Owner's Instructions

Important Warranty Information Regarding Television Format Viewing

Standard screen format televisions (4:3, the aspect ratio of the screen width to height) are primarily designed to view standard format full-motion video. The images displayed on them should primarily be in the standard 4:3 ratio format and constantly moving. Displaying stationary graphics and images on screen, such as the dark top and bottom letterbox bars (wide screen pictures), should be limited to no more than 15% of the total television viewing per week.

Wide screen format televisions (16:9, the aspect ratio of the screen width to height) are primarily designed to view wide screen format full-motion video. The images displayed on them should primarily be in the wide screen 16:9 ratio format, or expanded to fill the screen if your model offers this feature, and constantly moving. Displaying stationary graphics and images on screen, such as the dark side-bars on non-expanded standard format television video and programming, should be limited to no more than 15% of the total television viewing per week.

Additionally, viewing other stationary images and text such as stock market reports, video game displays, station logos, web sites or computer graphics and patterns, should be limited as described above for all televisions. Displaying any stationary images that exceed the above guidelines can cause uneven aging of picture tubes (CRTs) that leave subtle, but permanent burned-in ghost images in the television picture. To avoid this, vary the programming and images, and primarily display full screen moving images, not stationary patterns or dark bars. On television models that offer picture sizing features, use these controls to view the different formats as a full screen picture.

Be careful in the selection and duration of television formats used for viewing. Uneven CRT aging as a result of format selection and use, as well as other burned-in images, is not covered by your Samsung limited warranty.





Familiarizing Yourself with The TV

Control Buttons

You can control your TV's basic features, including the on-screen menu. To use the more advanced features, you must use the remote control.



- **TV/VIDEO**(TX-R2676/TX-R3276) & SOURCE(TX-R2765/TX-R3065W/TX-R3265)
 - Press to change between viewing TV programs and signals from other components.
- MENU

Press to see an on-screen menu of your TV's features.

0 - VOL +

Press to increase or decrease the volume. Also used to select items on the on-screen menu.

Press to change channels. Also press to move between items on the on-screen menu.

Remote Control Sensor

Aim the remote control towards this spot on the TV.

TIMER indicator


When the TV is turned on, the TIMER indicator blinks five times. This indicator illuminates when the TIMER mode is set to the "On" position after setting the clock and either the On timer or Off timer, with the remote control. Even if the power is turned off, this indicator stays lit. (Clock must be set before using this function.)

O POWER

Press to turn the TV on and off.

Connection Jacks (Side)

You can connect an A/V component that is used only occasionally, such as a camcorder or video game. (For information on connecting equipment, see page 19.)



AUDIO Input

Connect audio signals from a camcorder or video game.

Ø VIDEO Input

Connect a video signal from a camcorder or video game.


0 S-VIDEO Input

Connect an S-Video signal from a camcorder or video game.

Connection Jacks (Rear)

Use the rear panel jacks to connect an A/V component that will be connected continuously, such as a VCR or a DVD player.

- Audio-Video Output jacks
 Connect to the audio/video input jacks of a
 recording VCR.
- Video Input jacks Connect to the video output jacks of VCRs, DVD players and similar devices.
- Audio Input jacks Connect to the audio output jacks of VCRs, DVD players and similar devices.
- Component Input jacks (Y, PB, PR, AUDIO-L/R) Connect to the Component audio and video outputs of DVD or DTV set-top box. 480i/480p/720p/1080i Y, PB and PR video signal inputs are available.

Remote Control

You can use the remote control up to about 23 feet from the TV. When using the remote, always point it directly at the TV.

Turns the TV on and off.

Adjust the TV sound by selecting one of the preset factory settings (or select your personal, customized sound settings).

@ P.MODE

Adjust the TV picture by selecting one of the preset factory settings (or select your personal, customized picture settings).

O Number buttons

Press to select channels directly on the TV.

