

WARNING: This is an unvented gas-fired heater. It uses air (oxygen) from the room in which it is installed. Provisions for adequate combustion and ventilation air must be provided. Refer to *Air for Combustion and Ventilation* section in this manual.

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#### SAFETY INFORMATION

#### **A WARNINGS**

IMPORTANT: Read this owner's manual carefully and completely before trying to assemble, operate, or service this heater. Improper use of this heater can cause serious injury or death from burns, fire, explosion, electrical shock, and carbon monoxide poisoning.

#### **A DANGER**

Carbon monoxide poisoning may lead to death!

Carbon Monoxide Poisoning: Early signs of carbon monoxide poisoning resemble the flu, with headaches, dizziness, or nausea. If you have these signs, the heater may not be working properly. Get fresh air at once! Have heater serviced. Some people are more affected by carbon monoxide than others. These include pregnant women, people with heart or lung disease or anemia, those under the influence of alcohol, and those at high altitudes.

**Propane Gas:** Propane gas is odorless. An odor-making agent is added to the gas. The odor helps you detect a gas leak. However, the odor added to the gas can fade. Gas may be present even though no odor exists.

Make certain you read and understand all Warnings. Keep this manual for reference. It is your guide to safe and proper operation of this heater.


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#### A WARNINGS Continued

WARNING: Any change to this heater or its controls can be dangerous.

- 1. This appliance is only for use with the type of gas indicated on the rating plate. This appliance is not convertible for use with other gases.
- Do not place propane (LP) supply tank(s) inside any structure. Locate propane (LP) supply tank(s) outdoors.
- 3. To prevent performance problems, do not use propane fuel tank of less than 100 lbs. capacity.
- 4. If you smell gas
  - shut off gas supply
  - · do not try to light any appliance
  - do not touch any electrical switch; do not use any phone in your building
  - immediately call your gas supplier from a neighbor's phone. Follow the gas supplier's instructions
  - if you cannot reach your gas supplier, call the fire department
- 5. This heater shall not be installed in a bedroom or bathroom unless installed as a vented appliance (Variable Manually-Controlled Models Only) (see page 13).
- 6. Never install the heater
  - in a recreational vehicle
  - where curtains, furniture, clothing, or other flammable objects are less than 36 inches from the front, top, or sides of the heater
  - · in high traffic areas
  - · in windy or drafty areas
- 7. Before installing in a solid fuel burning fireplace, the chimney flue and firebox must be cleaned of soot, creosote, ashes and loose paint by a qualified chimney cleaner. Creosote will ignite if highly heated. Inspect chimney flue for damage. If damaged, operate heater with flue damper closed.
- 8. If fireplace has glass doors, never operate this heater with glass doors closed. If you operate heater with doors closed, heat buildup inside fireplace will cause glass to burst. Also if fireplace opening has vents at the bottom, you must open the vents before operating heater.
- 9. You must operate this heater with a fireplace screen in place. Make sure fireplace screen is closed before running heater.
- 10. This log heater is designed to be smokeless. If logs ever appear to smoke, turn off heater and call a qualified service person. *Note:* During initial operation, slight smoking could occur due to log curing and heater burning manufacturing residues.
- 11. Do not allow fans to blow directly into the fireplace. Avoid any drafts that alter burner flame patterns. Ceiling fans can create drafts that alter burner flame patterns. Altered burner patterns can cause sooting.
- Do not use a blower insert, heat exchanger insert or other accessory not approved for use with this heater.
- 13. This heater needs fresh, outside air ventilation to run properly. This heater has an oxygen depletion sensor (ODS) pilot light safety system. The ODS shuts down the heater if not enough fresh air is available. See Air for Combustion and Ventilation, pages 5 through 8. If heater keeps shutting off, see Troubleshooting, pages 25 through 28.
- 14. Do not run heater
  - · where flammable liquids or vapors are used or stored
  - under dusty conditions
- 15. Do not use this heater to cook food or burn paper or other objects.
- 16. Never place any objects on the heater.
- 17. Heater base assembly becomes very hot when running heater. Keep children and adults away from hot surface to avoid burns or clothing ignition. Heater will remain hot for a time after shutdown. Allow surface to cool before touching.
- 18. Carefully supervise young children when they are in the room with heater.
- 19. Do not use heater if any part has been exposed to or under water. Immediately call a qualified service technician to inspect the room heater and to replace any part of the control system and any gas control which has been under water.
- 20. Do not operate heater if any log is broken. Do not operate heater if a log is chipped (dimesized or larger).
- 21. Turn heater off and let cool before servicing. Only a qualified service person should service and repair heater.
- 22. Operating heater above elevations of 4,500 feet could cause pilot outage.

