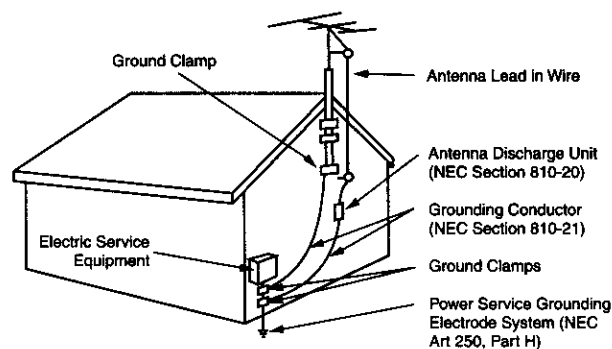

## 14. Outdoor Antenna Grounding

If an outside antenna or cable system is connected to the product, be sure the antenna or cable system is grounded so as to provide some protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges. Article 810 of the National Electrical Code (U.S.A.), ANSI/ NFPA 70 provides information with regard to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna-discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, and requirements for the grounding electrode.

## 15. Lightning

For added protection for this product (receiver) during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the product due to lightning and power-line surges.

## 16. Power Lines

An outside antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing an outside antenna system, extreme care should be taken to keep from touching such power lines or circuits as contact with them might be fatal.

## 17. Overloading

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in a risk of fire or electric shock.

## 18. Object and Liquid Entry

Never push objects of any kind into this product through openings as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short-out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the product.

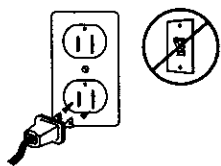

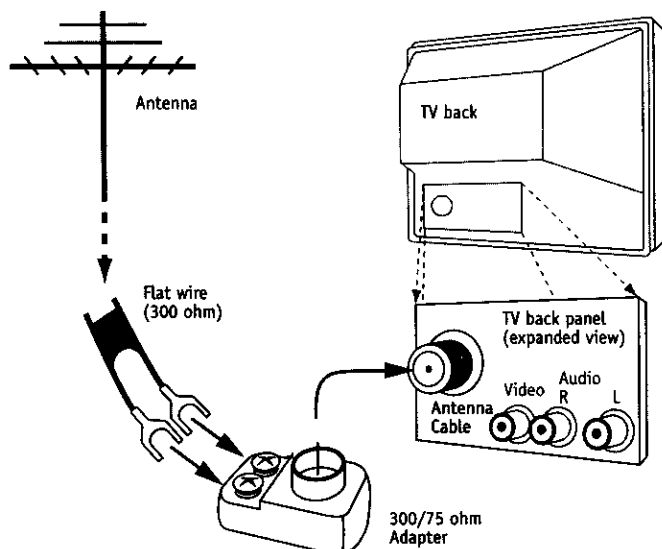

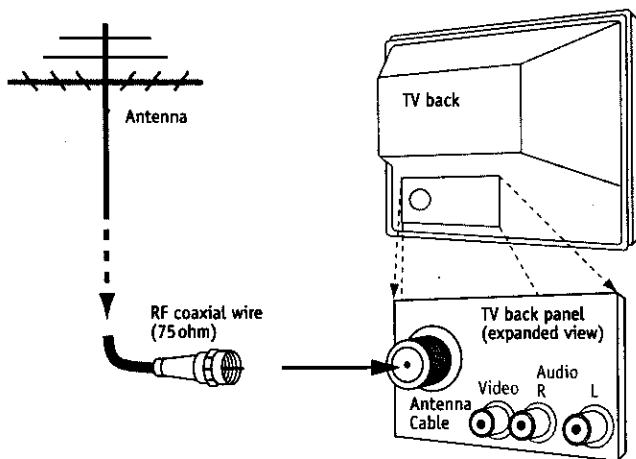

### 75 OHM RF CABLE

The wire that comes from an off-air antenna or cable service provider. Each end looks like a hex shaped nut with a wire sticking through the middle, and it screws onto the threaded jack on the back of you Entertainment Machine.

### 300 TO 75 OHM ADAPTER

A small device that connects a two-wire 300 ohm antenna to a 75 ohm RF jack. They are usually about an inch long with two screws on one end and a round opening with a wire sticking out on the other end.

