want to adjust.
- F. Use the up and down arrows to raise or lower the amplitude.
- G. Press 3 to exit.



60 Hz

Gives low bass sounds more or less impact. This area is where many systems and/or programs are weak. Increasing this control overcomes such deficiencies.

150 Hz

Affects the loudness of bass. Increasing the control gives the bass more punch, lowering it reduces booming.

400 Hz

Affects the fullness of some instruments and lower vocals. Increasing this control adds fullness to these sounds, reducing it makes them sound thinner.

1KHz

Strongly affects the presence of vocals and most instruments. Increasing this control can help project these sounds or make a vocalist easier to understand.

2 KHz

Strongly affects the harmonics of voices and some instruments. Increasing this control will project most instruments and vocals. Reducing it allows more subtle sounds in other ranges to be heard.

4.5 KHz

Affects harmonics of voices and instruments, particularly brass and strings. Increasing this control makes these instruments and vocals sharper. Reducing it controls lispy vocals or shrill instruments.

10 KHz

Affects the highest, most delicate harmonics of instruments such as strings and the overall sound of others such as cymbals and drum snares. Increasing this control brings out crispness in cymbals and sweetness in strings and gives the music atmosphere. Reducing it controls extra noise and hiss.

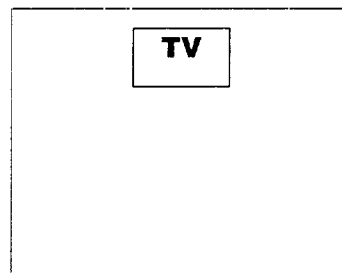
Selecting a Mode from Speaker Arrangements

No additional speakers

If you do not have any external speakers connected to the speaker connectors on the back of your TV, you will want to choose one of the audio modes listed below.

- Select Normal Stereo so your TV will automatically produce stereo sound whenever it is broadcast.
- Select Expanded Stereo to add greater depth and dimension to stereo broadcasts.
- Select Phantom Prologic so your TV will automatically produce clearer dialog and better stereo imaging when stereo is broadcast.

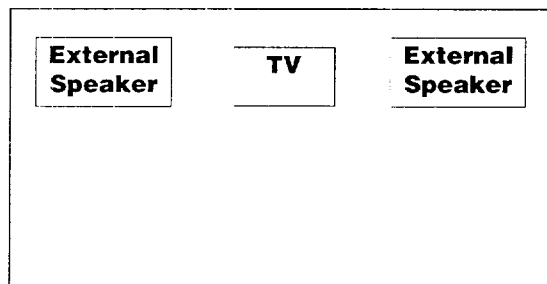


External right and left front speakers

The center channel makes the actor's voice appear to come from the TV screen regardless of where you are sitting in the room. Dolby 3 stereo provides a left, right, and center channel sound.

Select Normal or Expanded Stereo Mode.

Your TV is fully capable of reproducing stereo sound from TV stations transmitting stereo in your area.

Your TV also includes expanded stereo which adds greater depth and dimension to stereo broadcasts. Stereo expansion enhances the ambience of music and program material. Talk shows with background crowd noise also benefit from expansion by engulfing the listener in a wider sound field than would be experienced without expanded stereo. The effect will vary with program material.

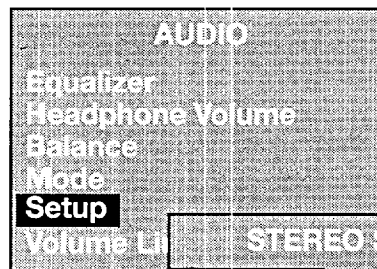

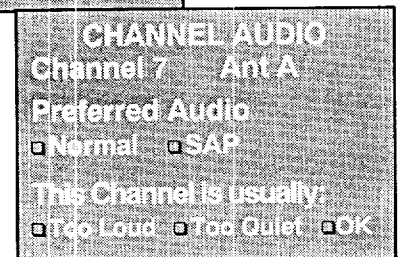
In the Channel Audio menu, you can select the preferred audio program for each channel.

Your TV is capable of receiving stereo as well as programs broadcast in a second language (SAP). In Channel Audio, you can set specific channels for audio in normal stereo or SAP.

If you know a channel is louder or softer than some other channels, you can setup the audio to compensate for the loudness or quietness.