#### **LOCAL CODES**

Note: Where listed vented decorative logs are required, thermostat operation is not permitted.

#### **UNPACKING**

- 1. Remove logs and heater base assembly from carton. *Note:* Do not pick up heater base assembly by burners. This could damage heater. Always handle base assembly by grate.
- 2. Remove all protective packaging applied to logs and heater for shipment.
- 3. Check all items for any shipping damage. If damaged, promptly inform dealer where you bought heater.

# **PRODUCT FEATURES**

#### Operation

This heater is clean burning. It requires no outside venting. There is no heat loss out a vent or up a chimney. Heat is generated by realistic dancing, yellow flames. This heater is designed for vent-free operation with flue damper closed. State and local codes in some areas prohibit the use of vent-free heaters. You can operate heater as a vented product by opening flue damper.

#### **Safety Pilot**

This heater has a pilot with an Oxygen Depletion Sensor Shutoff System (ODS). The ODS/pilot is a required feature for vent-free room heaters. The ODS/pilot shuts off the heater if there is not enough fresh air.

#### Piezo Ignition System

This heater has a piezo ignitor. This system requires no matches, batteries, or other sources to light heater.

### AIR FOR COMBUSTION **VENTILATION**

#### **A** WARNING

This heater shall not be installed in a confined space unless provisions are provided for adequate combustion and ventilation air. Read the following instructions to insure proper fresh air for this and other fuel-burning appliances in your home.

Today's homes are built more energy efficient than ever. New materials, increased insulation, and new construction methods help reduce heat loss in homes. Home owners weather strip and caulk around windows and doors to keep the cold air out and the warm air in. During heating months, home owners want their homes as airtight as possible.

While it is good to make your home energy efficient, your home needs to breathe. Fresh air must enter your home. All fuel-burning appliances need fresh air for proper combustion and ventilation.

Exhaust fans, fireplaces, clothes dryers, and fuel burning appliances draw air from the house to operate. You must provide adequate fresh air for these appliances. This will insure proper venting of vented fuel-burning appliances.

#### PROVIDING ADEQUATE VENTILATION

The following is excerpts from National Fuel Gas Code. NFPA 54/ANSI Z223.1, Section 5.3, Air for Combustion and Ventilation.

All spaces in homes fall into one of the three following ventilation classifications:

1. Unusually Tight Construction; 2. Unconfined Space; 3. Confined Space.

The information on pages 5 through 7 will help you classify your space and provide adequate ventilation.

#### **Unusually Tight Construction**

The air that leaks around doors and windows may provide enough fresh air for combustion and ventilation. However, in buildings of unusually tight construction, you must provide additional fresh air.

Unusually tight construction is defined as construction where:

- a. walls and ceilings exposed to the outside atmosphere have a continuous water vapor retarder with a rating of one perm (6x10<sup>-11</sup> per pa-sec-m²) or less with openings gasketed or sealed and
- b. weather stripping has been added on openable windows and doors and
- c. caulking or sealants are applied to areas such as joints around window and door frames, between sole plates and floors, between wall-ceiling joints, between wall panels, at penetrations for plumbing, electrical, and gas lines, and at other openings.

If your home meets all of the three criteria above, you must provide additional fresh air. See Ventilation Air From Outdoors, page 7.

If your home does not meet all of the three criteria above, proceed to page 6.