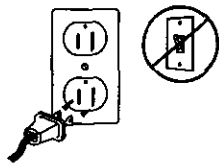

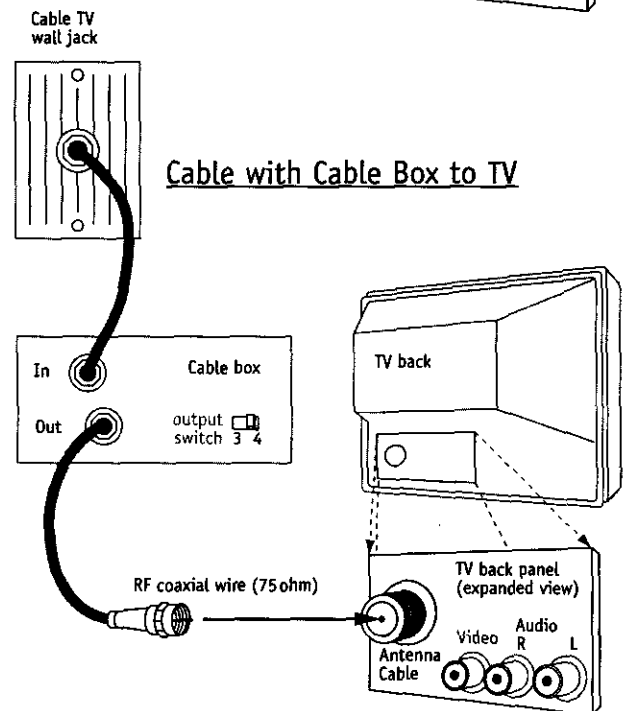

## Cable with Cable Box to TV



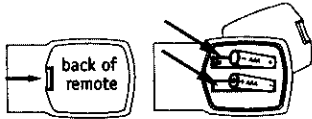

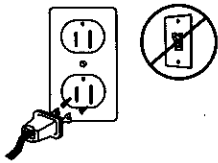

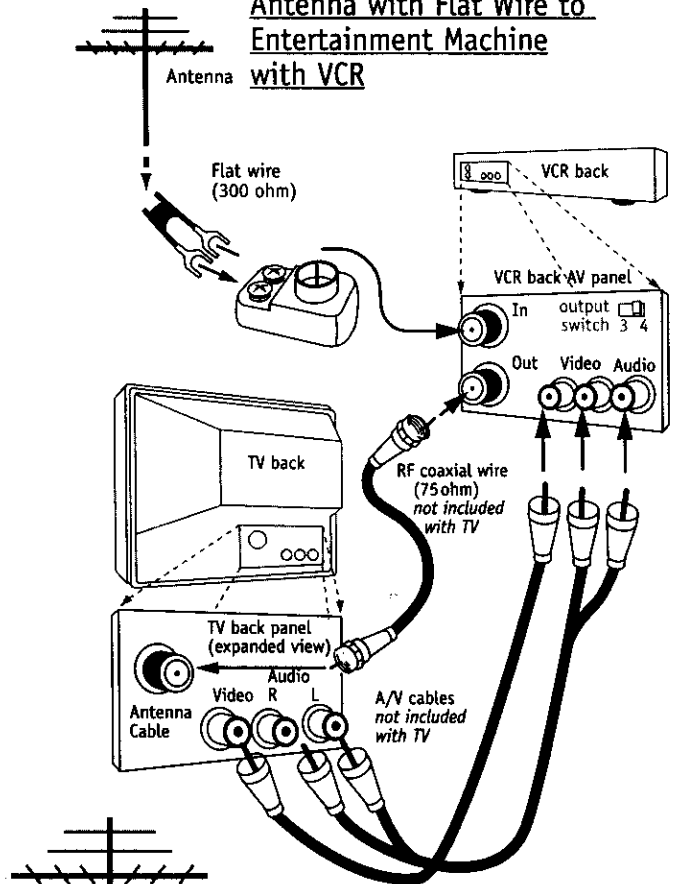

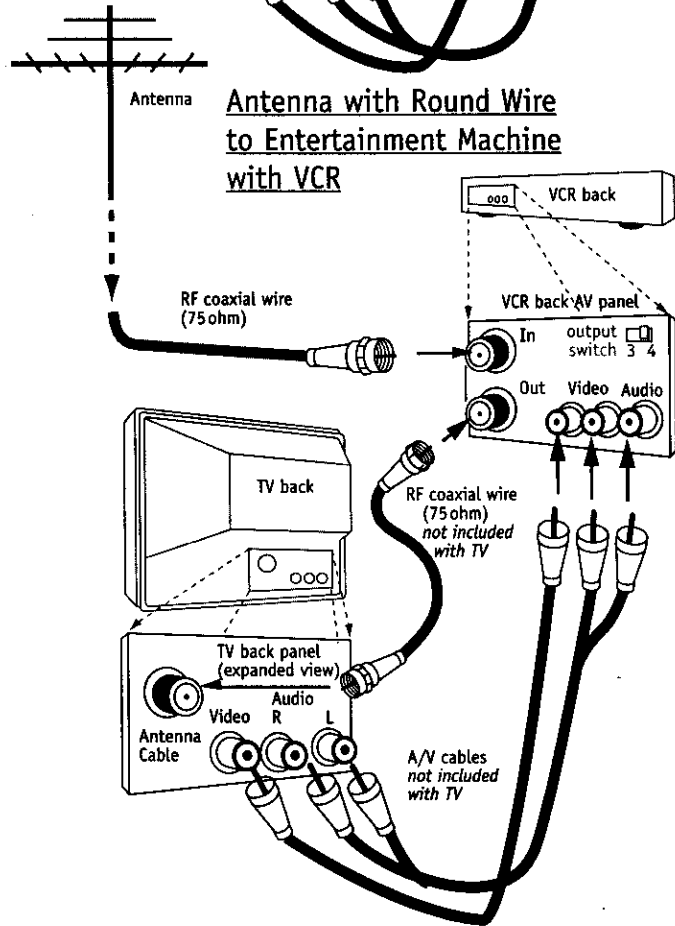

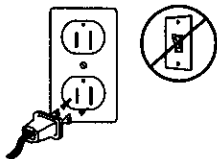

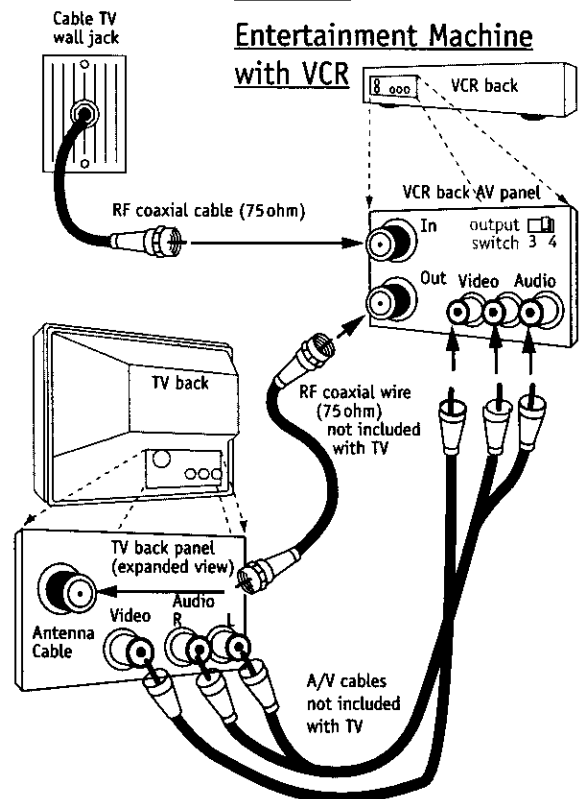

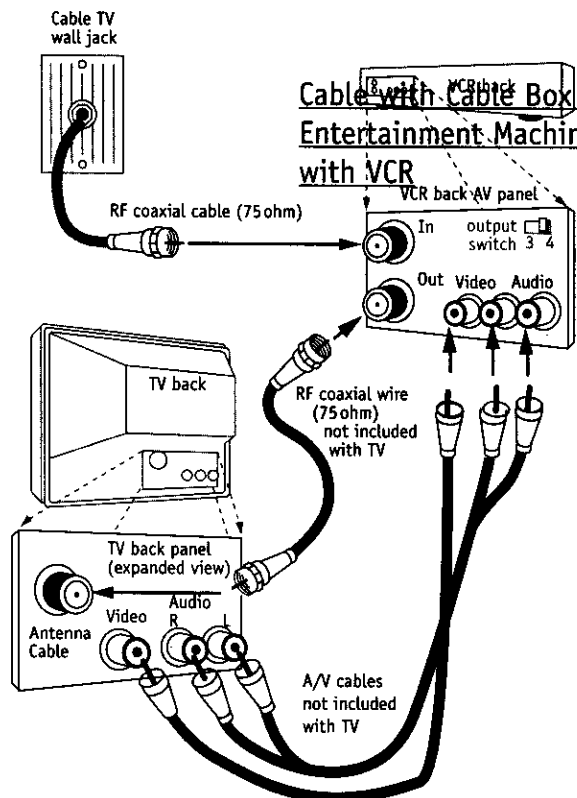

### Cable to Entertainment Machine with VCR

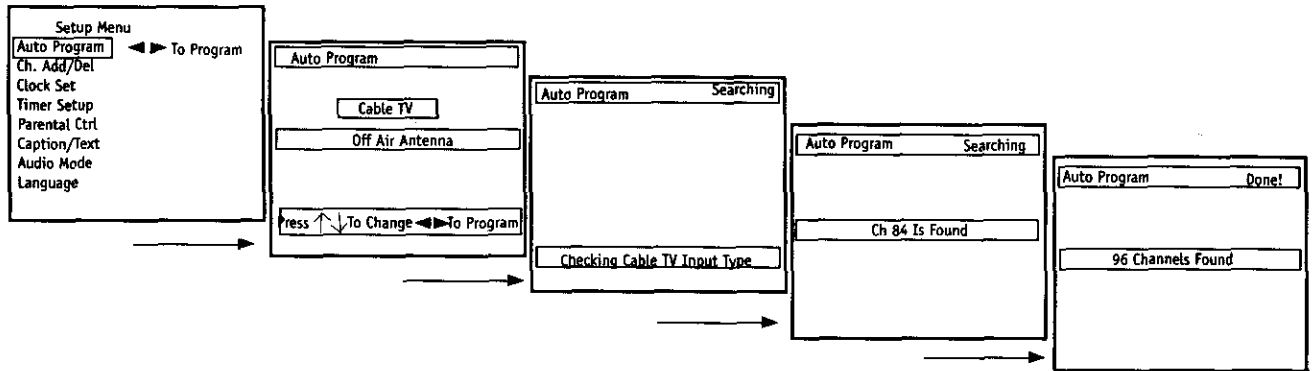


### Cable with Cable Box to Entertainment Machine with VCR

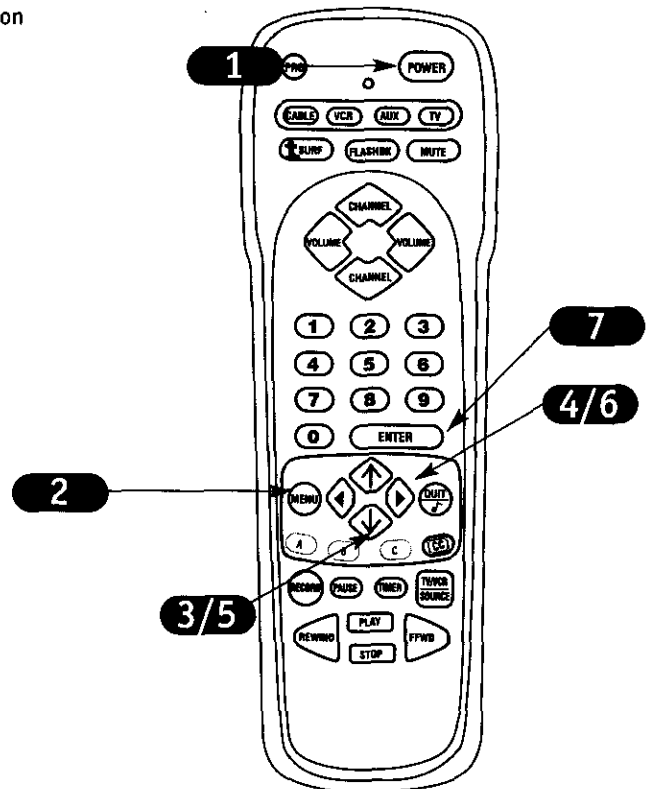


## Auto Program

Use Auto Program to automatically find and store all of the stations available in your area.



- 1** With the remote control in hand, press the POWER button to turn on your Entertainment Machine.
- 2** Press the MENU key so the Setup menu appears.
- 3** Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select Auto Program on your screen.
- 4** Press a RIGHT or LEFT arrow to reach the Auto Program screen.
- 5** Using the UP/DOWN arrows, choose either Cable TV or Off-Air Antenna on your screen.
- 6** Press a RIGHT or LEFT arrow to begin Auto Program.
- 7** Press ENTER or QUIT to return to TV viewing.