+100

Press to select channels over 100. For example, to select channel 121, press "+100," then press "2" and "1."

O VOL +, VOL -

Press to increase or decrease the volume.

6 MUTE

Press to temporarily cut off the sound.

0 SLEEP

Press to select a preset time interval for automatic shut off.

O MENU


Displays the main on-screen menu.

O P.SIZE

Press to change the screen size.

@ R.SURF

Press to automatically return to a preferred channel after a user-preset time delay.



MODE

Selects a target device to be controlled by this remote control (i.e., TV, Samsung STB, VCR, Cable box, or DVD).

@ PRE-CH

Tunes to the previous channel.

® TV/VIDEO

Press to display all of the available video sources.

@ CHA, CHV

Press to change channels.

A INFO

Press to display information on the TV screen.





Connecting VHF and UHF Antennas



Antennas with 300-ohm Flat Twin Leads

If you are using an off-air antenna (such as a roof antenna or "rabbit ears") that has 300-ohm twin flat leads, follow the directions below.




Place the wires from the twin leads under the screws on the 300-75 ohm adaptor (not supplied). Use a screwdriver to tighten the screws.



Plug the adaptor into the "ANT 1 IN" terminal on the rear panel.




Antennas with 75-ohm Round Leads



Separate VHF and UHF Antennas


If you have two separate antennas for your TV (one VHF and one UHF), you must combine the two antenna signals before connecting the antennas to the TV. This procedure requires an optional combiner-adaptor (available at most electronics shops).






Connecting to a Cable Box that Descrambles All Channels

If your cable box descrambles only some channels (such as premium channels), follow the instructions below. You will need a two-way splitter, an RF (A/B) switch, and four lengths of coaxial cable. (These items are available at most electronics stores.)





Connecting a VCR

These instructions assume that you have already connected your TV to an antenna or a cable TV system (according to the instructions on pages $11\sim14$).

Connect a coaxial cable between the "ANT 1 IN" terminal on the TV and the antenna out terminal on the VCR. A coaxial cable is usually included with a VCR. (If not, check your local electronics store). 2 Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV IN 1 (L, R)" (or "AV IN 2/3 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and AUDIO OUT jacks on the VCR. If you have a mono VCR, connect L(mono) to VCR audio out using only one audio cable. 3 Connect a video cable between the "AV IN 1 (VIDEO)" (or "AV IN 2/3 (VIDEO)") jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jack on the VCR. Refer to your VCR's instructions for more information about how to view

your VCR tape.



Also, you can connect to "AV IN 1" on the side panel of TV.

Connecting a Second VCR to Record from the TV

Your TV can send out signals of its picture and sound to be recorded by a second VCR. To do this, connect your second VCR as follows:



Connect a set of audio cables between the AUDIO OUT jacks on the TV and the AUDIO IN jacks on the VCR. (The VCR input jacks might be either on the front or on back of the VCR.)

Connect a video cable between the VIDEO OUT jack on the TV and the VIDEO IN jack on the VCR.


The rear panel jacks on your TV make it easy to connect a DVD player to your TV.

Connecting to Y, PB, PR

Connect a set of audio cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (L, R)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the DVD player.

Connect a set of video cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (Y, PB, PR)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 (Y, PB, PR)") jacks on the TV and the VIDEO OUT (Y, PB, PR) jacks on the DVD player.



Connecting to Regular Audio and Video Jacks

Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV IN 1 (L, R)" (or "AV IN 2/3 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the DVD player.

Connect a video cable between the "AV IN 1 (VIDEO)" (or "AV IN 2/3 (VIDEO)") jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jack on the DVD player.


Connect a set of audio cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (L, R)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the set-top box.

Connect a set of video cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (Y, PB, PR)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 (Y, PB, PR)") jacks on the TV and the VIDEO OUT (Y, PB, PR) jacks on the set-top box.