#### Confined and Unconfined Space

The National Fuel Gas Code (ANSIZ223.1, 1992 Section 5.3) defines a confined space as a space whose volume is less than 50 cubic feet per 1,000 Btu per hour (4.8 m<sup>3</sup> per kw) of the aggregate input rating of all appliances installed in that space and an unconfined space as a space whose volume is not less than 50 cubic feet per 1,000 Btu per hour (4.8 m³ per kw) of the aggregate input rating of all appliances installed in that space. Rooms communicating directly with the space in which the appliances are installed\*, through openings not furnished with doors, are considered a part of the unconfined space.

\* Adjoining rooms are communicating only if there are doorless passageways or ventilation grills between them. Continued

If the actual Btu/Hr used is less than the maximum Btu/Hr the space can support, the space is an unconfined space. You will need no additional fresh air ventilation.

#### AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION Continued

#### **A** WARNING

If the area in which the heater may be operated is smaller than that defined as an unconfined space, provide adequate combustion and ventilation air by one of the methods described in the *National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1, 1992, Section 5.3* or applicable local codes.

#### **VENTILATION AIR**

#### **Ventilation Air From Inside Building**




Figure 2 - Ventilation Air from Inside Building

This fresh air would come from an adjoining unconfined space. When ventilating to an adjoining unconfined space, you must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of the ceiling and one within 12" of the floor on the wall connecting the two spaces (see options 1 and 2, Figure 2). You can also remove door into adjoining room (see option 3, Figure 2). Follow the National Fuel Gas Code NFPA 54/ANSI Z223.1, Section 5.3, Air for Combustion and Ventilation for required size of ventilation grills or ducts.

#### **A** WARNING

Rework worksheet, adding the space of the adjoining unconfined space. The combined spaces must have enough fresh air to supply all appliances in both spaces.

#### **Ventilation Air From Outdoors**

Provide extra fresh air by using ventilation grills or ducts. You must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of the ceiling and one within 12" of the floor. Connect these items directly to the outdoors or spaces open to the outdoors. These spaces include attics and crawl spaces.

IMPORTANT: Do not provide openings for inlet or outlet air into attic if attic has a thermostatcontrolled power vent. Heated air entering the attic will activate the power vent.




Figure 3 - Ventilation Air from Outdoors

#### NOTICE

A qualified service person must install heater. Follow all local codes.

#### NOTICE

State or local codes may only allow operation of this appliance in a vented configuration. Check your state or local codes.

#### **A** WARNING

Before installing in a solid fuel burning fireplace, the chimney flue and firebox must be cleaned of soot, creosote, ashes and loose paint by a qualified chimney cleaner. Creosote will ignite if highly heated. Inspect chimney flue for damage. If damaged, operate heater with flue damper closed.

#### **A** WARNING

Seal any fresh air vents or ash clean-out doors located on floor or wall of fireplace. If not, drafting may cause pilot outage or sooting. Use a heat-resistant sealant. Do not seal chimney flue damper.

#### **A** WARNING

Never install the heater

- in a bedroom or bathroom unless installed as a vented appliance (Variable Manually-Controlled Models Only) (see page 13)
- in a recreational vehicle
- where curtains, furniture, clothing, or other flammable objects are less than 36 inches from the front, top, or sides of the heater
- · in high traffic areas
- in windy or drafty areas

#### **A** CAUTION

This heater creates warm air currents. These currents move heat to wall surfaces next to heater. Installing heater next to vinyl or cloth wall coverings or operating heater where impurities in the air (such as tobacco smoke) exist, may discolor walls.

IMPORTANT: Vent-free heaters add moisture to the air. Although this is beneficial, installing heater in rooms without enough ventilation air may cause mildew to form from too much moisture. See Air for Combustion and Ventilation, pages 5 through 7.

#### **CHECK GAS TYPE**

Use only propane gas. If your gas supply is not propane, do not install heater. Call dealer where you bought heater for proper type heater.

#### **INSTALLATION AND CLEARANCES (Vent-Free Operation Only)**

#### **A** WARNING

Maintain the minimum clearances. If you can, provide greater clearances from floor, ceiling, and adjoining wall.

Carefully follow the instructions below. This will ensure safe installation into a masonry, U.L. listed manufactured fireplace, or AGA design certified vent-free firebox listed for use with these models.