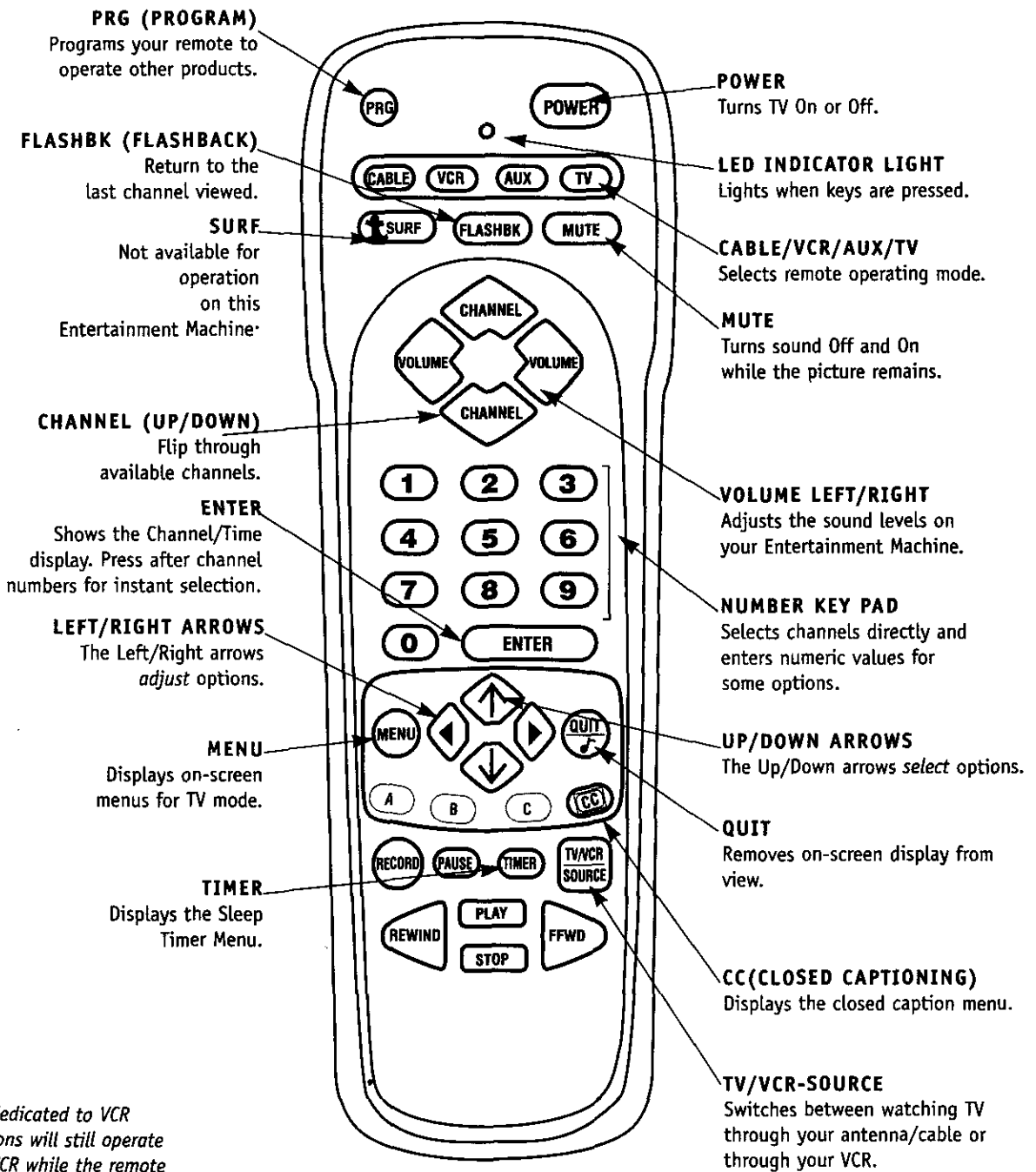

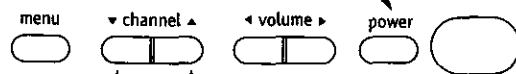
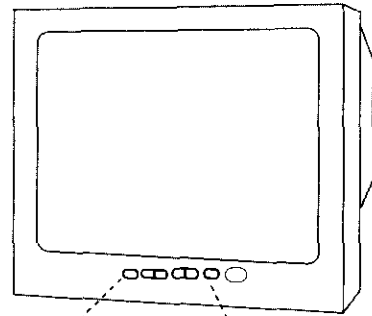
To access the Setup menus, press the MENU button once; to get the Video menus, press the MENU button twice.

## Basic Television Operation

*Introducing you to the basics of your Entertainment Machine.*

### Source

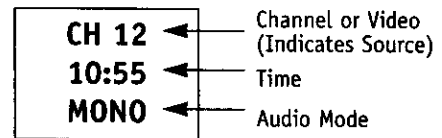
The source button (TV/VCR/SOURCE) on the remote switches between the Video input and Cable/Antenna input. On some models, the A/V input is designated as a channel that is one below the lowest/one above the highest. You'll have to use the Channel Up/Down buttons to access it. The Time/Channel display will read "Video" in place of a channel number.

**Cable/Antenna Input:** This setting allows you to change cable or antenna channels and to view videocassettes on channel 3 (or 4) in mono sound.

**Video Input:** This setting allows stereo playback of videocassettes. The television cannot change channels in the Video mode, but the VCR can.



*To view the current input source, press ENTER on your remote. The Time/Channel display should appear in the upper right hand corner of the screen. If the display reads 'Video,' then the source is an A/V input. If the display reads a channel number, then the source is your Cable or Antenna.*



*This is an example of the Time/Channel display that appears in the top corner of your screen.*

### Channel Changing

**CHANNEL UP/DOWN arrows:** Use these arrows to change the channels. Auto program will have found all channels available to you.

**NUMBER Key Pad:** To skip to any channel, enter the number of the channel using the NUMBER key pad, then press ENTER.

**FLASHBACK:** To instantly return to the last channel viewed, press FLASHBACK.

### Audio

**Volume Right/Left:** To adjust the volume level, use the volume Right/Left arrows. To silence your Entertainment Machine instantly, press MUTE once. To get the sound back, press MUTE again.

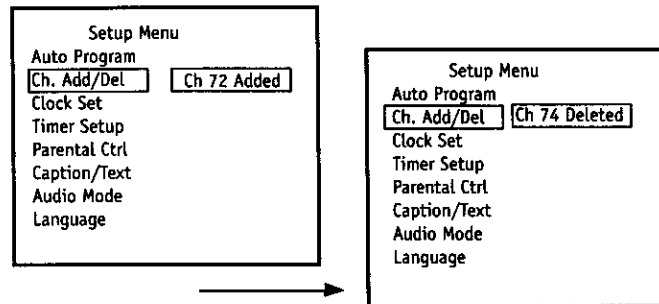

## Setting Ch. Add/Del

Customize your channel selection.



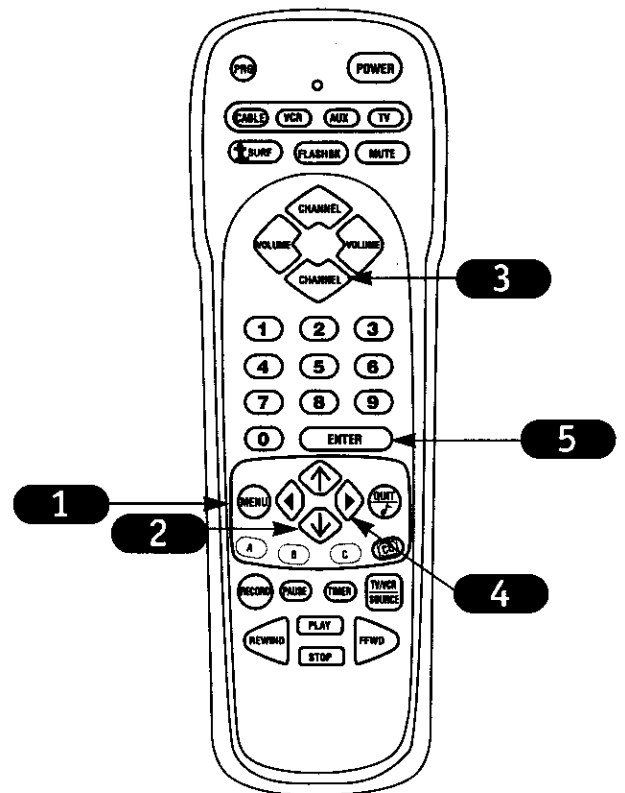
- 1 Press the MENU key on the remote so the Setup menu appears.
- 2 Select the Ch. Add/Delete menu using the UP/DOWN arrows.
- 3 Using either the NUMBER key pad or the CHANNEL UP/DOWN arrows on the remote, select a channel. (If adding a deleted channel, you will need to use the NUMBER key pad.)
- 4 Using the RIGHT/LEFT arrows, pick whether that channel is Added or Deleted.
- 5 To continue, select another channel and repeat step 4. If you are finished, press ENTER to return to TV viewing.



You can add or delete a channel without the remote control by using the buttons and working the menus on the front of your Entertainment Machine.



If you delete a channel, it isn't gone for good. Just select it using the NUMBER key pad on the remote or add it later.

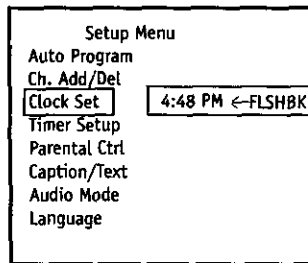


### Channel Selection

- ADD** This function lets you add new channels to the list that you'll scroll through when using your remote.
- DELETE** This function lets you remove channels that you don't watch from the list you'll scroll through.

