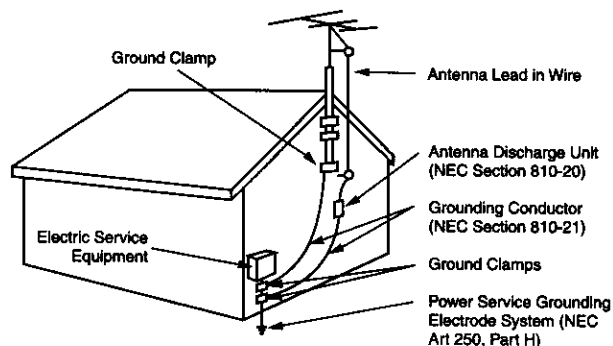

14. Outdoor Antenna Grounding

If an outside antenna or cable system is connected to the product, be sure the antenna or cable system is grounded so as to provide some protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges. Article 810 of the National Electrical Code (U.S.A.), ANSI/ NFPA 70 provides information with regard to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna-discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, and requirements for the grounding electrode.

15. Lightning

For added protection for this product (receiver) during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the product due to lightning and power-line surges.

16. Power Lines

An outside antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing an outside antenna system, extreme care should be taken to keep from touching such power lines or circuits as contact with them might be fatal.

17. Overloading

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in a risk of fire or electric shock.

18. Object and Liquid Entry

Never push objects of any kind into this product through openings as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short-out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the product.

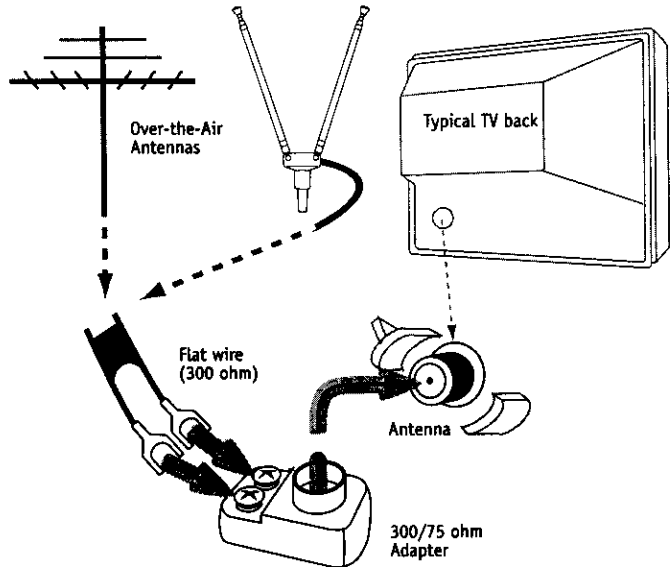

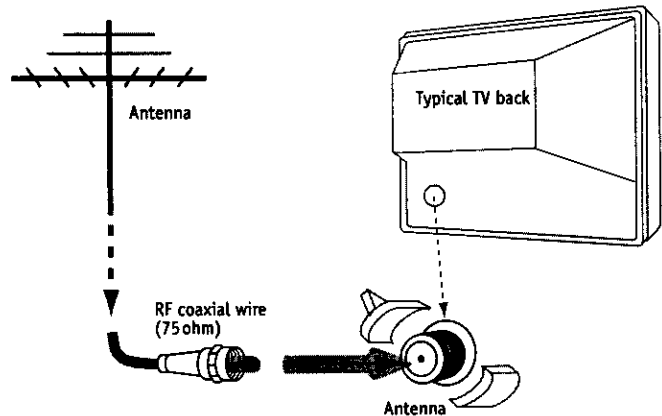

75 OHM RF Cable

The wire that comes from an off-air antenna or cable service provider. Each end looks like a hex shaped nut with a wire sticking through the middle, and it screws onto the threaded jack on the back of your TV.

300-75 OHM Adapter

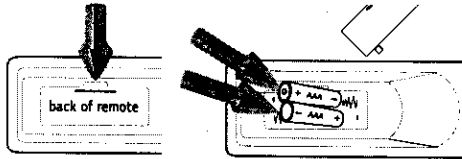
A small device that connects a two-wire 300 ohm antenna to a 75 ohm RF jack. They are usually about an inch long with two screws on one end and a round opening with a wire sticking out on the other end.

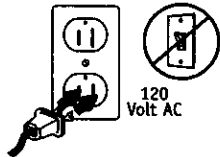

Signal/Auto Program

Signal sets the TV up to receive either over-the-air antenna signals (Air) or the cable signal from your cable service provider (Cable). Use Auto Program to automatically find and store in the TV's memory, all the stations available in your area.



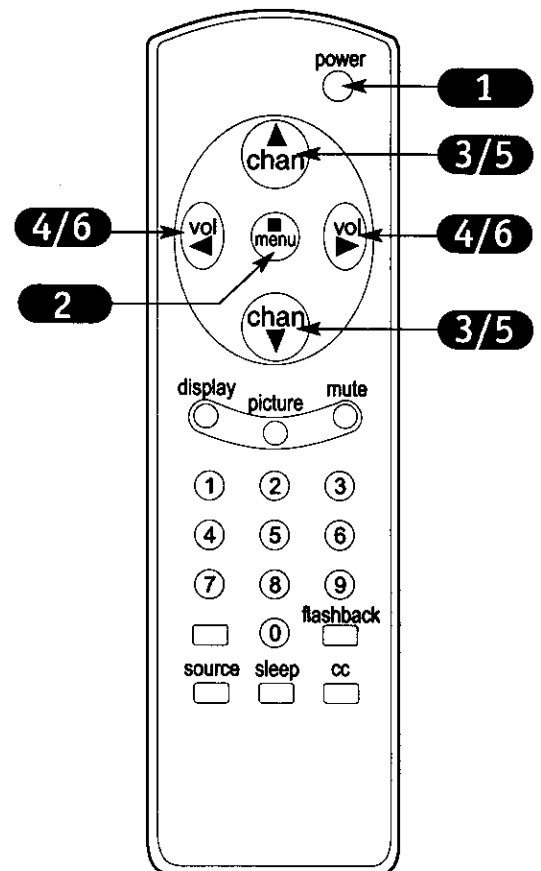
- 1** With the remote control in hand, press POWER to turn on your Entertainment Machine™.
- 2** Press MENU so the Setup menu appears.
- 3** Use the UP or DOWN arrow to select Signal.
- 4** With Signal highlighted, use the RIGHT or LEFT arrow on the remote control to select either:
Air - for over-the-air antenna reception.
Cable - for reception from your cable service provider.
- 5** Use the UP or DOWN arrow to select Auto Program.
- 6** Press a RIGHT or LEFT arrow to begin Auto Program, follow on-screen instructions. When the channel search is complete, you are ready to watch TV.