Figure 4 - Minimum Clearance to Wall and Celling

#### Minimum Wall and Ceiling Clearances (see Figure 4)

- A. Clearances from the side of the fireplace opening to any combustible wall should not be less than 16 inches.
- B. Clearances from the top of the fireplace opening to the ceiling should not be less than 42 inches.

#### NOTICE

You may use this heater as a vented product. If so, you must always run heater with chimney flue damper open. If running heater with damper open, non-combustible material above fire-place opening is not needed. Go to *Installing Damper Clamp Accessory for Vented Operation*, page 13.

#### Minimum Non-Combustible Material Clearances

#### If Not Using Mantel

**Note:** If using a mantel, go to page 11. If not using a mantel, follow the information on this page.




Figure 5 - Heat Resistant Material (Siate, Marble, Tile, etc.) Above Fireplace

You must have non-combustible material(s) above the fireplace opening. Non-combustible materials (such as slate, marble, tile, etc.) must be at least 1/2 inch thick. With sheet metal, you must have non-combustible material behind it. Non-combustible material must extend at least 8" up (for all models). If non-combustible material is less than 12", you must install the fireplace hood accessory (24" and 30" models only). See chart below and Figure 5 for minimum clearances.

IMPORTANT: If you cannot meet these minimum clearances, you must operate heater with chimney flue damper open. Go to Installing Damper Clamp Accessory for Vented Operation, page 13.

## Minimum Non-Combustible Material Clearances (Continued) If Using Mantel




Figure 6 - Minimum Mantel Clearances Without Using Hood




Figure 7 - Minimum Mantel Clearances When Using Hood

You must have non-combustible material(s) above the fireplace opening. Non-combustible materials (such as slate, marble, tile, etc.) must be at least 1/2 inch thick. With sheet metal, you must have non-combustible material behind it. Non-combustible material must extend at least 8" up (for all models). If non-combustible material is less than 12", you must install the fireplace hood accessory (24" and 30" models only). Even if non-combustible material is more than 12", you may need the hood accessory to deflect heat away from your mantel shelf. See chart below and Figures 6 and 7 for minimum clearances.

IMPORTANT: If you cannot meet these minimum clearances, you must operate heater with chimney flue damper open. Go to Installing Damper Clamp Accessory for Vented Operation, page 13.

Non-Combustible Material Distance (A)	Requirements for Safe Installation
12" or more	Non-combustible material okay.
Between 8" and 12"	24" or 30" Models: Install fireplace hood accessory (GA6050 or GA6052, see <i>Accessories</i> , page 33). 18" Model: Non-combustible material okay.

#### **Mantel Clearances**

In addition to meeting non-combustible material clearances, you must also meet required clearances between fireplace opening and mantel shelf. If you do not meet the clearances listed below, you will need a hood.

#### **Determining Minimum Mantel Clearance**

If you meet minimum clearance between mantel shelf and top of fireplace opening, a hood is not required (see Figure 6).

#### **Determining Minimum Mantel Clearance When Using a Hood**

If minimum clearances in Figure 6 are not met, you must have a hood. When using a hood there are still certain minimum mantel clearances required. Follow minimum clearances shown in Figure 7 when using hood.

If your installation does not meet the above minimum clearances, you must:

- operate the logs only with the flue damper open, OR
- · raise the mantel to an acceptable height, OR
- · remove the mantel.

#### Floor Clearances




Figure 8 - Minimum Fireplace Clearances if Installed at Floor Level

A. If installing appliance on the floor level, you must maintain the minimum distance of 14" to combustibles (see Figure 8).




Figure 9 - Minimum Fireplace Clearances Above Combustible Flooring

B. If combustible materials are less than 14" to the fireplace, you must install appliance at least 5" above the combustible flooring (see Figure 9).

### INSTALLING DAMPER CLAMP ACCESSORY FOR VENTED OPERATION

**Note:** When used as a vented heater, appliance must be installed only in a solid-fuel burning fireplace with a working flue and constructed of non-combustible material.