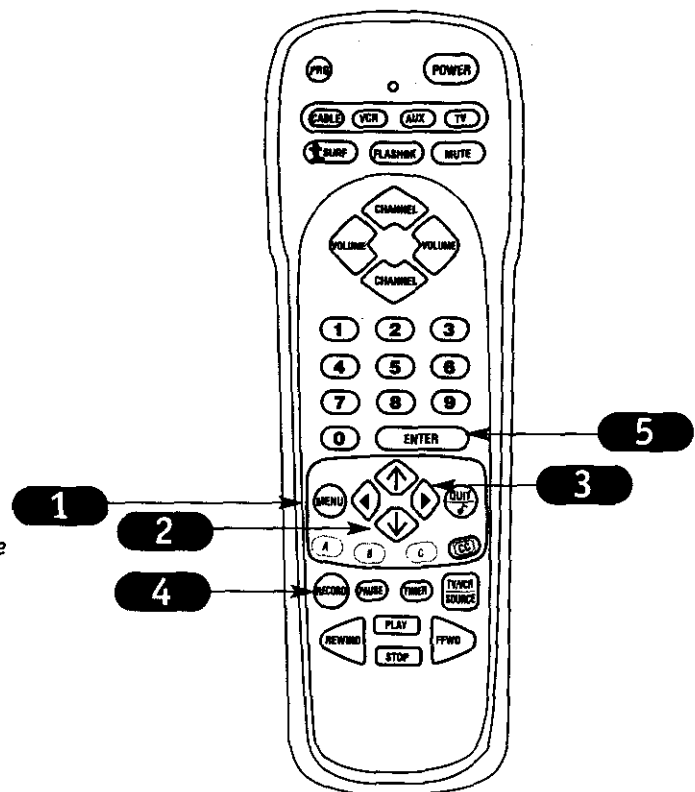

- 5 Press ENTER to return to TV viewing.



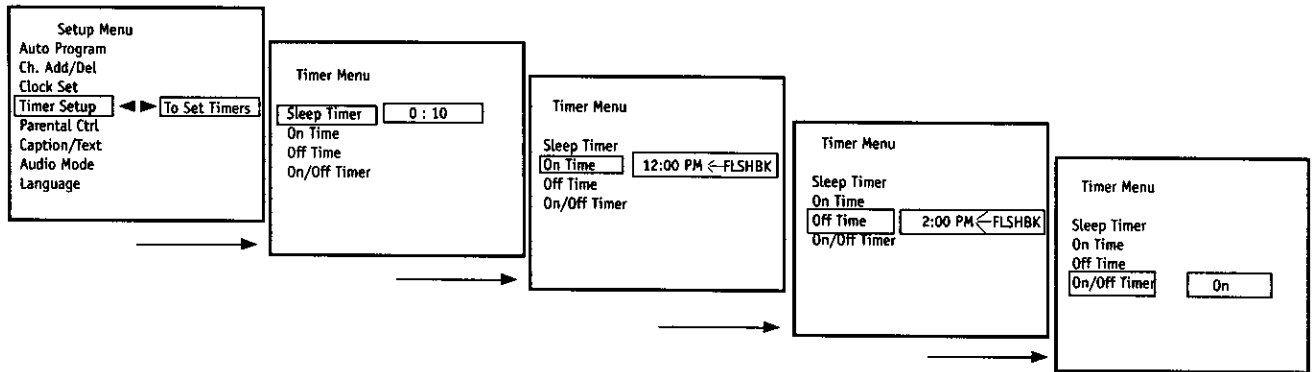

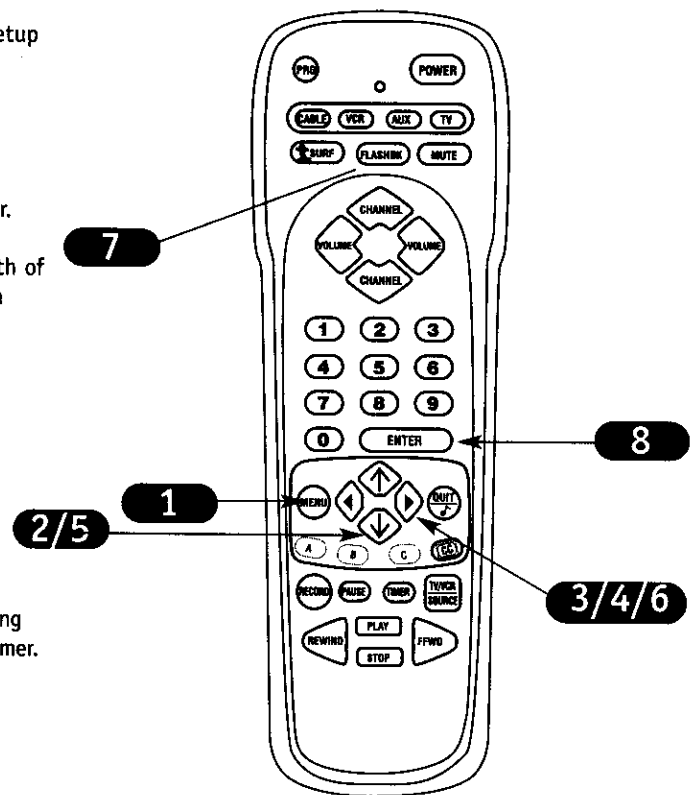


# Timer

Automatically turn your Entertainment Machine on or off.



- 1 Press the MENU key on the remote control so that the Setup menu appears.
- 2 Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select Timer Setup on your screen.
- 3 Press a RIGHT/LEFT arrow. The Timer Setup screen will appear.
- 4 **Sleep Timer:** Use the RIGHT/LEFT arrows to choose a length of time until the Entertainment Machine shuts down (select a countdown from ten minutes to four hours).
- 5 **On Time:** Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select On Time on your screen.
- 6 Press a RIGHT/LEFT arrow to adjust the time your Entertainment Machine will automatically turn on.
- 7 Press the FLASHBK button to select AM or PM.
- 8 Press ENTER to return to TV viewing or continue programming by repeating the above steps for Off Time and the On/Off Timer.



The On/Off timer will not work until the Clock on your television has been set.

*Reading this page may help to give you a better overall knowledge of the Parental Control feature.*

### AN OVERVIEW

Parental Control allows the user the capability of defining which program rating they consider acceptable to the younger or more sensitive viewer. It can be preset and turned either on or off by the user who specifies the secret 4-number code. The number of hours blocked can be specified. General audience and children viewer blocks can both be programmed into the TV's memory. Viewer ratings are specified for both TV and the motion picture industry; both rating systems can be used. These ratings are based mainly on the ages of children.

*Below are listed explanations of each of the blocking options and a guide to help you access and select the the Parental Control option best suited for your viewing environment.*

**Aux. Block:** Allows you to block the signal sent by equipment connected to the TV Audio/Video input jacks such as a VCR, a DVD Player, Laser Disc Player, etc. So, if you do not wish somebody to watch a videotape, a Laser Disc, etc, just set the Aux. Block to **Sources Blocked**.

**MPAA:** The Motion Picture Association of America's Rating system has been included for those people who may be more familiar with this rating system. There are six levels of settings. They are: **G and Above**, **PG and Above**, **PG-13 and Above**, **R and Above**, **NC-17 and Above**, and **X**. Press ◀▶ to access.  
**NOTE:** If you choose TV-PG, all of the more restrictive ratings will be automatically blocked. This means that the viewer will not be able to see TV-PG, TV-14, or TV-MA rated programming.

**Age Block:** You may wish to use these ratings instead. They are divided into two groups, General and Children.  
**GENERAL:** These settings are: **TV-G and Above**, **TV-PG and Above**, **TV-14 and Above** and **TV-MA**.  
**CHILDREN:** These settings are: **TV-Y and Above** and **TV-Y7**. Press ◀▶ to access.

**Content Block:** Once again, there are six designated blocks that you can access. They are: **Dialog**, **Language**, **Sex Scenes**, **Violence**, **F Violence** and **No Rating**. These settings allow you the option to block the program "Content" based on individual parameters such as: Strong Dialog, Bad Language, Sex Scenes, Violence Scenes or Fantasy Violence Scenes and then to select an age level as well. Press ◀▶ to access.

**Set Hours:** Use this setting to enter the amount of hours you wish the Parental Control feature to be active.

**Set Password:** Select a secret password or code, using the number keys on the remote control. Don't forget the password, it is the only way you can access the Parental Control menu and change the rating selections. It is also the only way you can turn the Parental Control feature off.

**Lock On Off:** This setting gives you the option to have the Parental Control feature active all the time or allow you to turn it on or off as needed.