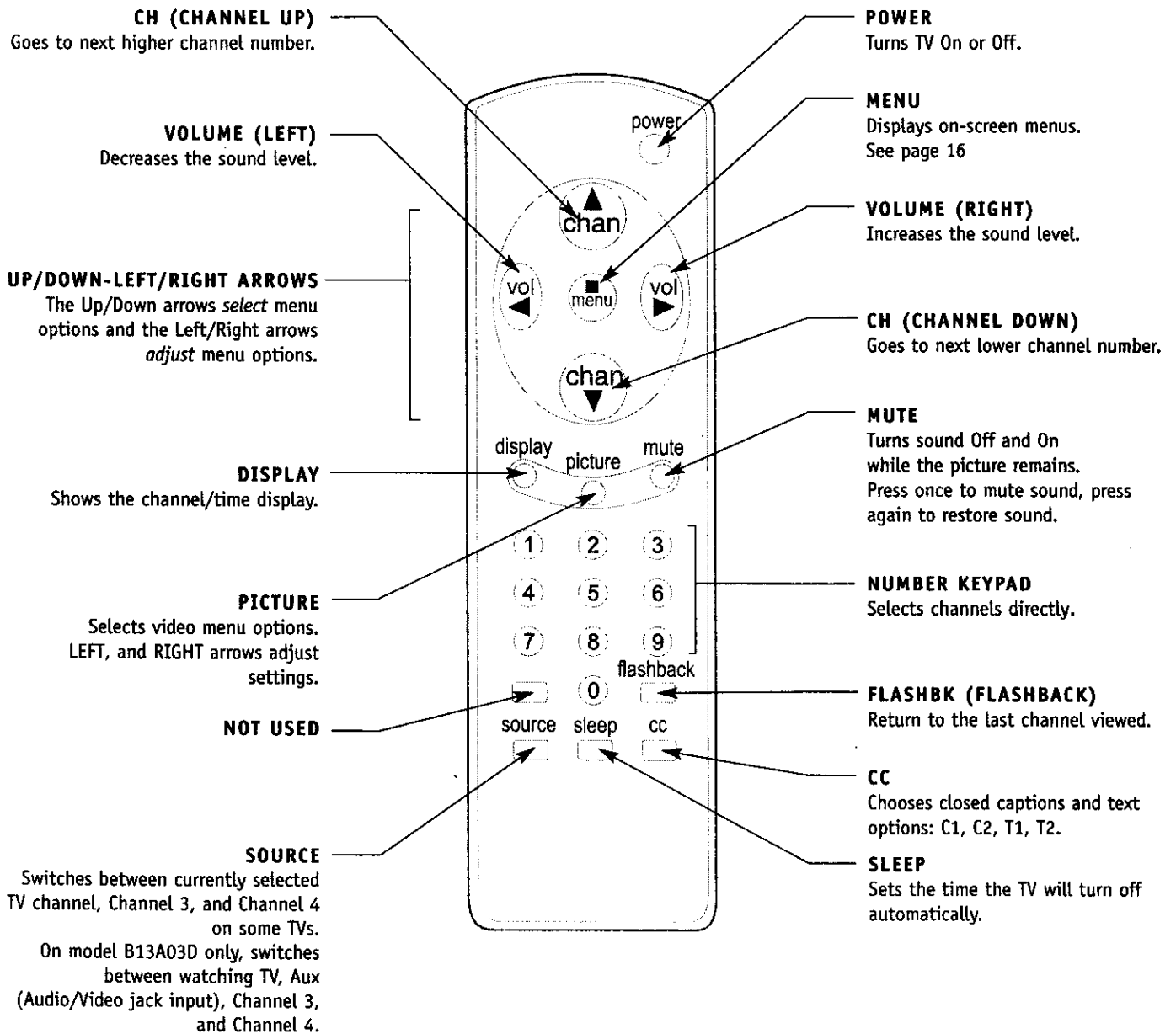

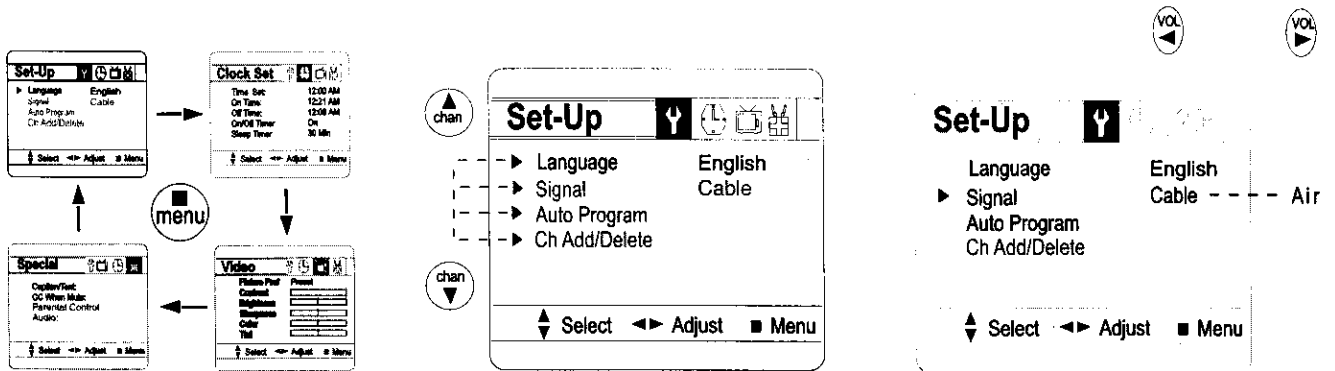

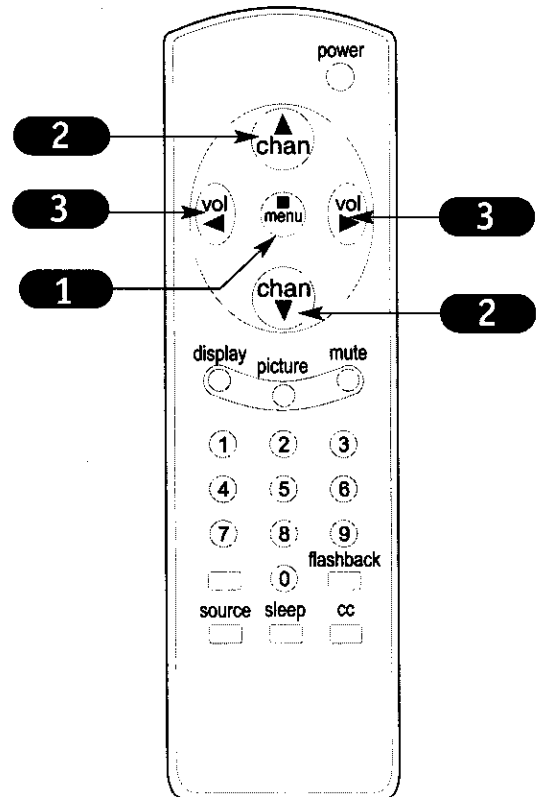

How to use the remote control to access the on-screen menus; select the menu options, and adjust the options



- 1** Press MENU repeatedly to scroll through the available menus.
- 2** Press either the Up or Down chan arrow key repeatedly to move the menu arrow up or down the available menu options and select one.
- 3** Use the Right or Left vol arrow key to adjust the selected menu option.

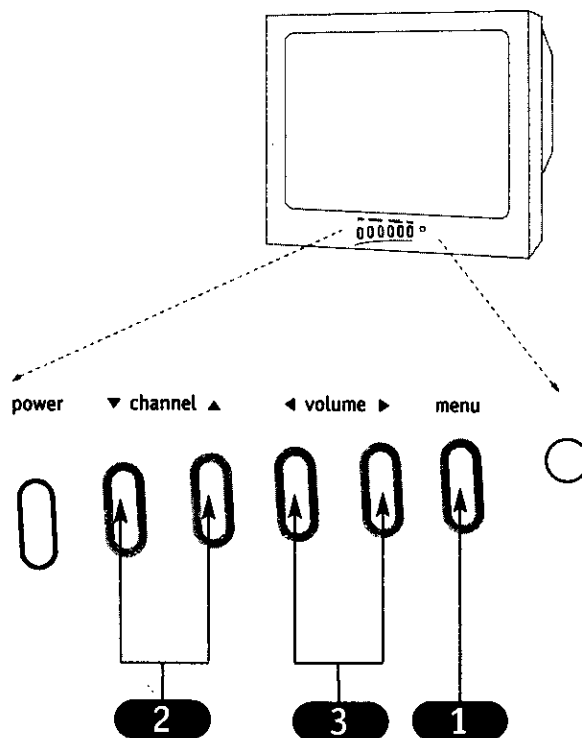

How to use your front panel controls to operate the on-screen menus

Note: When using the buttons on the front panel to select and adjust options on the on-screen menus:

CHANNEL = Select Up/Down
VOLUME = Adjust Left/Right

- 1 To access the Setup menu, press the MENU button once; to get the other menus, keep pressing the MENU button.
- 2 Choose the on-screen menu option you wish to change using either SELECT button.