If your heater is a manually controlled model, you may use this heater as a vented product. There are three reasons for operating your heater in the vented mode.

- 1. The fireplace does not meet the clearance to combustibles requirements for vent-free operation.
- 2. State or local codes do not permit vent-free operation.
- 3. You prefer vented operation.




Figure 10 - Attaching Damper Clamp

If reasons number 1 or 2 above apply to you, you must permanently open chimney flue damper. You must install the damper clamp accessory (to order, see *Accessories*, page 33). This will insure vented operation (see Figure 10). The damper clamp will keep damper open. Installation instructions are included with clamp accessory.

See chart below for minimum permanent flue opening you must provide. Attach damper clamp so the minimum permanent flue opening will be maintained at all times.

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#### INSTALLING HEATER BASE ASSEMBLY

#### **A** WARNING

You must secure this heater to fireplace floor. If not, heater will move when you adjust controls. Moving heater may cause a gas leak.

#### **A** WARNING

If installing in a sunken fireplace, special care is needed. You must raise the fireplace floor to allow access to heater control panel. This will insure adequate air flow and guard against sooting. Raise fireplace floor with non-combustible material. Make sure material is secure.

#### **A** CAUTION

Do not pick up heater base assembly by the burner. This could damage heater. Only handle base assembly by grates.

IMPORTANT: Make sure the heater burners are level. If heater is not level, heater will not work properly. For thermostat models, avoid damage to thermostat bulb. Avoid nicks or sharp bends in thermostat bulb wire. Keep thermostat bulb in mounting bracket.

#### Installation Items Needed

- hardware package (provided with heater)
- approved flexible gas hose (not provided) (if allowed by local codes)
- sealant resistant to propane (propane/LP) gas, not provided
- electric drill with 3/16" drill bit




Figure 11 - Attaching Flexible Gas Hose to Heater Gas Regulator

- 1. Apply pipe joint sealant lightly to male threads of the fitting to be threaded into gas regulator. Connect approved flexible gas hose to gas regulator of heater (see Figure 11).

IMPORTANT: Hold gas regulator with wrench when connecting flexible gas hose.

- 2. Locate masonry screws in hardware package.
- 3. Position heater base assembly in fireplace.




Figure 12 - Attaching Base Assembly to Fireplace Floor

- 4. Mark screw locations through holes in mounting brackets (see Figure 12, page 15). If installing in a brick-bottom fireplace, mark screw locations in mortar joint of bricks.
- 5. Remove heater base from fireplace.
- 6. Drill holes at marked locations using 3/16" drill bit.
- 7. Attach base assembly to fireplace floor using two masonry screws (in hardware package) (see Figure 12, page 15).
- 8. Connect to gas supply. See Connecting To Gas Supply, page 15.

#### **CONNECTING TO GAS SUPPLY**

#### NOTICE

A qualified service person must connect heater to gas supply. Follow all local codes.

#### **A** CAUTION

Never connect heater directly to the propane supply. This heater requires an external regulator (not supplied). Install the external regulator between the heater and propane supply.

#### Installation Items Needed

Before installing heater, make sure you have the items listed below.

- external regulator (supplied by installer, see page 16)
- piping (check local codes)
- sealant (resistant to propane/LP gas)
- manual shutoff valve \*

- test gauge connection \*
- sediment trap
- tee joint
- pipe wrench

\* An A.G.A. design-certified manual shutoff valve with 1/8" NPT tap is an acceptable alternative to test gauge connection. Purchase the optional A.G.A. design-certified manual shutoff valve from your dealer. See Accessories, page 33.




Figure 13 - External Regulator With Vent Pointing Down

The installer must supply an external regulator. The external regulator will reduce incoming gas pressure. You must reduce incoming gas pressure to between 11 and 14 inches of water. If you do not reduce incoming gas pressure, heater regulator damage could occur. Install external regulator with the vent pointing down as shown in Figure 13. Pointing the vent down protects it from freezing rain or sleet.

#### **A** CAUTION

Use only new, black iron or steel pipe. Internally-tinned copper tubing may be used in certain areas. Check your local codes. Use pipe of 1/2" diameter or greater to allow proper gas volume to heater. If pipe is too small, undue loss of pressure will occur.