Follow the steps below to set the channel audio to your personal preference.

- A. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- B. Press MENU to bring up the main menu.
- C. Highlight Installation using the up and down arrows on the remote. These arrows are also shown on the screen.
- D. Press 8 to select the Installation menu.
- E. Highlight Channel Audio. Press 8 to select Channel Audio.
- F. Enter the channel number using the left and right arrows or the CHANNEL up/down buttons. The antenna input you are using will be appear next to the channel.
- G. Use the down arrow to highlight Preferred Audio. Use the left or right arrow to check the Normal or SAP box. Select normal for normal stereo or SAP for a second language.
- H. Use the down arrow to highlight, **This channel is usually**. Use the left or right arrow to select Loud, Quiet or OK.
- I. Press 3 to exit.



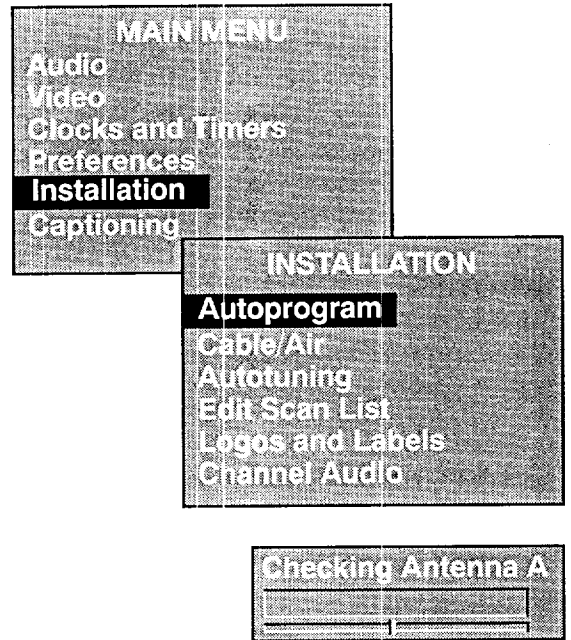
Autoprogramming and Editing the Channel Scan list

Place channels in the channel scan list (Autoprogram).

Only channels 2–13 appear in the TV's channel scan list when you first turn it on. The channels available in your area must be programmed into the Channel Scan list. Using CHANNEL up or down allows you to scan through these channels.

You may want to add or delete a few channels if some stations have weak signals or were off the air when the TV was programmed.

- A. Hook up an antenna or cable before you begin these steps or you will not be able to add channels into the channel scan list.
- B. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- C. Press MENU to bring up the main menu.
- D. Highlight Installation using the up and down arrows on the remote. These arrows are also shown on the screen.

- F. Highlight Autoprogram.

- H. Wait until the TV has finished adding channels by checking the Antennas. The TV will then tune to the lowest channel found.



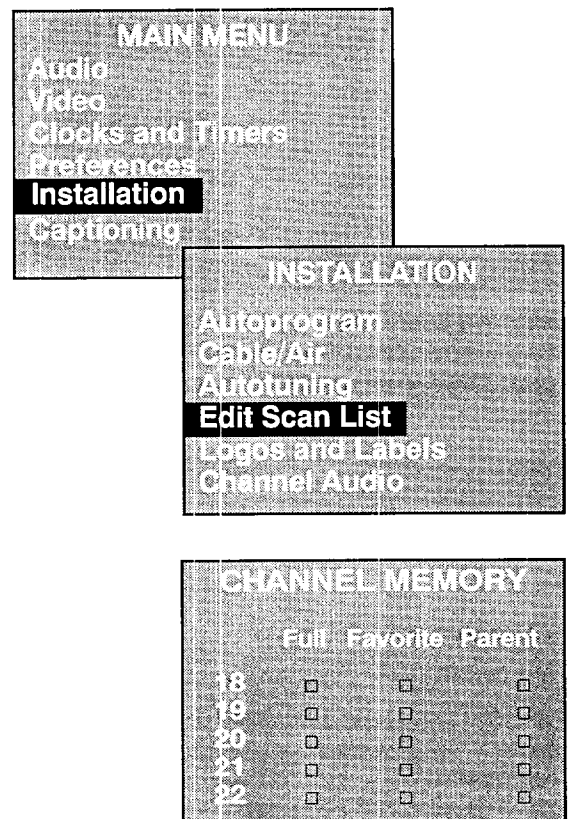
Editing channels in the Scan lists.