- 3 The ADJUST buttons act as an "adjustment" (Left/Right) function - - use them to change the menu option.



Menus disappear after twenty seconds. To get them back, push the MENU button again.



If you've lost your remote, you can get a new replacement by calling 1-800-255-6790 to purchase a replacement.

Changing Channels

2 - CHANNEL UP/DOWN arrows: Use these arrows to change channels. Auto Program finds all channels available to you.

2 - NUMBER Keypad: To skip to any channel, enter the number of the channel using the NUMBER keypad. Press "0" first for channel numbers under 10.

2 - FLASHBACK: To instantly return to the last channel viewed, press FLASHBACK (Previous Channel).

Audio

3 - VOLUME RIGHT/LEFT: To adjust the sound level, use the VOLUME RIGHT/LEFT arrows.

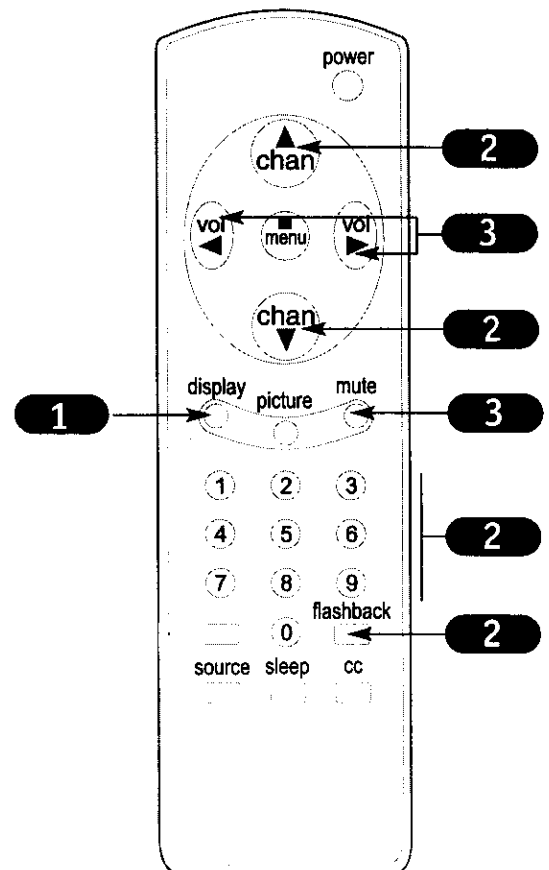
3 - To silence your TV instantly, press MUTE. To get the sound back, press MUTE again.