Connecting a Camcorder

The side panel jacks on your TV make it easy to connect a Camcorder to your TV. They allow you to view the Camcorder tapes without using a VCR.


Locate the A/V output jacks on the Camcorder. They are usually found on the side or rear of the Camcorder.

Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV IN 4 (L, R)" jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the Camcorder.

If you have mono Camcorder, connect L(mono) to Camcorder audio out using only one audio cable.

Connect a video cable between the "AV IN 4 (VIDEO)" (or "S-VIDEO IN 2") jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jacks on the Camcorder.

The audio-video cables shown here are usually included with a Camcorder. (If not, check your local electronics store.) If your Camcorder is stereo, you need to connect a set of two cables.




Connecting to an Analog Amplifier

The "AUDIO OUT" terminals cannot be used for external speakers. You must hook them up to an amplifier.








Installing Batteries in the Remote Control





■ Make sure to match the "+" and "—" ends of the batteries with the diagram inside the compartment.



Remove the batteries and store them in a cool, dry place if you won't be using the remote control for a long time.

The remote control can be used up to about 23 feet from the TV. (Assuming typical TV usage, the batteries last for about one year.)





Memorizing the Channels


Your TV can memorize and store all of the available channels for both "off-air" (antenna) and cable channels. After the available channels are memorized, use the $CH \sim$ and $CH \sim$ buttons to scan through the channels. This eliminates the need to change channels by entering the channel digits. There are three steps for memorizing channels: selecting a broadcast source, memorizing the channels (automatic) and adding and deleting channels (manual).


Selecting the Video Signal-source

Before your television can begin memorizing the available channels, you must specify the type of signal source that is connected to the TV (i.e., an antenna or a cable system).











Storing Channels in Memory (Automatic Method)









The TV automatically cycles through all of the available channels and stores them in memory. This takes about one to two minutes.


Press the MENU button at any time to interrupt the memorization process and return to the Channel menu.



















Changing Channels

Using the Channel Buttons

Press the CH / or CH / button to change channels.

When you press CH o or CH o, the TV changes channels in sequence. You will see all the channels that the TV has memorized. (The TV must have memorized at least three channels.) You will not see channels that were either erased or not memorized.

Using the Number Buttons

Use the number buttons to quickly tune to any channel.

Press the number buttons to go directly to a channel.
For example, to select channel 27, press "2" then "7".
The TV will change channels when you press the second number.


When you use the number buttons, you can directly select channels that were either erased or not memorized.

To select a channel over 100, press the +100 button. (For channel 122, press "+100" then "2" then "2".)

To change to single-digit channels (0–9) faster, press "0" before the single digit. (For channel "4" press "0" then "4".)

Using the PRE-CH Button to Select the Previous Channel


Press the **PRE-CH** button. The TV changes to the last channel you were watching.



■ To quickly switch between two channels that are far apart, tune to one channel, then use the number button to select the second channel. Then, use the PRE-CH button to quickly alternate between them.

Labeling the Channels

Use this feature to assign an easy-to-remember label to any channel (i.e., "CBS", "ESPN", "PBS2", "CNN1", etc.) A label consists of four fields, where each field is a letter, a number, "*", or a blank. When the INFO button is pressed, the channel label will appear next to the channel number.






Setting the Clock

Setting the clock is necessary in order to use the various timer features of the TV. Also, you can check the time while watching the TV. (Just press the INFO button.)



Using the R.Surf Feature

This feature allows you to set the TV to return to a particular channel after a certain amount of time. For example, you may be watching a channel when commercials start. You can set the R.Surf to "5 minutes", then switch channels. After minutes, the TV will return to the original channel. To use the R.Surf feature:

Auto Volume

Viewing Closed Captions


Your TV decodes and displays the closed captions that are broadcast with certain TV shows. These captions are usually subtitles for the hearing impaired or foreign-language translations. All VCRs record the closed caption signal from television programs, so home-recorded video tapes also provide closed captions. Most pre-recorded commercial video tapes provide closed captions as well. Check for the closed caption symbol in your television schedule and on the tape's packaging: [CC].