Follow the steps below to add or delete channels if station signals were weak or off the air when you autoprogrammed the TV. You can place channels in normal, favorite or parental control scan lists when you edit channels.

You can select normal or favorite channels to use in the scan lists shown on the next page. Full is for channels that will appear in the normal scan list.

When you place channels in the parental control list, you will only be able to see them if you enter the channel number with the number buttons on the master remote. This is useful if you have channels you don't want your children to watch. These channels can not be accessed with the small remote or with the controls on the front of the TV.

- A. Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- B. Press MENU to bring up the main menu.
- C. Highlight Installation using the up and down arrows on the remote. These arrows are also shown on the screen.
- D. Press 8 to select the Installation menu.

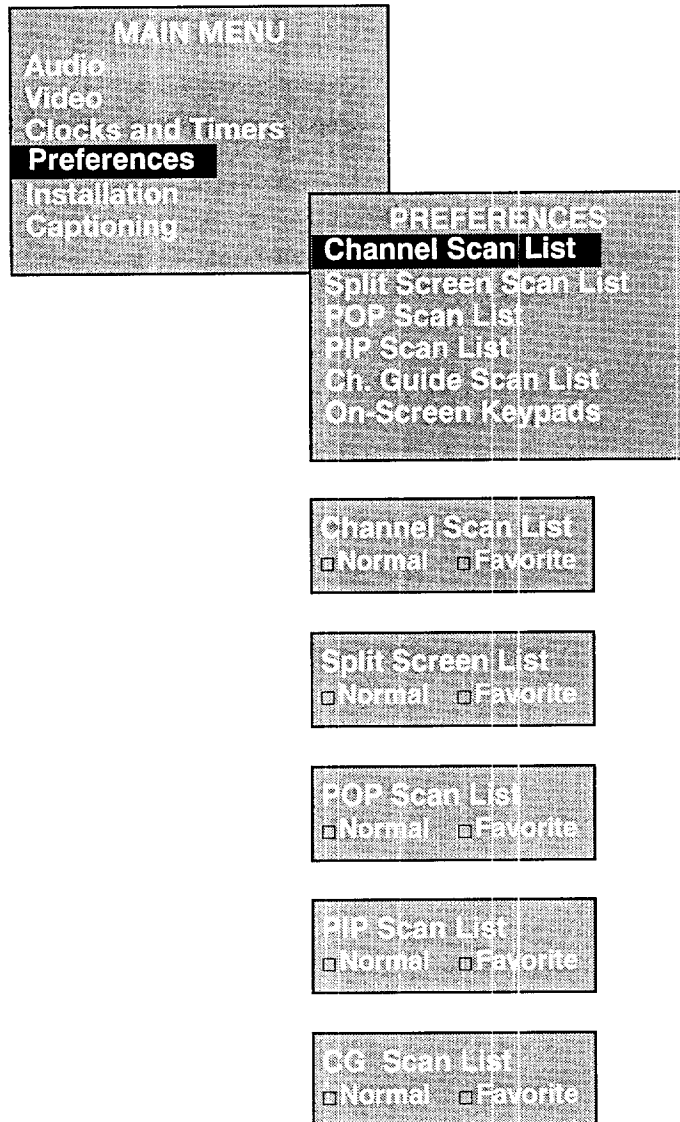

Watching Closed Captioning

The Captioning feature lets you display the audio portion of a program as text on the TV screen. This is useful to the hearing impaired or anyone who wants to watch a program without sound.

Closed Captioning is not available on all channels or at all times. Only specific programs encoded with Closed Captioning (CC) information are applicable.

In certain Cinema modes, you may not be able to see all or any Closed Captioning because of the picture expansion.

Adjust Closed Captioning.

- Press TV to set the remote to control the TV.
- Press MENU to bring up the main menu.
- Highlight Captioning using the up and down arrows on the remote. These arrows are also shown on the screen.
- Press 8 to select the Captioning menu.
- Select when you want to use Captioning from the choices below:

NEVER -

Leaves Captioning off.

ALWAYS -

Always displays Captioning when available.

CAPTIONING ON MUTE -

Displays captioning when Mute is turned on instead of sound.