Tuners

Use the TV tuner, (or if you have other sources) the VCR tuner, or the Cable Box tuner to tune channels and provide the picture and sound to your TV. See pages 8, 9, and 10 for Happy/Sad notes regarding VCR and Cable Boxes. Set your VCR and/or Cable Box output switches to either 3 or 4, then tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 to receive the VCR or Cable Box tuner image. See your VCR and/or your Cable Box owner's manual(s) for further operating information.

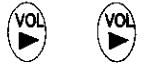

- 1 To add or delete a channel, use the number keypad to tune to the channel.
- 2 Use the left or right arrow to adjust, either: add the currently tuned channel or delete it.
- 3 To select another channel to add or delete, use the number keypad or Ch Up/Down and repeat above instructions.



For Model No. B1301L only: Since there is no remote control for this model, you must use the ch up/down arrows to select channels. If you delete channels from the TV's memory, simply rerun Auto Program to restore all available channels.

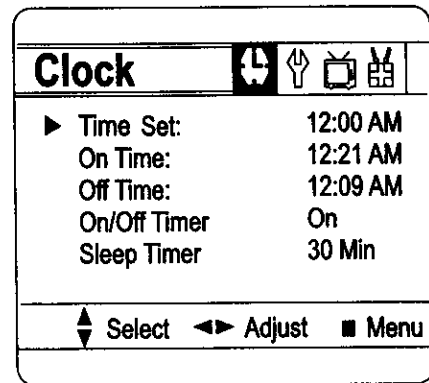

- CHANNEL SCAN** The channels found and put into the TV's memory when Auto Program's Channel Search was performed. Channels that are tuned as the user presses either the Ch Up or Down keys on the remote or front control panel.
- ADDED** Channel will be included when pressing Ch Up/Down.
- DELETED** Channel will not be included when pressing Ch Up/Down.

Clock Set

Use to set the time on the TV's clock



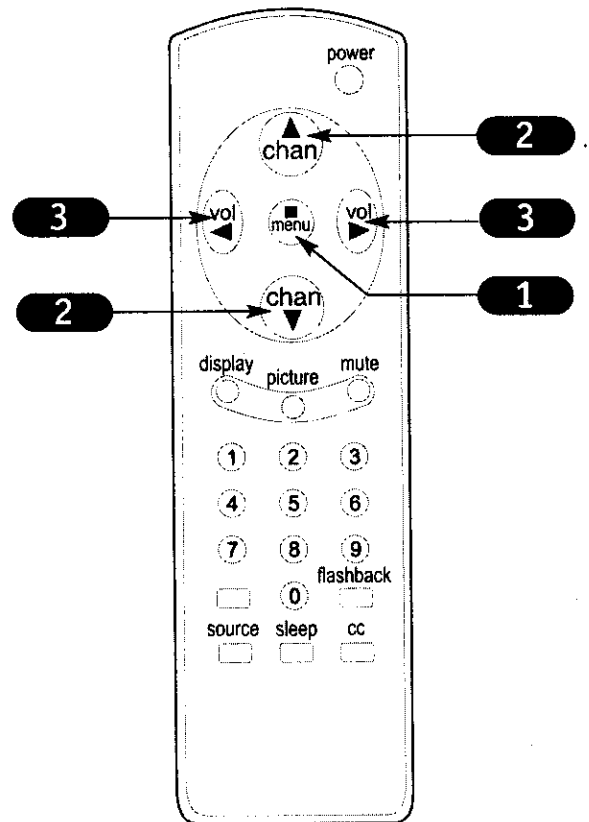

On/Off Timer

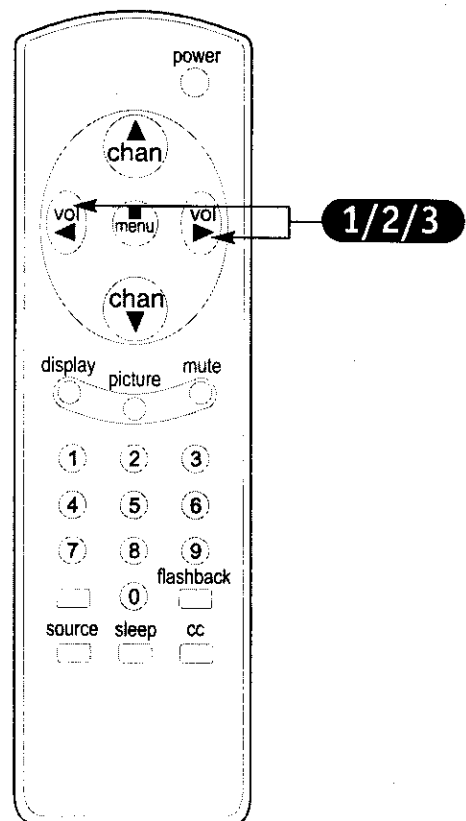
Use to set the clock: On Time/Off Time/On-Off Timer feature



1 In the Clock menu with the On Time option highlighted, press and hold down the Left or Right arrow until the time you want the TV to turn on appears.

2 With the Off Time option highlighted, press and hold down the Left or Right arrow until the time you want the TV to turn off appears.

3 With the On/Off Timer option highlighted, use the Left or Right arrow to set:
 "On" - the TV will turn On and Off.
 "Off" - the TV will not turn On and Off.



The On/Off Timer clock settings can be left the same but the feature can be set to be active or inactive.