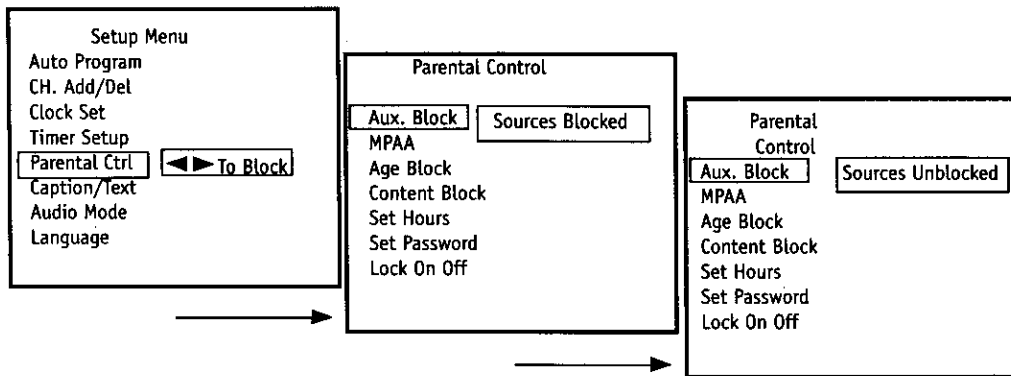
*Simply specifying one content block such as Sex Scenes, will not automatically block another content in the programs from appearing.*




*Even if you choose to leave the Aux inputs unblocked, the ratings you specify will automatically restrict the programming that appears from the video sources.*


## Parental Control


This feature offers a wide variety of options and settings that restrict or "block" undesirable programming from appearing on your TV screen.

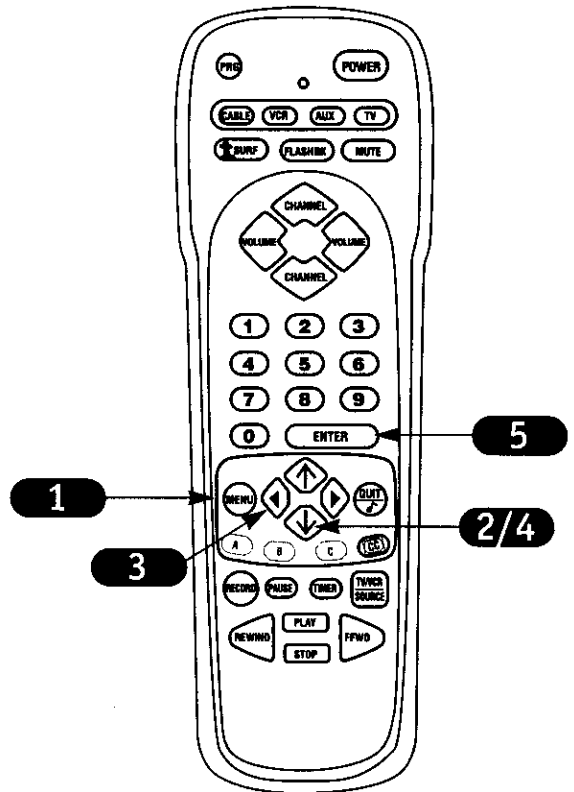


- 1** Press the MENU key on the remote control so that the Setup menu appears onscreen.
- 2** Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select Parental Ctrl on your screen.
- 3** Press a RIGHT or LEFT arrow and a larger Menu with more specific and defined options will appear onscreen.
- 4** Press the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, to make a selection.
- 5** Press ENTER to return to TV viewing.

 For a complete restriction coverage you should set restrictions for both General and Children in the Age Block Option.

 You can set Parental Control for general audiences and for children to be active at the same time.

 You cannot disable Parental Control by disconnecting the TV from power. Blocked hours will automatically reset to the original blocked time setting specified, if power is disconnected.



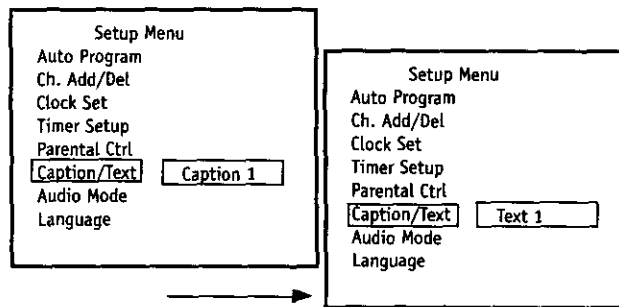

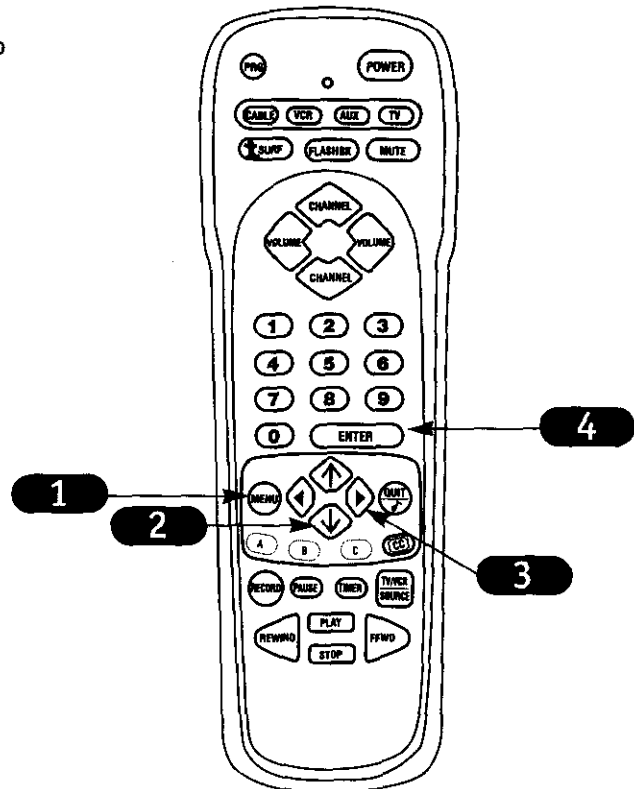

- 4 Press ENTER to return to TV viewing.



Captions come in handy when the television is on mute.



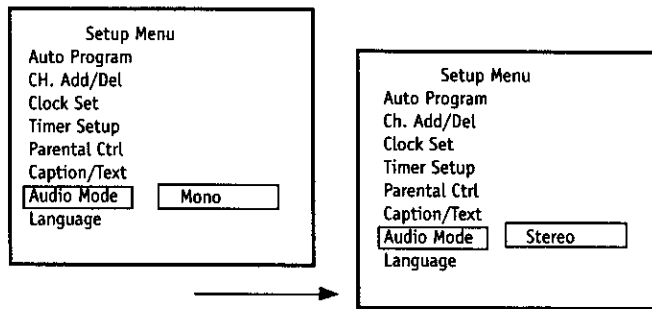

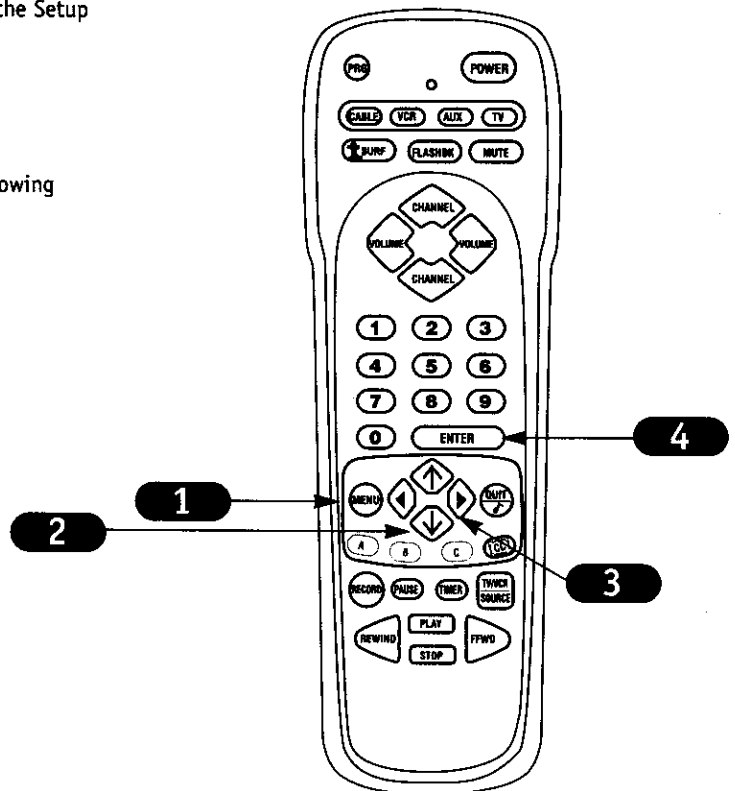

## Audio Mode

Choose between stereo sound and mono sound.



- 1 Press the MENU key on the remote control so that the Setup menu appears.
- 2 Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select Audio Mode on the screen.
- 3 Press a RIGHT/LEFT arrow to choose one of the following options: Stereo or Mono.
- 4 Press ENTER to return to TV viewing.