Captioning Modes

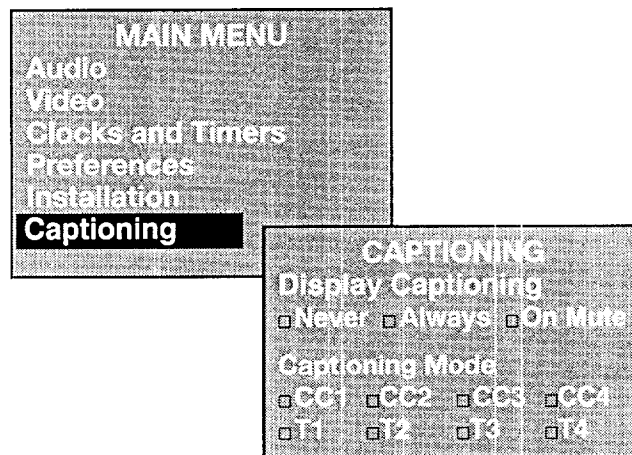
Select C1 for translation of the primary language in your area.

Select C3 for captioning information usually of secondary languages, simplified English or other translations transmitted in your area.

C2 or C4 carry Closed Captioning but not necessarily in the same time frame as the sound from the program. Several second delays are typical for these modes.

Text Modes

T1, T2, T3, and T4 display on-screen boxes containing the text of information not necessarily related to the program being watched. These Text Modes may not be available in all areas.

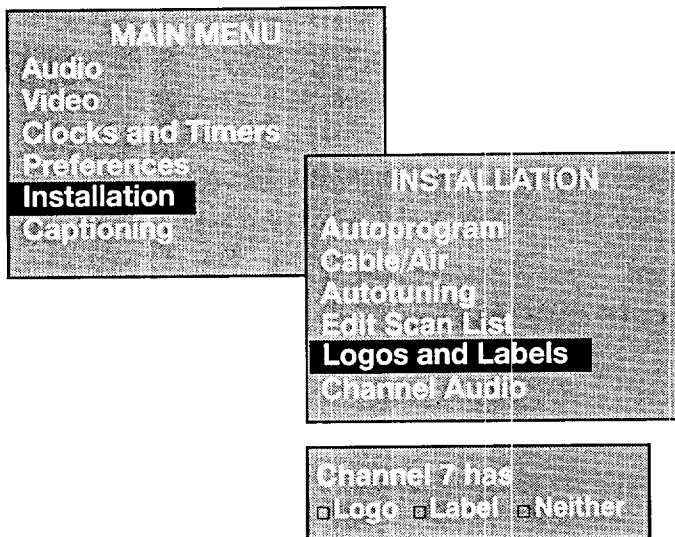

1 AUDIO INPUTS 1 and 2: R/MONO, LEFT, VIDEO and S-VIDEO INPUT

Use these jacks to connect video devices, such as VCR's, camcorders, and laserdisc players, or home computers and TV games with audio/video outputs.

Use the S-VIDEO INPUT jacks to connect an S-Video device for full benefits of the S-Video format. The S-Video cable carries only video, so you must also connect audio cables for sound.

2 HI-FI AUDIO OUTPUTS: R/MONO and LEFT

Feeds stereo sound out from what is on the TV screen. Allows connection of an external audio amplifier. Using these jacks allow you to control the volume through the stereo system.

3 AUDIO OUTPUTS CENTER Jack

Feeds center sound out from what is on the TV screen. Used to connect an audio amplifier in case you want to raise center-channel sound louder than the TV speakers will allow. Normal and Dolby3 Prologic mode must be turned on to hear the center channel sound.

4 SURROUND AUDIO OUTPUTS

Feeds surround sound from what is on the TV screen. Used to connect audio amplifier to raise the surround speakers louder than the TV's SURROUND speaker terminals will allow. Either Dolby3, Normal or Phantom Prologic, or Matrix, Hall, or Stadium Surround sound mode must be selected to hear surround sound.

5 SELECT AUDIO and VIDEO OUTPUTS: R/MONO, LEFT, SELECT VIDEO and S-VIDEO OUTPUTS

Provides fixed level audio and video output (audio and video signals suitable for recording) from what is on the TV screen.

Used for:

- VCR editing with two or three VCRs.
- Recording TV programs onto a camcorder.
- Recording cable-TV programs onto a VCR that is not cable compatible.
- Recording audio onto an audio cassette tape recorder.