Installation must include a manual shutoff valve, union, and plugged 1/8" NPT tap. Locate NPT tap within reach for test gauge hook up. NPT tap must be upstream from heater (see Figure 14, page 17).

Apply pipe joint sealant lightly to male threads. This will prevent excess sealant from going into pipe. Excess sealant in pipe could result in clogged heater valves.

#### **A** CAUTION


Use pipe joint sealant that is resistant to liquid petroleum (LP) gas.

Install sediment trap in supply line as shown in Figure 14, page 17. Locate sediment trap where it is within reach for cleaning. Locate sediment trap where trapped matter is not likely to freeze. A sediment trap traps moisture and contaminants. This keeps them from going into heater controls. If sediment trap is not installed or is installed wrong, heater may not run properly.

#### **A** CAUTION

Avoid damage to regulator. Hold gas regulator with wrench when connecting it to gas piping and/or fittings.



- \* Purchase the optional A.G.A. design-certified manual shutoff valve from your dealer. See Accessories, page 33.
- \*\* Minimum inlet pressure for purpose of input adjustment.

#### **CHECKING GAS CONNECTIONS**

#### **A** WARNING

Test all gas piping and connections for leaks after installing or servicing. Correct all leaks at once.

#### **A** WARNING

Never use an open flame to check for a leak. Apply a mixture of liquid soap and water to all joints. Bubbles forming show a leak. Correct all leaks at once.

#### **A** CAUTION

Make sure external regulator has been installed between propane supply and heater. See guidelines under *Connecting to Gas Supply*, page 15.

#### Pressure Testing Gas Supply Piping system Test Pressures In Excess Of 1/2 PSIG

- 1: Disconnect heater and its individual manual shutoff valve from gas supply piping system. Pressures in excess of 1/2 psig will damage heater regulator.
- 2. Cap off open end of gas pipe where manual shutoff valve was connected.

- 3. Pressurize supply piping system by either using compressed air or opening propane supply tank valve.
- 4. Check all joints of gas supply piping system. Apply mixture of liquid soap and water to gas joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- 5. Correct all leaks at once.
- 6. Reconnect heater and manual shutoff valve to gas supply. Check reconnected fittings for leaks.

#### Test Pressures Equal To or Less Than 1/2 PSIG




Figure 15 - Manual Shutoff Valve

- 1. Close manual shutoff valve (see Figure 15).
- 2. Pressurize supply piping system by either using compressed air or opening propane supply tank valve.




Figure 16 - Checking Gas Joints

- 3. Check all joints from propane supply tank to manual shutoff valve (see Figure 16). Apply mixture of liquid soap and water to gas joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- 4. Correct all leaks at once.

#### **Pressure Testing Heater Gas Connections**

- 1. Open manual shutoff valve (see Figure 15).
- 2. Open propane supply tank valve.
- 3. Make sure control knob of heater is in the OFF position.
- 4. Check all joints from manual shutoff valve to control valve (see Figure 16).

  Apply mixture of liquid soap and water to gas joints. Bubbles forming show a leak.
- 5. Correct all leaks at once.
- 6. Light heater (see *Operating Heater*, pages 20 through 22 [manually-controlled models] or pages 22 through 24 [thermostatically-controlled models]). Check all other internal joints for leaks.
- 7. Turn off heater (see *To Turn Off Gas to Appliance*, page 21 [manually-controlled models] or page 24 [thermostatically-controlled models]).


#### INSTALLING LOGS

#### **A** WARNING

Failure to position the parts in accordance with these diagrams or failure to use only parts specifically approved with this heater may result in property damage or personal injury.

Each log is marked with a number. These numbers will help you identify the log when installing. It is very important to install these logs exactly as instructed. Do not modify logs. Only use logs supplied with heater.