### STEREO SOUND

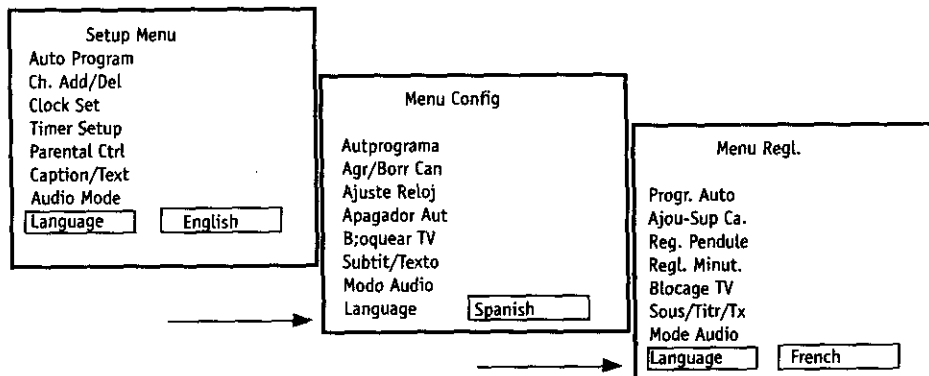
STEREO (stereophonic) sound refers to audio that's divided into right and left sides.

### MONO SOUND

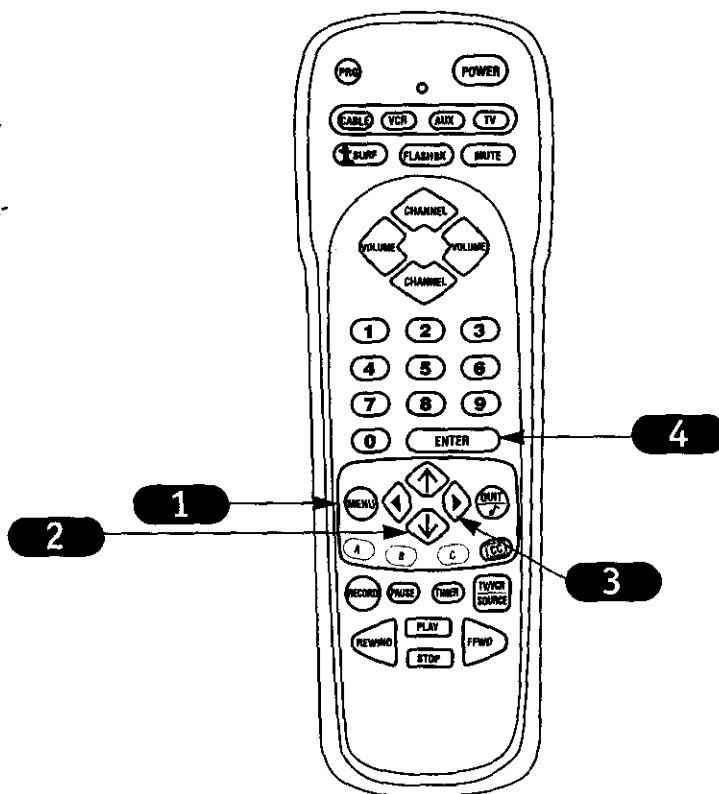
Mono (monaural) sound is one channel of sound. All the speakers play the same audio.

## Language Options

Choose the language you want all of the menus to appear in.

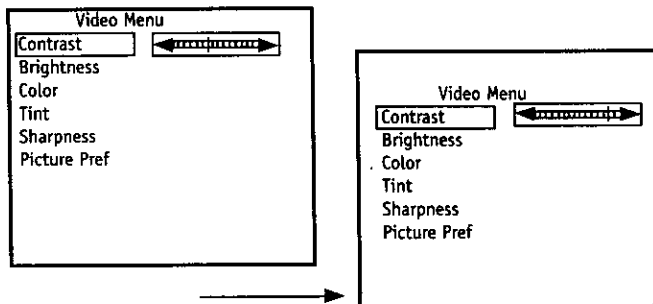


- 1 Press the MENU key on the remote control so that the Setup menu appears.
- 2 Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select Language on your screen.
- 3 Press a RIGHT/LEFT arrow to choose any of the following options: English, Spanish, or French.
- 4 Press ENTER to return to regular TV viewing.



## Video Menu

Use the video menu to customize how your picture looks.



**1** Press the MENU key repeatedly until the Video menu appears.  
Your options are:

- **Contrast:** Adjusts the level of difference between white and black in the TV picture. The more contrast, the brighter the picture appears.
- **Brightness:** Increases or decreases amount of white in the TV picture.
- **Color:** Adjusts levels of all colors in the TV picture.
- **Tint:** Balance between amount of red and green in the TV picture.
- **Sharpness:** Raise or lower the definition of the TV picture. The lower the level, the softer the images will appear.
- **Picture Preference:** Choose either Custom or Preset.  
Custom allows you to set the picture the way you want.  
Preset moves all the above options back to their original, factory-set levels.

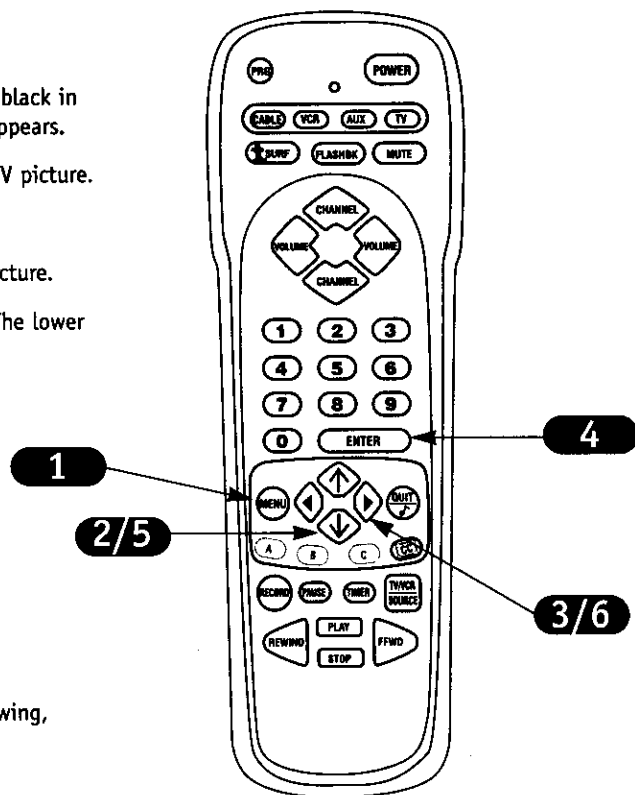
**2** Using the UP/DOWN arrows on the remote control, select Contrast on your screen.

**3** Using the RIGHT/LEFT arrows, adjust the contrast level to your preference.

**4** Press ENTER, QUIT or MENU one more time to return to TV viewing, or repeat from step four to set the other menu options.

**5** Using the Up/Down arrow, select Picture Pref. on your screen.

**6** Using the RIGHT/LEFT arrows, choose either the original settings with Preset or use your own settings with Custom.



## Programming the Remote

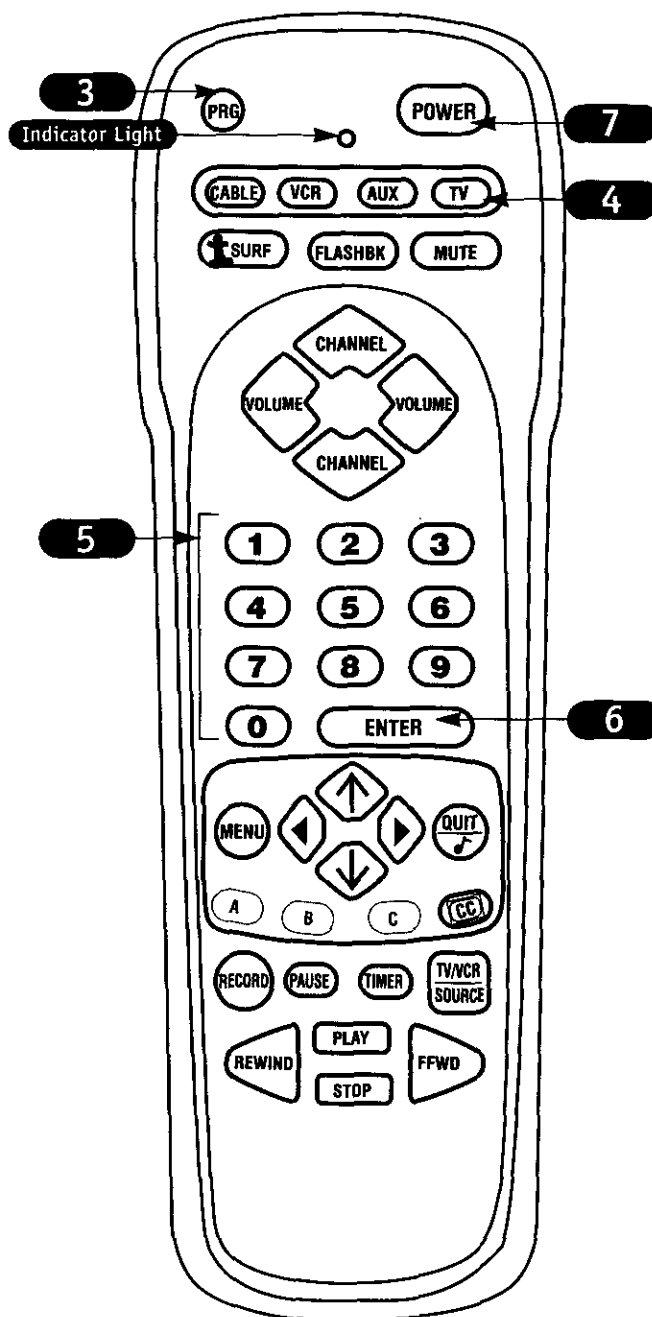
- 1** The device you want to program should be ON.
- 2** On the chart in this manual, find the type of device you're programming and then find the brand name. Make a note of the three-digit code—you'll need it soon.
- 3** Press and hold the PRG key. It's recessed so it doesn't get pushed accidentally. When the indicator light turns on, you can release the button.
- 4** Push the button with the name of the device you're programming (VCR, CABLE, AUX, TV).
- 5** Using the number pad, enter the three digit code found on the chart in the Reference section.
- 6** Press ENTER to save the code. The indicator light will flash three times and turn off if the code was accepted.
- 7** Aim the remote at the device and push the POWER button. It should turn off. If not, try the other codes listed and continue from step three.