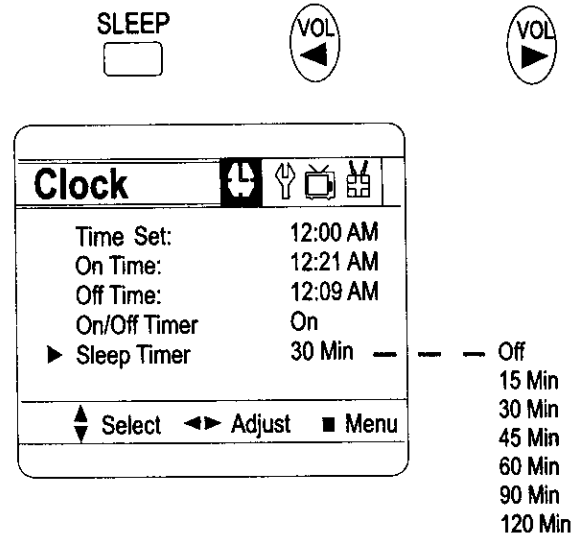
You must set an off time for the On/Off Timer feature to work.

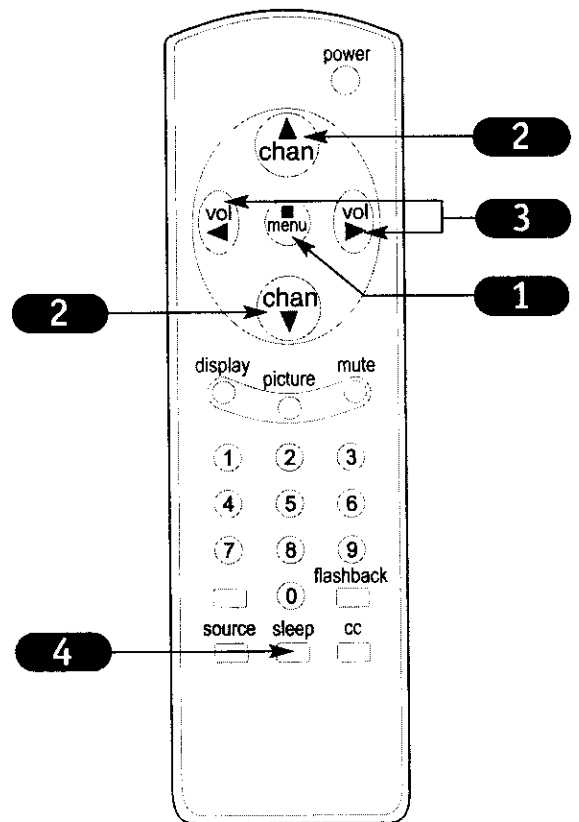

Sleep Timer

Automatically turns the TV off after the selected preset time period has elapsed



- 1** Press MENU repeatedly to place the Clock menu on the TV screen.
- 2** Use the Up or Down Select arrow to highlight the Sleep Timer option.
- 3** Use the Left and Right arrows to select the time that you want the TV to turn itself off in.
- 4** Another way to set the Sleep Timer is to press SLEEP on the remote to access the preset time options. Then press SLEEP repeatedly to choose one of the preset settings.

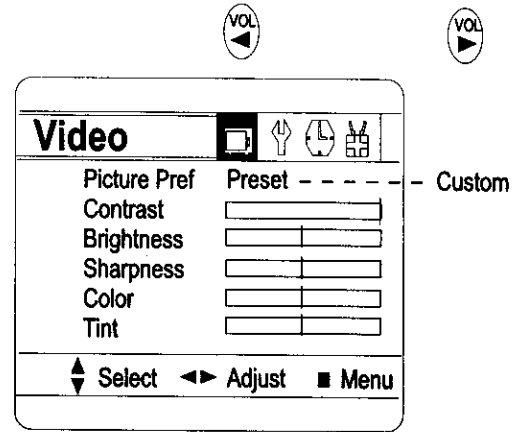


To disable the Sleep Timer, simply select Off in the Sleep Timer options menu or press POWER to turn the TV off.

SLEEP TIMER

Feature which turns the TV off after the preselected time has expired. Feature can be preset to turn the TV off in a preset time period from 15 minutes up to 2 hours.

Use to fine-tune the picture's appearance to your personal preferences



- 1 Press MENU repeatedly to place the Video menu on the TV screen.
- 2 Use the Up or Down select arrow to highlight the menu feature.
- 3 Use the Left or Right adjust arrow to change the menu options:

Picture Preference - - Custom, or Preset.

Contrast - - Changes the amount of difference between black and white levels in the picture.

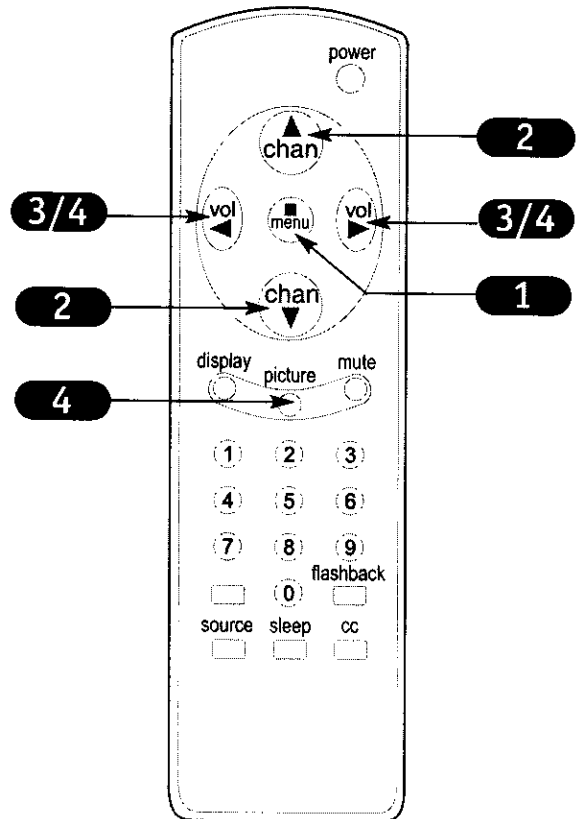
Brightness - - Increases or decreases the amount of white in your picture.