To record from an S-VHS component, you must also connect an optional S-Video cable from the SELECT S-VIDEO OUTPUT connector on the TV to the S-VHS INPUT connector on the VCR.

6 EXTERNAL Speakers Terminals

Used to connect external speakers. Eight-ohm speakers are recommended.

7 PICTURE TILT POLARITY Switch

Used to correct tilted picture from the effect of the Earth's magnetic field on an extra large color picture tube. *Details are on page 3.*

8 SURROUND Speakers Terminals

Used to connect speakers for surround sound effects. Used with normal or phantom prologic, or matrix, hall, or stadium surround sound mode. Eight-ohm speakers are recommended.

9 PICTURE TILT STRENGTH Switch

Used to correct a tilted picture from the effect of the Earth's magnetic field on an extra large color picture tube. *Details are on page 3.*

10 CABLE/ANTENNA CONNECTORS: ANT A, ANT B, AND CONVERTER

Used to attach either a home antenna and/or cable to your TV.

11 HIGH RESOLUTION INPUTS

Used to connect future compatible high resolution video sources.

Things to Know Before Connecting Cables

Protect your components from power surges

- Connect all components before plugging any power cords into the wall outlet.
- Always turn off the TV and/or component before you connect or disconnect any cables.

Avoid audio hum or interference by positioning cables correctly

- Insert all cable plugs firmly into their jacks.
- Place the audio/video cables to the sides of the TV's back panel instead of straight down the middle after you connect your components.
- Try not to coil any twin-lead cables and keep them away from the audio/video cables as much as possible.
- Make sure all antennas and cables are properly grounded. Refer to the Safety Tips sheet packed with your TV.

Protect your components from overheating

- Do not block ventilation holes in any of the components. Arrange the components so that air can circulate freely.
- Do not stack components.
- Allow adequate ventilation when placing your components in a stand.
- Place an amplifier on the top shelf of the stand so heated air rising from it will not flow around other components.

Home Antenna or Cable Connection

Connect an indoor or outdoor antenna or cable that does not require a box to your TV.

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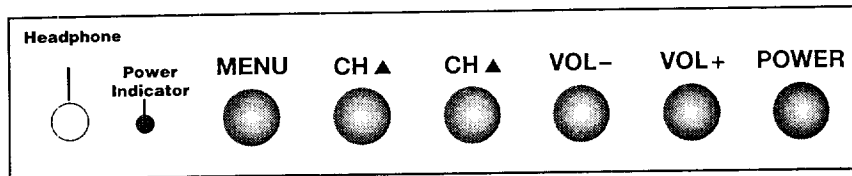
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Front Panel Controls



Stereo Headphone Jack

The headphone jack lets you connect optional headphones to listen to the sound from the TV. Plugging in headphones will not automatically mute the sound from the TV. This can be used to listen to the main picture or PIP at the same time others are listening to the TV. If the plug on your headphones does not fit this jack, adapters are available from your local electronics supply store.

Power Indicator

The power indicator lights whenever the TV is turned on.
Turns off when a remote button is pressed.

MENU

Shows menus on screen.
Exits menus.

CH ▲ and ▼ (Channel up and down)

Moves up and down through channels in the TV channel scan list.
Moves up and down menus.

VOL + and - (Volume up and down)

Raises and lowers sound.
Moves left and right in the menu system.
Selects highlighted items in the menus.

POWER

Turns the TV on or off.

Remote Control Sensor

Receives commands from the remote. When using a remote, point it toward this sensor.

On-Screen Displays

Your TV shows the settings of several features on the screen. To see what features have been set on your TV, press DSPY.

Antenna A or B

Indicates you are watching whatever you have connected to the Ant A or B input on the back of the TV such as cable, antenna or a component.

Channel Logo or Label

Name you chose to describe the channel.

Channel Number

Channel number you are watching.

Clock Icon

A program timer has been set.

Closed Captioning Icon

Shows you have selected Closed Captioning.

Commercial Skip Time

The time remaining for commercial skip.

Headphone Icon

If you are using Split Screen or PIP, the headphone sound is selected for the left channel.

HiRes/S-Video/Video

TV is tuned to whatever you have connected to the Video, S-Video or HiRes inputs on the back of the TV.