## AUX+1, AUX+2, AUX+3

Control up to seven different devices with your remote!

**1** Refer to the chart in this manual to find the type and brand name of the device you're programming.

**2** Press and hold the PRG key until the indicator light turns on.

**3** Press the AUX key and the 1 on the number pad at the same time (for AUX +1).

**4** Using the number pad, enter the three-digit code for the device you've selected.

**5** Press Enter to save the code.

**6** Aim the remote at the device and press POWER. It should turn on.

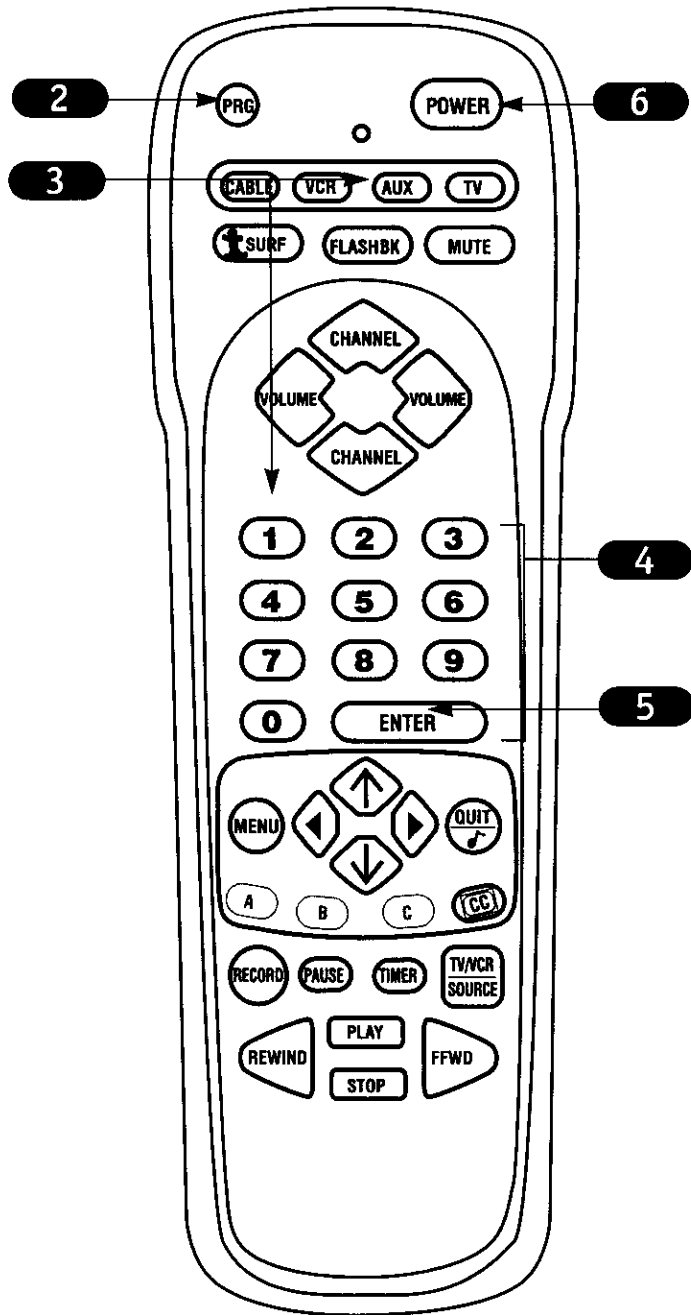
**7** Repeat the steps for AUX+2, and AUX+3.

## Remote Control Auto-Find

If Programming the Remote did not find your code, try this procedure to automatically find the code for your device. If your remote becomes inoperable, go back to "Programming your Remote" and enter the Zenith TV code for step five.

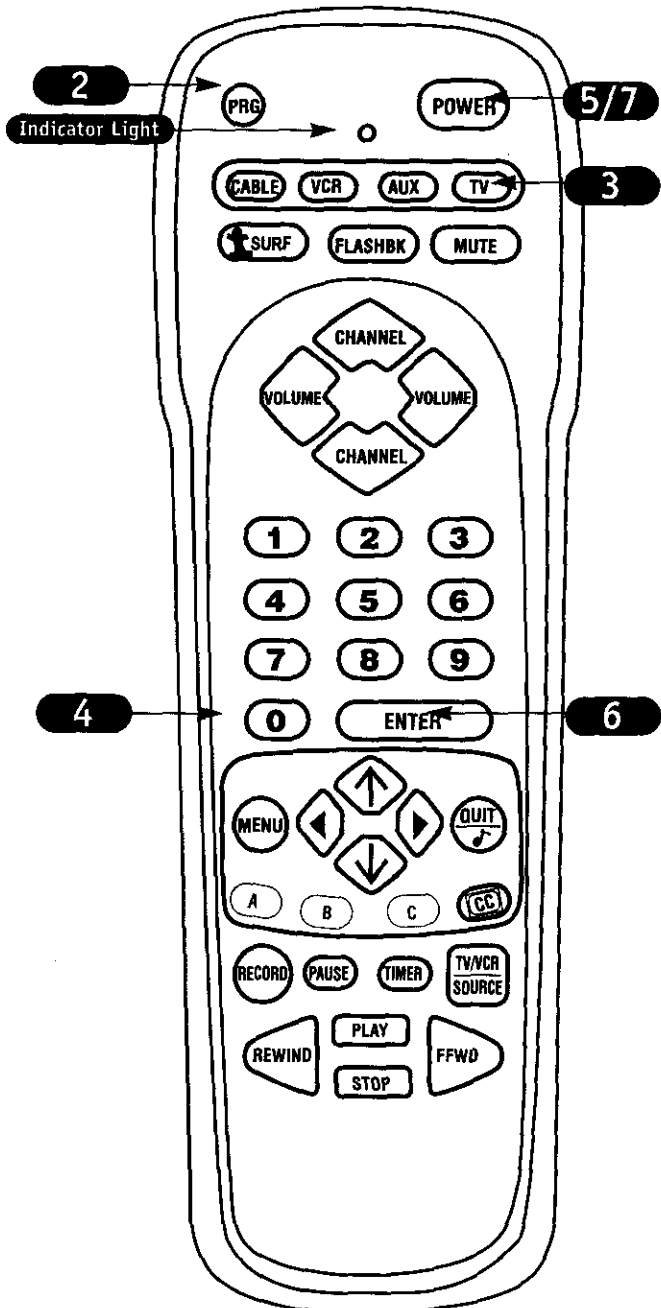
- 1** Turn on the device you're programming for the remote control.
- 2** Press and hold the PRG key until the indicator light turns on.
- 3** Press the key for the device you're trying to program (CABLE, VCR, AUX, TV).
- 4** Enter the code 0-0-0 (zero-zero-zero), then press the ENTER key right away.
- 5** Aim the remote at the correct device and press the POWER button. Allow a second to pass, then push the POWER button again. Repeat until the device turns off. (This is a trial and error process, so it may be necessary to repeat these steps until the remote finds your code.)
- 6** Push ENTER to save the code.
- 7** Press POWER to turn the device back on.