- Misspellings and unusual characters sometimes occur during closed caption transmissions, especially those of live events. There may be a small delay before captions appear when you change channels. These are not malfunctions of the TV.
- In "Caption" mode, captions appear at the bottom of the screen, and they usually cover only a small portion of the picture.
 - In "Text" mode, information unrelated to the program, such as news or weather, is displayed. Text often covers a large portion of the screen.
- Depending on the particular broadcast, it might be necessary to make changes to "Channel" and "Field".
- Different channels and fields display different information: "Field 2" carries additional information that supplements the information in "Field 1". (For example, "Channel 1" may have subtitles in English, while "Channel 2" has subtitles in Spanish.)


The Movie rating system uses the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) system, and its main application is for movies.

When the Rating Control is on, the TV will automatically block any programs that are coded with objectionable ratings (either MPAA or TV-Ratings).









Important Notes About Parental Locks

Explanation of the MPAA and TV (FCC) Rating Systems:

Mature audiences only. This program may contain mature themes, profane language, graphic violence and explicit sexual content.

How to Reset the TV after the V-Chip Blocks ("Emergency Escape")

If the TV is tuned to a restricted channel, the V-Chip will block it. The screen will go blank and the following message will appear: "Excessive rating."

To resume normal viewing, tune to a different channel using the number buttons. Under certain conditions (depending on the rating of the local TV programs) the V-Chip might lock out all the channels. In this case, use the V-Chip function for an "emergency escape":

Customizing Your Remote Control

Chapter Five

Troubleshooting

If the TV seems to have a problem, first try this list of possible problems and solutions. If none of these troubleshooting tips apply, then call your nearest Samsung authorized service center.

Identifying Problems

Problem	Possible Solution
Poor picture.	Try another channel. Adjust the antenna. Check all wire connections.
Poor sound quality.	Try another channel. Adjust the antenna.
No picture or sound.	Try another channel. Press the TV/VIDEO button. Make sure the TV is plugged in. Check the antenna connections. Make sure the MUTE button is off.
No color, wrong colors or tints.	Make sure the program is broadcast in color. Adjust the picture settings.
Picture rolls vertically.	Adjust the antenna. Check all wire connections. If you are using a VCR, check the tracking.
The TV operates erratically.	Unplug the TV for 30 seconds, then try operating it again.
Your remote control does not operate your TV.	Press the MODE button to put your remote control in the "TV" mode. Make sure the remote has batteries. Check that the "+" and "-" ends of the batteries are inserted correctly. Check that the batteries are drained.
The TV won't turn on.	Make sure the wall outlet is working. Make sure the TV is plugged in. Make sure the remote has batteries.

Cleaning and Maintaining Your TV

Please follow these guidelines to get the maximum performance from your TV.

Placement

- Do not place the TV near extremely hot, cold, humid or dusty places.
- Do not place the TV near appliances with electric motors that create magnetic fields, such as vacuum cleaners.
- Keep the ventilation openings clear; do not place the TV on a soft surface, such as cloth or paper.
- Place the TV in a vertical position only.

Liquids

• Do not handle liquids near or on the TV. Liquids that spill into it can cause serious damage.

Cabinet

- Never open the cabinet or touch the parts inside.
- Wipe your TV with a clean, dry cloth. Never use water, cleaning fluids, wax, or chemicals.
- Do not put heavy objects on top of the cabinet.

Temperature

 If your TV is suddenly moved from a cold to a warm place, unplug the power cord, and allow at least two hours for moisture that may have formed inside the unit to dry completely.

Using Your TV in Another Country

If you plan to take your TV with you to a foreign country, please be aware of the different television systems that are in use around the world. A TV designed for one system may not work properly with another system due to differences in the TV channel frequencies.