Hourglass Icon

Event Timer has been set.

Mute

Sound has been muted with MUTE button.

Power Interruption

After a shut down or loss of power, the interruption message may appear on the screen. In the first few months of operation, it is normal for your TV to occasionally shut down and immediately turn itself on again.

Stereo

The sound is being broadcast in stereo.

SAP

The sound is being broadcast in a second audio program and SAP has been selected in the Channel Audio Menu.

Sheep Jumping

Sleep Timer is set: to turn off the TV in one minute when the sheep start jumping across the screen.

Speakers Icon

Shows which side the main audio is coming from in Split Screen mode.

Time of Day

Time of the clock.

Volume

Sound level of the TV.

Trouble Checks

You may have problems that can be fixed with a few minor adjustments. Look for the type of problem you are having below and then try the suggestions to get your TV going again. *For warranty information see page 32.*

TV will not turn on

Plug TV in.

Plug something else into the outlet to make sure it is working.

Make sure batteries in the remote are not dead.

Aim the remote at the TV and press TV.

Make sure batteries are placed in the remote correctly. *See batteries on page 2.*

Unplug TV for a few minutes and then turn it on again.

TV turns off by itself

Sleep Timer may have been set. *See sleep timer on page 37.*

Wait 30 seconds and turn on again, a power surge may have occurred.

Check Program Off Time. *See Program Timer on page 38.*

TV turns on by itself

Check Program On Time. *See Program Timer on page 23.*

Check Clock Time. *See clock on page 3.*

TV turns off and then turns on again

Power interruption may have occurred.

Automatic Shutdown circuit may have occurred. *See page 55.*

TV does not turn off at Program Time

Make sure alarm is turned on or off. *See alarm clock on page 23.*

Check Clock Time. *See clock on page 3.*

No picture, no sound but TV has power

Check antenna connections. Press ANT on master remote to switch between ANT A and ANT B.

Check position of Cable/Air feature. *See page 39.*

Try another channel. Inactive channel may be tuned.

Make sure component connected to the VIDEO INPUT jacks is turned on if you tune to the channel to see the picture from the VIDEO input.

Make sure TV is tuned to the same channel as the CH3/CH4 switch on back of VCR if watching a VCR.

Make sure TV/VCR button on VCR is in correct position.

Blank screen

Try another channel.

Scan the channels.

Press TV to set the master remote to control the TV.

TV may be tuned to whatever is connected to the input jacks on the back of the TV.

Press ANT on the master remote. The wrong antenna may be selected.

Check to see if Cable/Air setting has been changed. *See page 39.*

Trouble Checks

Picture poor, sound okay

Check antenna connections.

Adjust sharpness in the Video menu to improve weak signals. *See page 21.*

Make sure TV/VCR button on VCR is in the correct position.

Picture okay, no sound

Press VOLUME + or MUTE to restore sound.

Make sure TV's Internal speakers are on. *Check the Setup menu of the Audio mode you are using.*

Captioning may be set to turn on when TV is muted. *See page 35.*

Try another channel.

The stereo broadcast may not be clear. Set the Normal Stereo feature to Mono. *See page 26.*

Make sure sound is not muted. Press MUTE on remote.

Remote Buttons don't work when you press them

Press TV to set the remote to control the TV. *See buttons on page 4.*

Unplug set for 15-20 minutes and turn on again.

Remote works part or none of the time

Clear the path between the remote and TV of any objects.

Aim the remote at the component you are trying to control.

Press TV to set the remote will control the TV.

Make sure batteries in the remote are not dead.

See if batteries are placed in remote correctly. *See batteries on page 2.*

Press any button on the remote. If the remote is working, the power indicator on the front of the TV will flicker when you press a button.

Can't select certain channel

Press number buttons. Channel may not be in the scan list you have selected. *See autoprogram on page 33.*

Make sure TV/VCR switch on VCR is in the TV position.

For numbers over 100, press the 100 button, then press the other two numbers.

Set Cable/ Air feature to Cable for channels higher than 69. *See page 39.*

Noisy stereo reception

The stereo broadcast may not be clear. Set the Normal Stereo feature to Mono. *See page 26.*

No stereo on stereo station

Make sure Stereo is turned on. Set the Normal Stereo feature to Stereo. *See page 26.*

Glossary

ANTENNA

A device used to receive locally broadcast signals from TV stations. If you are receiving channels from a home antenna, you will only receive channels 2-69.