*You can quickly get out of Auto Find by pressing the Quit button.*



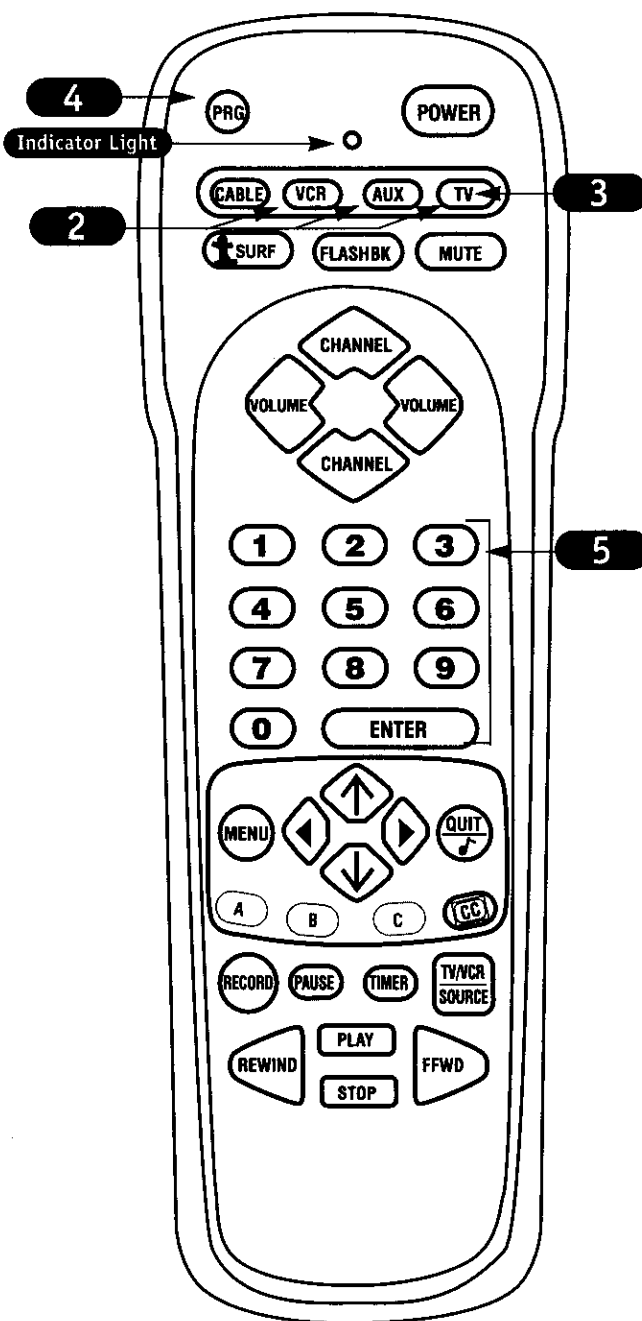
*If the indicator light stays on while you push Power, instead of turning off, all the codes have been tried and your device can't be programmed.*



## Amplifier Volume Override

Control the volume on your sound amplifier without leaving TV mode.

- 1 Program the code that operates your amplifier into the CABLE or AUX mode, as described on the "Programming Your Remote" page.
- 2 Select the mode in which you want volume to appear (e.g. TV).
- 3 Press and hold PRG on your remote until the indicator light stays lit.
- 4 Press 4-9-9; then ENTER on the remote. The indicator light will flash three times if code is accepted.
- 5 Audio system volume/mute now appears in the mode selected.



Your volume and mute keys now control your amplifier, while all the other keys still operate the Entertainment Machine. To put everything back to normal, reprogram all buttons with their original codes (see the "Programming Your Remote" section).



If you can't find the code for your amplifier, use the Auto Find feature.

#### AMPLIFIER

An external machine that amplifies sound from a television, CD player, VCR, or other A/V device.

<b>Multiple images or 'ghost shadows.'</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Check your antenna direction and/or location.</li> <li>• Make sure the wire from your antenna to your Entertainment Machine is properly connected.</li> </ul>
<b>Interference: Sharp lines across the screen and poor sound.</b>	<p><i>The following may cause image problems or distortion: Electrical appliances, powerful lights, cars, trucks; computers or portable phones; medical equipment</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If possible increase the distance between your Entertainment Machine™ and the offending appliance. Or shut one of them off.</li> </ul>
<b>Normal picture but no sound.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Check volume control.</li> <li>• Make sure the TV is not Muted.</li> <li>• Try another channel. The problem may be the broadcast, not your Entertainment Machine™.</li> <li>• Are the Audio A/V cables properly installed?</li> <li>• Are the wires for external speakers (if you have external speakers) properly installed?</li> </ul>
<b>No picture and poor sound.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Are you in TV or cable tuning mode and should be in the other?</li> <li>• Make sure output channels on all A/V equipment are on the same channel (3 or 4).</li> <li>• Check that all connections are tight.</li> </ul>

<b>No color, but the sound is O.K.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Check the color control in the Video menu.</li> <li>• Try another channel. The problem may be with the broadcast.</li> </ul>
<b>Picture has a big black box on it, but the sound is O.K.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The CC (closed caption) option may be in Text mode. Select OFF in the Captions/Text menu.</li> </ul>
<b>Picture has two horizontal black bars, one on top and one on bottom.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Your program is in letterbox. This means that the shape of your TV is a square, but the program is a rectangle. Think of the bars as empty space the program doesn't fill; not picture that's blocked out. Because this format is a direct representation of film as you see it in the movies, you are actually seeing MORE of the program when you see those bars. Trust us.</li> </ul>

## Glossary

*A complete list of definitions for words found in this guide.*

<b>75 OHM RF CABLE</b>	The wire that comes from an off-air antenna or cable service provider. The end looks like a hex-shaped nut with a wire sticking through the middle. It screws onto the threaded jack on the back of your TV.
<b>300 TO 75 OHM ADAPTER</b>	A small device that connects a two-wire 300 ohm antenna to a 75 ohm RF jack. They are usually about an inch long with two screws on one end and a round opening with a wire sticking out on the other end.
<b>A/V CABLES</b>	Audio/Video cables. Three cables bunched together—right audio (red), left audio (white), and video (yellow). A/V cables are used for stereo playback of videocassettes and for higher quality picture and sound from other A/V devices.
<b>ADD</b>	This function lets you add new channels to list that you'll scroll through when using your remote.
<b>ANTENNA</b>	The physical receiver of television signals sent over the air. A large metal piece of equipment does not always have to be visible for your home to be using an antenna.
<b>AUTO PROGRAM</b>	Auto Program has your Entertainment Machine automatically find all the channels available in your area.
<b>BLOCK</b>	Restrict or censor a channel for a set length of time.
<b>DELETE</b>	This function lets you remove channels that you don't watch from the list you'll scroll through using your remote.
<b>INPUT</b>	Refers to the jack that receives a signal from a TV, VCR or other A/V device.
<b>JACK</b>	A connection on the back of a TV, VCR, or any other A/V device.
<b>MONO SOUND</b>	Mono (monaural) sound is one channel of sound. On more than one speaker, all the speakers play the same audio.
<b>OUTPUT</b>	Refers to the jack that sends a signal out of a VCR, DVD, or other A/V device.
<b>SECOND AUDIO PROGRAMMING/SAP</b>	Second Audio Programming (SAP) is another, separate, audio channel available with some programming. Choosing SAP often refers to listening to audio in another language, such as Spanish or French.
<b>SIGNAL</b>	Picture and sound traveling through cable, or on the air, to your television screen.
<b>STEREO SOUND</b>	Stereo (stereophonic) sound refers to audio that's divided into right and left sides.
<b>TUNER</b>	Device that picks up the signal and turns them into picture and sound.



## Maintenance

### *Caring for your Entertainment Machine.*

*Early malfunctions can be prevented. Careful and regular cleaning can extend the amount of time you will have with your new Entertainment Machine. Be sure to turn the power off and pull out the plug before you begin any cleaning.*

### Screen Cleaning

1. Here's a great way to keep the dust off your screen for a while. Wet a soft cloth in a mixture of lukewarm water and a little fabric softener or dish washing detergent. Wring the cloth until it's almost dry, and then use it to wipe the screen.
2. Make sure the excess water is off the screen, and then let it air-dry before you turn on your Entertainment Machine.

### Cabinet Cleaning

1. Use a soft cloth with a mild soap solution to wipe the cabinet (avoid using any cleaner that says "industrial strength" or "will wash the white off of rice" on the label).
2. Rinse the cloth and wipe the cabinet again.
3. Let the cabinet air-dry before turning the Entertainment Machine on.

### Wood Cabinets

Use a quality wood cleaner and polish. This will protect the Entertainment Machine from dirt and dust, as well as keep the cabinet looking new.

### Extended Absence

If you leave your Entertainment Machine dormant for a long time (such as a vacation), it's a good idea to unplug the power to protect against possible damage from lightning or power surges. If you use an off-air antenna, you may also want to disconnect it from the back of your TV before leaving.

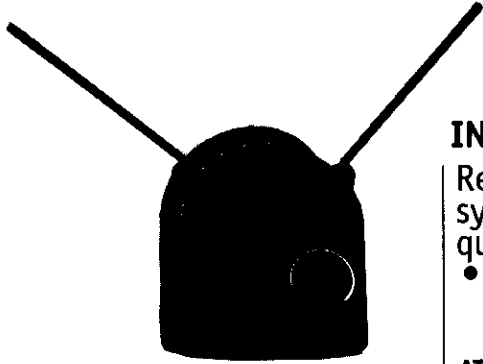

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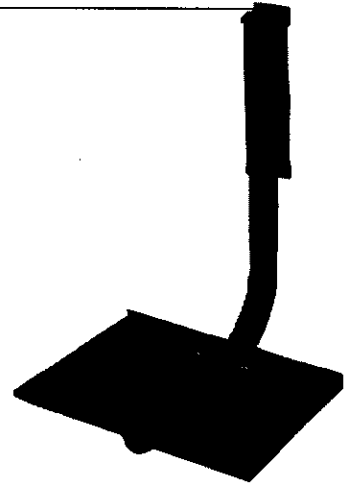