- 1. Locate pegs on the bottom of back log (#1). Slide these pegs into the holes in the grate base behind the burner (see Figure 17).
- 2. Place the base of the middle log (#2) in the U-shaped slots of the grate base in front of the back log. The cutout on the right of the middle log should fit over the burner (see Figure 18). Make sure the front of the middle log is resting on the tabs of the grate base and the cutout area is centered over the burner "U" bend.
- 3. Locate the recesses on the back of the front log (#3). Fit these recesses between the posts of the grate base (see Figure 19).
- 4. Locate the notches in the bottom of the crossover log (#4). Place the crossover log on top of the middle log and front log. Make sure the notches of the crossover log lines up with rectangular knobs on top of the middle and front logs (see Figure 20).




Figure 21 - Control Knob and Ignitor Button Location




Figure 22 - Pilot




Figure 23 - Control Knob and Ignitor Button Location




Figure 24 - Pilot

#### THERMOSTAT CONTROL OPERATION



(Thermostat-Controlled Models Only)

The thermostat control knob can be set to any comfort level between Hi and Lo. The thermostat will gradually modulate the heat output and flame height from higher to lower settings, or pilot, in order to maintain the comfort level you select. The ideal comfort setting will vary by household depending upon the amount of space to be heated, the output of the central heating system, etc.

Note: Selecting the Hi setting with the control knob will cause the burner to remain fully on, without modulating down in most cases.

#### INSPECTING BURNERS

Check pilot flame pattern and burner flame patterns often.

#### PILOT FLAME PATTERN




Figure 25 - Correct Pilot Flame Pattern

Figure 25 shows a correct pilot flame pattern. Figure 26 shows an incorrect pilot flame pattern. The incorrect pilot flame is not touching the thermocouple. This will cause the thermocouple to cool. When the thermocouple cools, the heater will shut down.

# OPTIONAL POSITIONING OF THERMOSTAT SENSING BULB For Masonry and Factory-built Metal Fireplace

If your log set cycles to pilot, but the room temperature drops to a lower than ideal comfort level before the log set comes back on, you may want to reposition the thermostat sensing bulb.

The thermostat sensing bulb is located near the gas valve assembly on the mounting bracket. This location allows the thermostat to keep the room temperature at an ideal comfort level for most fireplace applications. For positioning the thermostat sensing bulb elsewhere, an adhesive-backed mounting clip has been provided.

Tools needed: 1/4" hex driver or socket




Figure 27 - Location of Gas Valve Assembly and Thermostat Sensing Bulb

1. Remove logs. Locate the gas valve assembly and thermostat sensing bulb (see Figure 27).

2. The adhesive-backed mounting clip (see Figure 28) is attached to the thermostat sensing bulb. Remove the adhesive-backed mounting clip.




Figure 29 - Removing Thermostat Sensing Bulb

3. With 1/4" hex driver or socket, loosen the thermostat screw. Carefully slide the thermostat sensing bulb out of the retaining clamp (see Figure 29).

Note: Do not remove the screw. Make sure you tighten the screw after removing the thermostat sensing bulb.

IMPORTANT: Do not force or bend the thermostat sensing bulb or capillary.

4. The thermostat sensing bulb may be located to the lower right front side of fireplace.




Figure 30 - Locating Thermostat Sensing Bulb on Masonry Fireplace

Determine location of sensing bulb, but do not mount sensing bulb until step 5. If you have a masonry fireplace, see Figure 30 on page 30 for location.




Figure 31 - Locating Thermostat Sensing Bulb on Factory-built Metal Fireplace

If you have a factory-built metal fireplace, see Figure 31 for location.




Figure 32 - Installing Thermostat Sensing Bulb behind Glass Doors

If your fireplace has glass doors, position sensing bulb directly behind door gap on right bottom side (see Figure 32).




Figure 33 - Positioning the Thermostat Sensing Bulb in the Vertical Position with the Capillary at the Bottom

5. The mounting clip must be a minimum of 3" from bottom of fireplace to prevent crimping of capillary. Once you have decided on a location, clean the area thoroughly. Remove the paper backing from the adhesive on back of mounting clip. Press the clip into the new location so that the thermostat sensing bulb will be positioned vertically with the capillary at the bottom (see Figure 33). Slide the thermostat sensing bulb into the clip.