Sharpness - - Raises or lowers the definition of the picture. The lower the level, the softer the image will appear.

Color - - Adjusts levels of all colors.

Tint - - Adjusts the relative amounts of red and green in your picture.

- 4 Another way to adjust the Video options is to press PICTURE repeatedly to select a video option, then use the Left or Right arrow to change the setting.

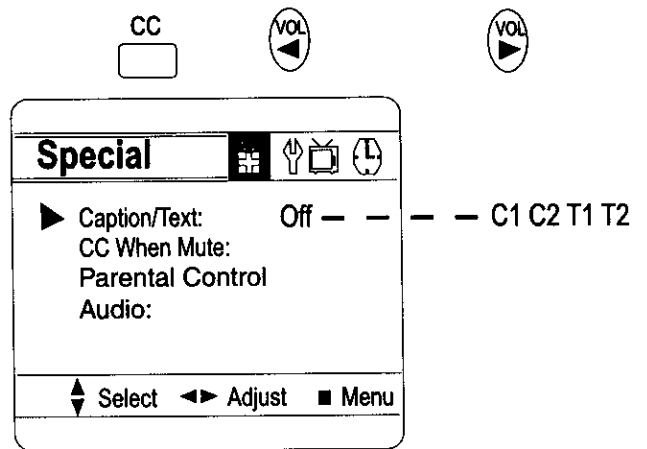

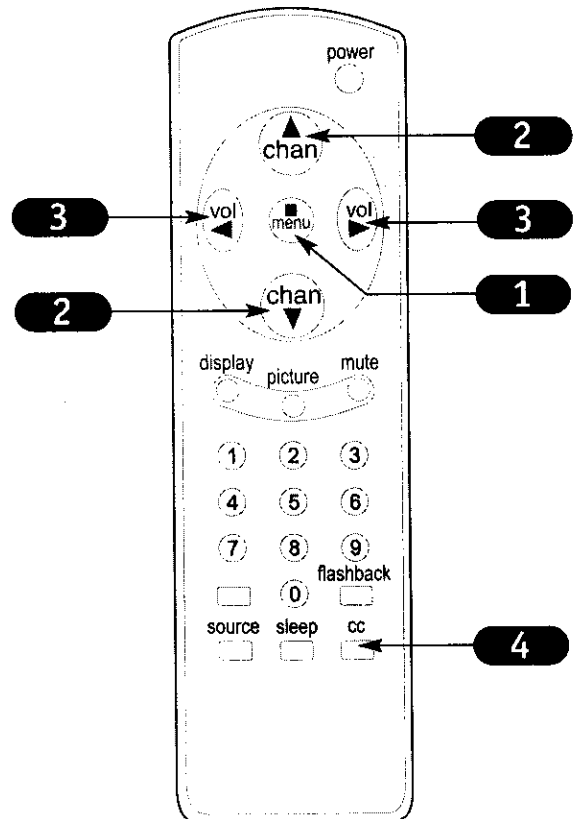
CUSTOM	User specified settings for video menu options. As you make changes in the video menu, they are considered custom preferences.
PRESET	Changes all custom settings back to their original values.

Caption/Text

Use to turn on and select on-screen closed captions or text, instead of sound



- 1** Press MENU repeatedly to place the Special (features) menu on the TV screen.
- 2** Use the Up or Down select arrow to highlight the Caption/Text option.
- 3** Use the Left or Right adjust arrow to choose: Off, C1, C2, T1, T2.
- 4** Another method of choosing captions, or text is to press CC on the remote to access the Caption/Text menu. Press repeatedly to choose one of the options.



If a closed caption option is available on the broadcast, it will probably be Caption 1.



Be certain that the program you are watching has closed captions or text available. Check the local TV listings to determine if closed captions or text are available on the broadcast.

C1, C2, T1, T2

C1 - Closed Captions 1, C2 - Closed Captions 2, T1 - Text 1, T2 - Text 2.

CAPTIONS

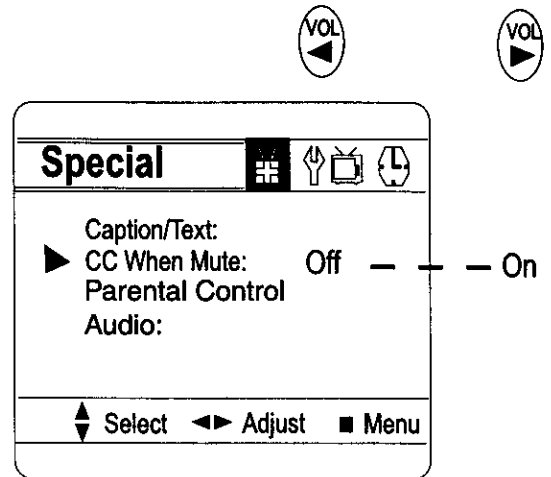
Words that appear on the TV screen as a substitute for the audio track (instead of sound), for the hearing impaired. Today, many TV programs include closed captions in addition to the audio track.

TEXT

Words that scroll across the TV screen in a box, instead of sound.

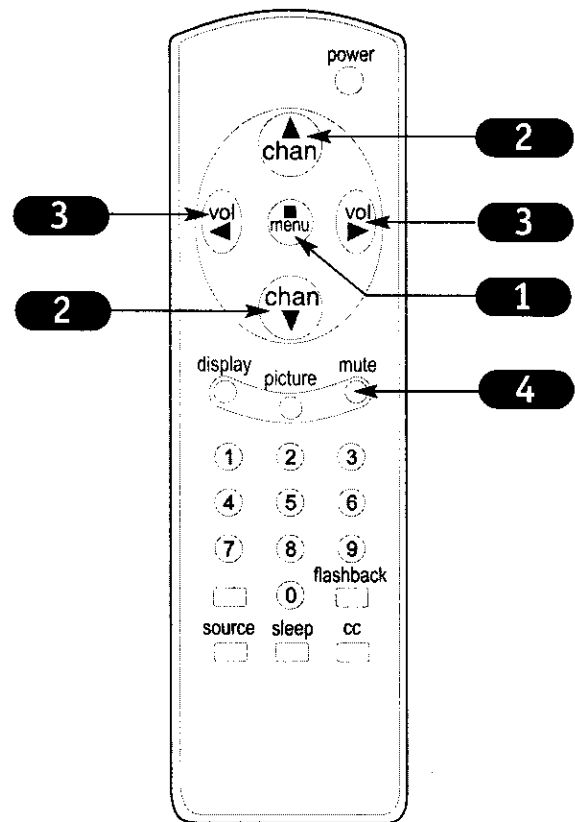
CC When Mute

Displays closed captions when the audio (sound) is muted



Feature works when sound is muted.