AUDIO

Sound from the TV. You can adjust sound settings in the audio menu.

AUDIO/VIDEO CABLES

Cables that carry sound and picture from one component to another.

AUTOCOLOR

Keeps fleshtones consistent each time you change channels.

AUTOPROGRAM

A procedure that automatically adds the TV stations in your area to the TV's channel scan list.

BRIGHTNESS

Light and dark areas of a picture.

CHANNEL LABEL

A name that is given to a specific channel number.

CHANNEL MEMORY

Where channels are stored after they have been placed into the channel scan list. Channels can be added or deleted from channel scan list.

CINEMA Mode

Mode of expansion for filling the 16x9 screen. The picture is expanded both horizontally and vertically to maintain the original proportions.

COLOR TEMP

Color Temperature is the difference between blue and red tones on your screen's picture. You can choose between fleshtones that are Cool, Medium, or Warm in color.

COMMERICAL SKIP

A feature that allows the viewer to scan other channels during commercials and return to the original channel after the break.

COMPONENT

Device such as VCR, laserdisc player, audio equipment, camcorder, etc.

DISPLAY

A word, words or graphics that appear on the TV screen.

DOLBY3 PROLOGIC

Actively decodes Dolby surround encoded audio to provide left, right, and center channel sound. The center channel makes the actor's voice appear to come from the TV screen regardless of where you are sitting in the room. To hear Dolby3 stereo, you must attach right and left front speakers to the EXTERNAL speaker terminals on the back of the TV.

FILL

Fills the screen by expanding the picture in the horizontal direction only. This does not cut off any portion of the picture, but causes both standard 4x3 broadcasts and letterboxed material to appear stretched across the screen. Primarily intended for use with "squeezed" video sources such as some 16x9 camcorders.

GRAPHIC EQUALIZER

Used to adjust frequency bands to accommodate room conditions or personal tastes.

HALL

Used to hear surround sound from a stereo broadcast and create the effect of being in a large room.

INPUTS

Located on back of the TV for connection of components to the TV. Used to route signals into the TV from components.

JACKS

Connectors located on the back of the TV for connecting antennas or other components.

MATRIX

Matrix simulates surround sound from a mono broadcast.

MENU

A listing of features, controls, and adjustments shown on the TV screen.

On-Screen Display

See Display.

Glossary

OUTPUTS

Located on back of the TV for connection of components. Signals are routed out of the TV into the other component.

PAN

Enables you to pan around the screen to watch those areas of the picture that may have been cut off by using Cinema A, B, or C. You can reposition the image to suit your viewing preferences. For example, use the pan menu to allow room for subtitles when watching a foreign film.

PHANTOM

Automatically produces cleaner dialog and better stereo imaging when stereo is broadcast.

PIP (Picture-in-Picture)

A feature that allows you to watch two channels at the same time, a small picture within the main picture.

POP (Picture-Outside-Picture)

Used to watch the main picture and one or more small pictures at the same time.

PROGRAM TIMER

A feature where the TV can be set to turn off at a specific time within four hours.

RESET

Returns select audio and video adjustments back to the factory setting.

SETUP

Used to set up the audio mode you have selected.

SHARPNESS

Clearness of a picture.

SKIP:30

See Commercial Skip.

SIGNAL

Electrical waves that are sent or received through cables or antennas.

SOURCE(S)

Components or devices that are connected to the TV.

SPLIT SCREEN

Used to display two pictures side-by-side on the screen at the same time.

STEREO

Sound that comes through two channels (left and right). Stereo components have two audio output jacks.

SURROUND SOUND

Synthesizes rear-channel information to create a theatre-like sound. One or more surround sound speakers are required.

S-VHS

Super Video. A format used by VCRs and Camcorders which improves the picture quality. S-VIDEO appears on the TV screen when you use this feature.

S-VIDEO

See S-VHS.

TUNER

A device that receives and sends signals. The signals can be adjusted with the tuner.

VIDEO

Picture reproduced by the television. This is the picture on the TV. You can adjust several parts of the picture in the Video Menu.

VOLUME LIMITER

Sets the limit for the maximum volume level.

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