- 1** Press MENU repeatedly to place the Special (features) menu on the TV screen.
- 2** Use the Up or Down select arrow to highlight the CC When Mute option.
- 3** Use the Left or Right adjust arrow to choose: Off, or On.
Off, feature not active.
On, if available, captions will appear until mute is turned off.
- 4** Press MUTE to activate CC When Mute. Press MUTE again to turn feature off.



This feature works great if you get a phone call and do not want to miss the audio portion of the program you are watching.



Not all programs have closed captions.

CC WHEN MUTE

This feature allows you to have closed captions appear on the TV screen whenever the mute mode (no sound) is selected.

Optional feature can be used to "block" undesirable programming from appearing on your TV screen

Parental Control offers the user a wide variety of options and settings in menu form that restrict or "block" the programming which can appear to the general audience and children. Parental Control allows the user the capability of defining which program rating they consider acceptable, to the younger or more sensitive viewer. It can be preset and turned either on or off by the user who specifies a secret 4-number code, the password. The number of hours must be specified and general audience and children viewer blocks should both be programmed into the TV's memory. Viewer ratings are specified for both the TV (TV Guidelines menu), and motion picture industry (Movie Ratings menu); both rating systems should be used to assure complete coverage for programs appearing on your TV. The ratings are directed at the ages of children, and mature audiences.

Overview

To insure complete coverage for all TV programs, (movies and regular TV shows) choose a rating for MPAA, from the selections below AND choose ratings from the TV Parental Guidelines Rating System on the next page for General Audiences, and for Children. In addition to those, you may wish to add additional restrictions from the Content Block menu and for the No Rating option to be blocked. See menu example on next page.

Things to Consider before Setting Up Parental Control

- Specify which rating you consider acceptable to the viewer. (For example, if you choose TV-PG, all more restrictive ratings will be automatically blocked; the viewer will not be able to see: TV-PG, TV-14, or TV-MA rated programming.)
- Block program "Content" based on individual parameters such as: Strong Dialog (D), Bad Language (L), Sex Scenes (S), Violence Scenes (V), or Fantasy Violence Scenes (FV); in the TV Guidelines option.
- How many hours do you want Parental Control to be active? Set the number of Hours option from Off, 1, up to 99.
- Select a secret password; in the Set Password option. Use the number keys on the remote. Don't forget the password, it is the only way you can access the Parental Control menu and change rating selections, or turn Parental Control off.
- Do you want Parental Control to be active all the time? If not, you can turn it on or off; with the Lock On/Off option.



Simply specifying one content block such as Sex Scenes, will not automatically block another content in the programs from appearing.



You should set Parental Control restrictions for *both* general audiences and for children classifications in the TV Guidelines menu to be active at the same time to insure complete programming coverage.



Don't forget your password or you will have to wait until the block time you specified expires, before you can access any restricted programming.

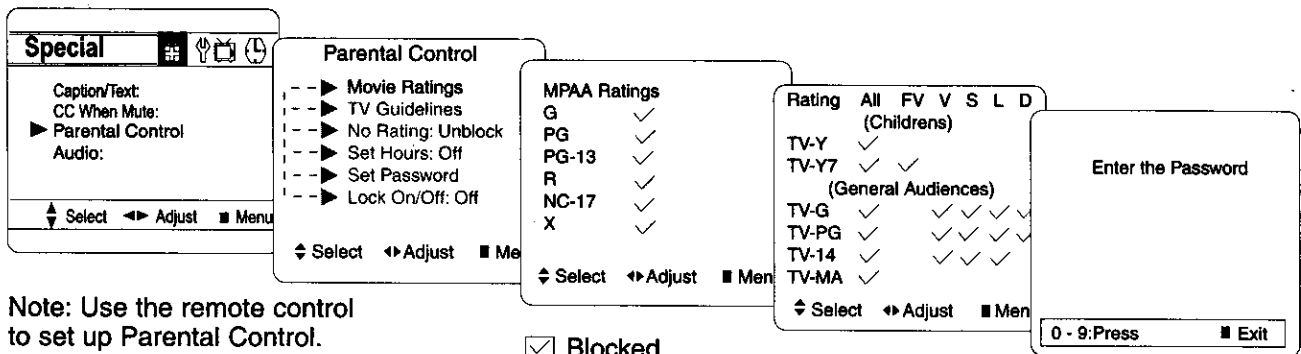

R	Restricted viewing	Not for children under age 17. Strong elements of sex and/or violence.
NC-17	Restricted Viewing	Not for children under age 17 under any circumstances. Strong sexual content.

- 1 As shown above in the Special menu with the Parental Control option highlighted, press the Left or Right arrow to go to Parental Control.
- 2 Use the Up or Down arrow to select a restriction option, like TV Guidelines.
- 3 Use Up/Down, to select, the restriction; use Left/Right, to set the checkmark (Block) for the options. "All," for TV-G for example. (See the Mini Glossary, Ratings Charts on this and the previous page for rating meanings.) Pressing MENU returns to the previous menu.
- 4 After you have selected and adjusted (Blocked/Unblocked) the options:
 - Set the hours you want Parental Control active.
 - Set a 4-number password using the number keypad.
 - 4-number password must be from 0000 to 7999.
 - Finally, set the Parental Control Lock option to either on or off.



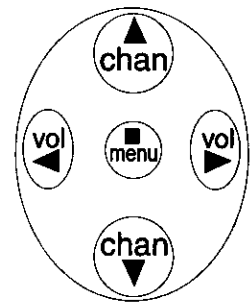
In the TV Guidelines menu, press the Up or Down arrow and repeat to go from the All column to the FV, V, L, and D columns. (Down arrow will move the highlight from top to bottom, then to the next column on the right, top to bottom, then to the next column on the right, top to bottom etc.)



"All" blocks every restriction; for example for guideline rating TV-PG, "All" will block programs with V=Violence, S=Sex Scenes, L=Bad Language, and D=Suggestive Dialog from appearing.



No Rating means that the program does not contain any rating information.



Use these keys to select and adjust the Parental Control menu options. Use the number keypad to set the password.

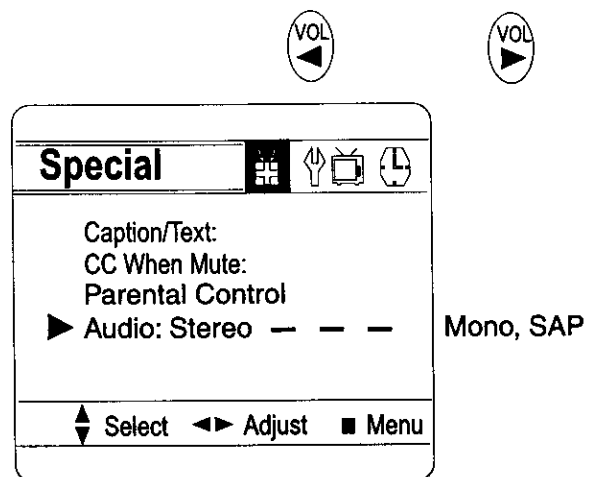

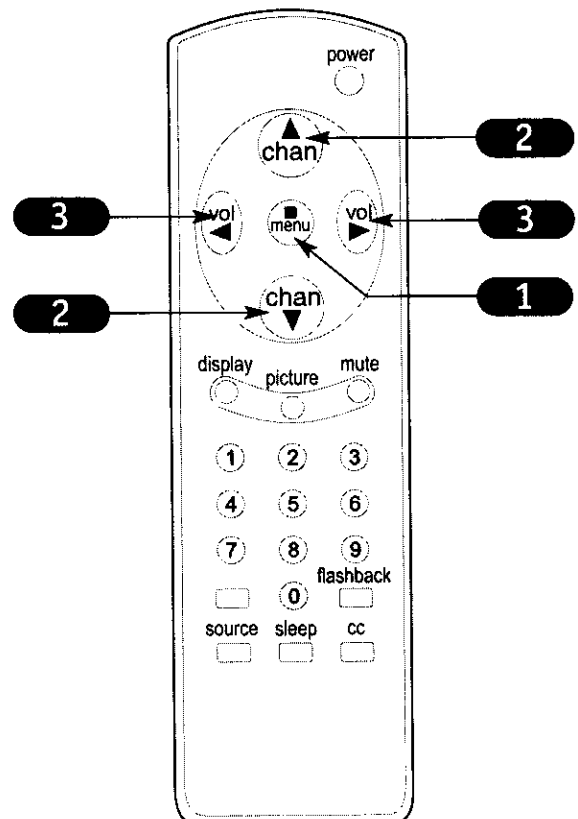

Adjusts the sound on your Entertainment Machine™



- 1** Press MENU repeatedly to place the Special (features) menu on the TV screen.
- 2** Use the Up or Down select arrow to highlight the Audio option.
- 3** Use the Left or Right adjust arrow to choose: Stereo, Mono, or SAP.



Audio options will only appear on TVs equipped with stereo. See page 5 for the features provided on the model of TV you have.

Audio Options

STEREO	Stereo sound is heard and divided between the left and right speakers.
MONO	Monaural sound is heard from all speakers.
SAP	Second Audio sound is heard, if available on program.

Description of the terms used in this guide

A/V CABLES	Use to connect Audio/Video equipment such as a VCR, usually to achieve higher quality picture and sound.	MONO SOUND	Mono (monaural) sound is one channel of sound. On more than one speaker, all the speakers play the same audio.
A/V DEVICE	Any device that produces video or sound (VCR, DVD, cable box, or television).	OUTPUT	Refers to the jack that sends a signal out of a VCR, DVD, or other A/V device.
ACCESSORIES	Optional equipment usable with your Entertainment machine™.	RF CABLE	The wire that comes from an off-air antenna or cable service provider. Each end looks like a hex shaped nut with a wire sticking through the middle, and it screws onto the threaded jack on the back of your TV.
ADD	This feature lets you add new channels to the channel scan list that you'll scroll through when using your remote.	SIGNAL	Picture and sound traveling through cable, or on the air, to your television screen.

Caring for your Entertainment Machine™

Early malfunctions can be prevented. Careful and regular cleaning can extend the amount of time you will have with your new Entertainment Machine™. Be sure to turn the power off and pull out the plug before you begin any cleaning.

Screen Cleaning

1. Here's a great way to keep the dust off your screen for a while. Wet a soft cloth in a mixture of lukewarm water and a little fabric softener or dish washing detergent. Wring the cloth until it's almost dry, and then use it to wipe the screen.
2. Make sure the excess water is off the screen, and then let it air-dry before you turn on your Entertainment Machine™.

Cabinet Cleaning

1. Use a soft cloth with a mild soap solution to wipe the cabinet.
2. Rinse the cloth and wipe the cabinet again.
3. Let the cabinet air-dry before turning the Entertainment Machine™ on.

Extended Absence



If you leave your Entertainment Machine™ dormant for a long time (such as a vacation), it's a good idea to unplug the power to protect against possible damage from lightning or power surges. If you use an off-air antenna, you may also want to disconnect it from the back of your TV before leaving.



If you unplug your Zenith Entertainment Machine™, you may have to reset the clock using the Clock Set menu described earlier. See page 19.
